MALIN — Czechoslovakians of the state will gather here August 23 and 24 for a conference, it was announced this week by Mrs. Victor Vasek, president of the Czech-American Alliance society of Malin. About 100 guests from Portland, Albany, Scio, Mills City and other coast points will attend. Representation from towns in northern California is also expected.

Problems of further assistance to war-crushed Czechoslovakia will be taken up. A number of out-of-town speakers will be introduced.

The two-day meeting will include an old-time dance, cales-thenics drills, and a dance in Bohemian costumes to be offered by the guests from Portland. The meetings will be open to the public and the dance and program to be held Saturday night, August 23, will be at the Broadway dance hall, the proceeds to go to war relief. Admission will be 35 cents a person, and it is said that anyone who has ever attended a program sponsored by Malin Bohemians can attest to the success of such entertainments.

FUND SOUGHT FOR 3 FLAGS HIGHWAY

LAKEVIEW — The Three Flags Highway association has enlisted the support of Senator Holman to assist in finding ways of securing funds with which to improve the Three Flags highway southward from Alturas. An effort is being made to secure allotments of public lands highway money for this purpose. Modoc and Lassen counties are the only two counties in the north half of California which are eligible for this type of federal aid.

Senator Holman, who is a member of the senate military affairs committee, has been asked to consult California congressmen to see if any federal appropriation of public lands money can be switched from Los Angeles county to Lassen and Modoc counties at least every other year.

LASSEN GRASSES, PLANTS GATHERED

BIEBER, Calif.—One hundred and fifty varieties of useful plants that grow in this vicinity have been gathered and segregated into that many neat bundles by Fay Roberts, assistant county agriculturist stationed at Bieber, for exhibition as Lassen county products at the California state fair this month.

More than 100 kinds of grasses, both wild and domesticated, valuable for forage and hay, are in the collection. There are mountain bunch grasses, 15 varieties; meadow and water grasses; redtop, bromes, clovers, alsike, timothy; rye, wheat, oat and orchard grasses; sedg, fescue, foxtail, bronco, squirreltail and crested wheat grass, among others.

To compete for prizes at the fair, Roberts has prepared bundles of different varieties of wheat, barley, rye, oats, vetches and alfalfa.

He has threshed out seed by hand and plans to exhibit with each plant sample a little dish of its seed.

Roberts said his collecting extended from Pittville to Hayden Hill but he found four-fifths of his varieties in Big Valley.

He is also preparing exhibition samples of 25 varieties of wood growing in northwestern Lassen county. Among these are oaks, locust, walnut, wild cherry, "mahogany," juniper, tamarack, cedar, fir and many kinds of pine including the important ponderosa and sugar pines and the dense "digger" pine, heavy as oak.

Each wood sample will be a short section of trunk with the bark on and one end beveled and polished, and a small finished board cut from the same log.

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Careful Cooking Advised In Preparing Pork Cuts

Whether you buy low cost, medium or high cost cuts of pork, you'll not get your money's worth unless you cook each one the best way.

Do you know that the quality cuts of fresh pork are wrinkle-free, with a thin, smooth skin? High-quality flesh is firm; poor quality, soft and flabby. Top-grade hams have a moderately small shank, and are short and thick. Look for soft red bones and fine-textured flesh in the best grades of spareribs and pork loin. Above all remember this—cook all pork thoroughly.

Now for the best way to cook different cuts of pork:

Low cost cuts: hind feet — boiled, pickled; spareribs — baked, boiled; spareribs (half-sheets) — baked, boiled; neck

stewed, braised; kidney — stew, meat pie; liver—fried, braised; liver loaf, liver paste; tongue—(fresh, corned or pickled) boiled; brains—fresh, braised, scrambled; tail—boiled, ears and snout, boiled; head—headcheese, scrapple.

Ham butts can be cooked to remarkable flavor. Place in cold water. Add 1 tablespoon brown sugar, 1 teaspoon ground mustard, about 4 whole cloves, 1 raw carrot, and the peelings of apples or other fruit. Cover and keep just below the boiling point for about two hours. Serve with apple sauce, mashed potatoes and greens.

Keep the cooking water. Next day cook red kidney beans (which have been soaked in cold water for several hours) in this ham water. Or else use it for black beans to make black bean soup.

BREAKFAST: Orange juice, fried eggs, bacon, whole-wheat toast, marmalade, coffee, milk.

DINNER: Ham butt cooked with fruits and spices, spiced applesauce, mashed potatoes, spinach with egg, radishes, celery, raw carrot sticks, blackberry roll, hard sauce, coffee, milk.

SUPPER: Mixed vegetable salad, cold sliced ham, corn bread and jelly, fruit bowl, tea, milk.

bones — cooked like spareribs; jowl butts — sliced, fried, seasoning for vegetables; forefeet — boiled, pickled.

Medium cost cuts: brisket (forepart of the bacon) — seasoning for vegetables; cured picnic, baked or boiled, fried or braised; New York style shoulder—cooked like ham; picnic butts — cooked like ham; Boston butts — cooked like ham; loin butts (end of pork loin)—roast; cured hams (purchased half or whole) — baked, boiled, fried or braised; fresh hams—roast, braised steak.

High-cost cuts: bacon (without rind)—broiled, fried; cured ham, center slices — broiled, fried braised; fresh pork loins—roast, crown roast, braised chops; cured pork loins — Canadian style bacon.
