ACCORD EYED FOR RAILROAD HEADS, LABOR

Following the blanket rejection last week by the five railway operating brotherhoods of various rules changes proposed by the American railroads, F. G. Gurley, chairman of the executive committee of the carriers' conference committee, told labor representatives that proper human relationships between management and men and a spirit of equity and fair play require revision and modernization of a patchwork of rules that are burdensome.

Gurley made this statement at a joint conference of railroad and labor spokesmen with the press in Chicago, where the carriers' committee had been in closed session with representatives of railroad labor to propose that certain rules be changed.

The discussion with the press was the first public expression of the reasons the railroads have for proposing these changes.

"Something is wrong," Gurley told the brotherhood representatives, "when members of the adjustment boards can make decisions that subject the railroads to heavy penalties by way of payment for a few minutes' work, or, in some instances, for work not done and extending back over periods of several years."

"Obviously," he added, "something is wrong some place when members of the adjustment boards decide that the language of a schedule rule has a meaning contrary to that intended by the railroad and employ representative who reached an agreement and chose the language to express it."

He said that rules covering the conditions under which men work and the pay they are to receive for their work should be founded on equity and expressed in simple, understandable language.

"Nothing," he continued, "will do more to promote harmony and stimulate wholesome cooperation between officers and employees."

FREIGHTWAYS AIDS FIRE PREVENTION

Leland James, president of Consolidated Freightways, feels that prevention of forest fires in Oregon is every citizen's responsibility. Hence, Freightways trucks carry the message, "Keep Oregon Green" over the highways and byways of the state.

AIRGUN BANNED FROM CITY AS DAMAGE NOTED

During the past few days there have been many complaints in regards to the shooting of air-guns within the city limits. Dave Bridge, city recreation officer, said Friday. The shooting has reached such a stage in one neighborhood, Bridge said, that a boy and dog have been shot, and 21 windows were shot out of a schoolhouse. The damage caused by the boys will be mended by the parents.

Drastic steps are planned by the police department to curb the use of BB guns within the city. It is the hope of the chief of police and members of the department that the parents will cooperate. After all, the parents are responsible for the use of the guns, observed the chief.

Ordinance No. 1041 reads as follows in regards to air-guns: Section 1—Hereafter it shall be unlawful for any person to shoot, discharge or in any other way use an "air-gun," sling shot or slinger for the purpose of propelling or throwing any shot, stones or other missiles within the limits of the city of Klamath Falls.

Section 2—Any person convicted of violating the provisions of the foregoing ordinance shall be fined a sum not exceeding \$50 or 25 days in jail, or both such fine and imprisonment.

RED 'GHOSTS' HIGHLY ACTIVE, SAYS WRITER

Well, one can only say about nazidom's claim of victory and wholesale destruction of Russian forces that the ghost of the red army continues to rattle its chains in a remarkably lively manner.

On the face of the sweeping German announcement made yesterday the Muscovite position would seem to be catastrophic, what with an estimated 4,000,000 men killed and captured, and the vital center of the red line opposite Moscow laid wide open. Yet not only do the bolsheviks deny these claims but their defense has in fact been functioning in amazing fashion up to the present—and what's the answer to that?

One paradoxical aspect of the position lies in the fact that while the invaders assert the powerful Smolensk gateway to the capital has been smashed, they apparently have made no move to exploit the achievement. The German war-machine is wont to roll at a time like that.

First off, we must note that the German communique isn't a record of the past few days but is a history of the seven weeks war. It presumably is published partly to meet the disappointment of the German public in the slow arrival of the promised nazi victory. It is calculated to sustain the German reputation at arms. It undoubtedly is meant to stiffen Japan's attitude toward Britain and the United States.

When one considers the report from this standpoint it isn't nearly so startling as it appears at first blush. The Germans have achieved much, in the face of fierce resistance, since the conflict began.

The estimate by nazi spokesmen that the Russians have lost close to 3,000,000 killed seems fantastic, as the officials themselves admit. If this figure is true for the defenders, what must it be for the Germans who, under normal expectancy, would have much heavier losses because they are on the offensive. However, the losses on both sides undoubtedly have been colossal—so big that figures almost cease to have meaning.

And what of the German claim

that the red army is in a state of dissolution? As I pointed out some days ago, the war is entering a new phase—the crisis—and it won't be strange if big changes are in the making.

It is possible, for instance, that the Russians are indeed preparing to withdraw to fresh positions. I don't say that they are preparing to do this, but we can't judge definitely at this distance, but it is a possibility. It may even be that they already have withdrawn many of their troops from the bloody Smolensk sector in the center to positions nearer Moscow. If this situation does exist it would go far toward explaining the nazi claim of a break-through and of red dissolution.

NAZI AGENTS SAID FLOODING FRANCE

HARTFORD, Conn., Aug. 8 (AP)—Louis Palombizio, returning to his former home here from France where he stayed after fighting in the World War, said Thursday that what he saw at the customs office in Hendaye, France, convinced him that "so-called immigrants" were being sent by Germany to the United States as "undercover agents."

Palombizio said he and his wife were detained at the Hendaye customs for five hours, and a nazi officer, remarking "You don't need all that money," took 8000 of his 10,000 francs.

"Not all those going through at the same time received similar treatment," he said.

"I saw with my own eyes some with as much as 10,000 francs keep all their money. They shook hands with the nazi officers. They all drank champagne together."

"And when they parted, I heard the officers say to them—there were about a dozen of them—'good luck' and they

slapped each other on the back." Palombizio, Italian born, came to the United States when he was 3 and enlisted in the army during the World War.
