

U. S. PLANNING STIFFER EXIT, ENTRY CONTROL

WASHINGTON, Aug. 15 (AP)—All American citizens and aliens desiring to enter or leave the United States after September 1 will be required to secure entry or exit permits, or their equivalent under new regulations now under preparation by the state and justice departments.

President Roosevelt is expected to announce the new policy in the interests of national defense, through a proclamation to be issued soon after his return to Washington.

The new regulations are designed particularly to curb the movements of spies, propagandists, fifth columnists or other travelers whose activities would be detrimental to the interests of the United States.

While this nation, along with most other countries, long has required aliens to secure entry visas, the United States hitherto has placed no barriers against the departure of Americans or aliens (except Germans and Italians) from this country. Institution of the new regulations will establish complete governmental control over immigration and emigration for the first time since the 1917-1918 war days.

While the United States in the past has not required American citizens to secure passports to leave the country, they have been a practical necessity since most nations require them for entry. They also prove identity for re-entry to the United States.

Since the United States established naval bases on British islands and territories in the western hemisphere, passports have been required of travelers to those areas, and to Greenland and Iceland, which are under American protection.

All passports are now taken up upon the return of an American from abroad and strict rules for issuance of new passports, particularly to belligerent countries and danger areas, have drastically reduced the number being issued.

After September 1, passports issued American citizens will automatically provide the necessary exit permit. The passports of all departing Americans will be examined by customs authorities at ports of exit before the holder is permitted to board vessels or cross borders.

Proper authorization will be required of aliens desiring to leave. Their credits must be examined and approved by immigration service officials at ports of exit in the United States, Hawaii, Alaska and Puerto Rico.

Officials said they did not expect any changes in present regulations governing travel to and from Canada and Mexico, or to Cuba, which does not require passports from American citizens.

Preserves, Jellies He-Man Fillers for Lunch Boxes

How are you at arming the lunch box brigade? Are you a pantry promoter of hearty, he-man sandwich preserves that are as filling as they are delicious? Making preserves now at little expense, and while fresh fruits are in season, rates you a winner in the family popularity poll whenever there are lunch boxes to be filled.

Margaret Sawyer, American preserving expert, gives these rules for success: Spread a wet cloth on your kitchen work table and place jars and glasses fresh from boiling water bath on this

BREAKFAST—Canned grapefruit juice, creamed codfish on toast, enriched bread toast, current jelly, coffee, milk.
LUNCHEON—Hot potato soup in cups, spicy pear butter sandwiches, watercress sandwiches, tea, milk.

DINNER—Fruit cup, creamed tuna fish and olives, brown rice, broiled tomatoes, apple pie, cheese, coffee, milk.

cloth while you are filling with the hot preserves. Never dry the containers with a cloth.

Dip new rubber rings in boiling water and adjust on jars while the rings are still wet. Fill containers to within 1/2 inch of top. Dislodge any air bubbles in jar or glass with sterilized knife.

To cap jars: Lift cap from hot water by the edge, drain, set in place on jar and seal tightly immediately. To cap glasses: Cover

at once with 1/2 inch paraffin. When cool, cover glasses with sterilized tin covers or tightly pasted paper covers. Keep your newly filled jars and glasses in draftless place while cooling. When cold, store in cool, dry place.

GRAPE-ORANGE MARMALADE
(About 7 half-pint jars or 8 (8-ounce) glasses)
One medium-sized orange, 8 cups (3 pounds) prepared Concord grapes, sugar, 1 teaspoon salt.

Scrub orange, cut into eighths, remove seeds and all coarse membrane. Cut crosswise in very thin slices. Measure. For each cup of sliced orange, add 1 1/2 cups water. Cover and let stand overnight. Bring to a boil and simmer about 30 minutes, or until rind is very tender. Wash and stem about 3 1/2 pounds slightly underripe grapes. Weigh or measure into large preserving kettle. Crush. Bring slowly to a boil and simmer, covered, about 5 minutes, or until soft, stirring frequently. Rub through coarse sieve and add cooked orange. Measure into large kettle. For each cup of grape-

PLANE OUTPUT AT TWO PLANTS GETS SPEEDUP

BUFFALO, N. Y., Aug. 15 (AP)—Two aircraft plants out of the four in the Buffalo-Niagara Falls area, devoted almost exclusively to the production of pursuit planes, will soon be turning out machines at the rate of 8000 a year, William S. Knudsen, head of the office of production management, indicated Thursday.

At a press interview preceding dedication of a new \$18,000,000 government-built factory on the lip of the Buffalo municipal airport, Knudsen remarked: "When they tell me they can get 500 planes a month out of these plants, I believe it."

He added, humorously, "That's something."

At the dedication of the plant proper, which the Curtiss-Wright corporation airplane division has had in operation for two months, Maj. Gen. George H. Brett, chief of the army air corps, departed from a prepared address to remark that air power in the current European war and in future wars would be the deciding factor.

In a portion of his prepared address which he did not deliver, General Brett said American Curtiss "Tomahawk" planes had brought down about 25 "enemy" aircraft between May 15 and June 23.

QUICK PLUM PRESERVES
(About 6 half-pint jars or 8 (8-ounce) glasses)
Six cups (2 1/2 pounds) prepared plums, 1 cup water, 4 cups (14 pounds) sugar, 1 teaspoon salt. Wash, remove pits, and slice lengthwise about 3 pounds firm, ripe plums. Weigh or measure into preserving kettle. Add water. Bring to a boil and simmer, covered, about 15 minutes, or until tender, stirring occasionally. Add sugar and salt. Mix carefully.

Cook slowly until mixture boils, stirring until sugar is dissolved. Boil rapidly about 10 minutes, or until fruit is clear and syrup is somewhat thick, stirring frequently to prevent scorching. Skim. Pour into clean, hot, sterilized jars or glasses and seal at once.

Civil Service Jobs Open in 32 States, Over Top in 16

WASHINGTON, Aug. 15 (AP)—Thirty-two states have failed to achieve their full quota of civil service jobs, while 16 states and the District of Columbia are in excess of their allotment under the civil service apportionment law.

The civil service commission, reporting on the status of job apportionment among the states as of July 31, said New York, with 8000 persons on the civil service rolls, was nearly 1000 jobs over

its quota of 7040, highest in the nation. Among states which failed to reach their quotas was Oregon with a quota of 569 and 544 jobs filled.

ARMY ESTIMATED MILLION-AND-HALF

WASHINGTON, Aug. 15 (AP)—The war department estimated the strength of the army Thursday at 1,545,400 officers and enlisted men.

Of the total 517,000 are regular army troops, 281,900 are national guardsmen, 881,500 are selective service trainees, and 85,000 reserve officers on active duty.

The total number of enlisted men is 1,443,500, and the overall total of officers 101,900.
