REPLACEMENTS FOR CAR PARTS GET PRIORITY

Although new car production has already been cut 20 per cent and further reductions are being contemplated, motorists need have no fear that they will be unable to get replacements for their present cars, Joe Mattson, western representative of the Automobile Manufacturers' association told officials of the Oregon State Motor association on his recent visit to Portland.

"All manufacturers for given replacement parts have been given Number 1 priority ratings—that means; of course, that they will not be stinted on materials or equipment. All manufacturers keep their dies and jigs for every model so that parts are readily available. This was the first thing that Detroit and Washington got together on when a reduction in new production was discussed.

"The reason for the reduction is the hope to release materials and skilled craftsmen for defense materials. Already the automobile industry is producing medium tanks, blitz buggies, airplane assemblies, guns and a myriad of other defense items. The automobile makers, of course, are masters of mass-production. With the cooperation of the army engineers many innovations of manufacture have been introduced to speed production.

"One particular example of this is the machining of the firing pin in rifles. Formerly this was an elliptical hole and required three separate machining operations. Because many of the automotive engineers had never seen this rifle before, they asked if the hole couldn't just as well be round. It was tried and found successful—this cut the machining time to one-third. They then went one step further and designed a machine that would bore ten holes in one operation—so in this one instance machining time has been cut to one-thirtieth. There are many other examples of these same time-saving improvements."

"We don't know, of course, if 'collings' will be fixed on new car prices. However, the automobile manufacturers have agreed among themselves to keep the car prices at the same level—any rise in new car prices will probably represent new excise taxes."

Mattson is a graduate of Oregon State college in 1927 and was formerly motor vehicle administrator for the state of California.
