

ANGELL HITS 'GAG RULE' IN TAX MEASURE

WASHINGTON, Aug. 8 (AP)—Rep. Angell (R-Ore.) told the house this week the "gag rule" adopted to pass the \$3,529,000,000 tax bill prevented members of congress from taking any part in determining what taxes should be included.

The rule under which the measure was considered permitted a vote only on the joint income tax return provision which was defeated and on committee amendments. Angell said he voted against the rule because he was opposed to "gag" measures and because it would deny him opportunity of voting on inequitable provisions of the bill.

"I have received hundreds of letters and telegrams from constituents in my district opposing various provisions of this tax bill but under this procedure I am powerless as their representative in congress to have a voice in determining whether these features shall remain in the bill or be stricken out," Angell said. "I am even denied the right to make a motion to eliminate an objectionable tax. I must take the bill or leave it as it is. It is up to me by the 25 gentlemen constituting the ways and means committee."

Angell urged the joint income tax return provision be defeated. He said his concern was not about the income taxpayer in the higher brackets but with the imposition of a larger tax upon a large body of citizens whose incomes are small.

Angell said that those who wanted to put the ship of state on "an even keel" were greatly concerned about the mounting public debt.

"We now see looming up ahead a national debt of \$100,000,000,000 which will require in round numbers \$3,000,000,000 a year in interest alone, without any provision for amortization," Angell said. "This interest charge is in excess of the total cost of government a few years back."

The representative declared the nation had been "running down hill without brakes, in the wildest orgy of public spending ever experienced in this country or any other country on earth."

Angell said the cost of national defense was not the cause of worry but the mounting cost of ordinary government expenditures. He said that the franking of all government mail cost \$6,900,000 in 1928 and \$39,000,000 in 1940. He said all loyal Americans agreed the nation must proceed full speed with full defense and make necessary appropriations for it. He warned the house the nation was heading "directly into the storms of inflation."

Bonneville Sets Tonnage Record

PORTLAND, Aug. 8 (AP)—Tonnage moving through Bonneville locks in July set a new record for the second consecutive month, U. S. district engineers said today.

For the month 103,508 tons moved upstream and down, topping the June record of 91,500. Although gasoline was the principal cargo, heavy loads of sand and gravel contributed to the total.

SOLDIERS FOREGO THANKS FROM BEAR

ANCHORAGE, Alaska, Aug. 8 (AP)—Four army air corpsmen at Fort Richardson told today how they saved the life of a large black bear and were glad to escape without even a "thank you" from the enraged brute.

The soldiers found the big bruin nearly suffocated, his head imprisoned in an empty five-gallon coffee can.

Corp. H. C. Saylor immediately punched a pair of holes in the can, permitting the bear to breathe again. But the revived bruin immediately became a serious problem.

Leaping to his feet the blinded bear ran against an army truck, and after two or three tries, changed course and fell into a ditch, swinging his cane encased head.

After a brief chase the soldiers lassoed the bear, and tied him to a tree with a 15-foot rope, with a loop around his hind quarters.

By this time the bear was so indignant, that Sergt. George A. Falkenberg held a .45-caliber automatic aimed in case of need while Saylor, Corp. E. M. Gendzwil and Pvt. T. W. Grigsby removed the can.

Then, veritably "ahold of a bear's tail and afraid to let go," the soldiers released the rope.

But bruin just snorted and headed for the woods.

CALIFORNIA LIFTS WEEVIL INSPECTION

SACRAMENTO, Aug. 8 (AP)—The state department of agriculture lifted the 29-year-old alfalfa weevil quarantine Thursday after deciding the restrictions on hay products were a heavier burden on the farming industry than damage to crops by the pest itself.

The revocation marked the end of not only one of the state's oldest and most controversial plant quarantines but a ban which department officials described as the chief cause for setting up border stations to check on plant entries into California.

D. B. Mackie, chief of the bureau of entomology and plant quarantine, said the agricultural officials of western states and those in California counties as well had found it "impossible" to enforce the alfalfa weevil quarantine recently. Furthermore, he said, damage which could be traced directly to the weevil was "very light."

The department's order complied with a resolution by the western plant board urging the elimination of the quarantine by joint action of the 11 western states. The weevil is not found in the states of Washington and New Mexico, the department said, and Arizona is practically free of it.

'Teen Age Youths Confess Part in Killing Grocer

OAKLAND, Calif., Aug. 8 (AP)—Two 'teen age boys, described by Sheriff H. P. Gleason as "the most matter-of-fact little scoundrels I have ever seen," have confessed their part in the killing of an aged grocer during a robbery attempt a week ago.

The members of the juvenile gang were described by Assistant District Attorney Richard Chamberlain as George Lingenfelter and Warren Brill, each 14 and of Hayward, where the slaying occurred.

They were arrested, Chamberlain said, on information furnished by Everett Washburn, 18, and Walter Lee, 15, who were arrested in Ogden, Utah, whence they fled on a freight train. Washburn and Lee confessed Wednesday to a California district attorney.

Chamberlain said that according to the combined confessions Washburn shot William Hanna, the grocer, in the back with a pistol as he stood telephoning for help; Lee clubbed Hanna's wife, Emma with the butt of a rifle; Brill drove the getaway car, and Lingenfelter provided the weapons, although he did not participate in the actual holdup and killing.

Brill was arrested at his mother's Russian river cottage, Lingenfelter at his home in Hayward. Both were held in the county detention home pending the filing of a formal charge.
