

Fall Flower Show Schedule Announced

Library Club Exhibit and Luncheon Slated for September the Eighth in Willard Hotel

Evidence of fall—busy hours being put in by the officers and chairmen of the Klamath Falls Woman's Library club in preparation for the opening meeting at the Willard hotel on Monday, September the eighth, at one o'clock. There will be the usual fall flower show and luncheon. Mrs. R. R. Probstel, president of the club, has named Mrs. Sydney Evans as show chairman, and Mrs. Leo N. Huls as luncheon chairman.

Instructions for exhibitors were distributed during the week and are available to all interested in taking part. Any woman in the city may enter exhibits and attend the luncheon, it was announced, and memberships will be taken at the first meetings.

Entries will be registered at the Willard from eight o'clock to ten o'clock in the morning. No entries for competition may be accepted after ten o'clock, and no prizes other than ribbons will be awarded, which will be given at the discretion of the judges.

In the horticultural classes, containers for entries in the specimen bloom classes will be furnished. It is desirable that named specimens be labeled. All horticultural exhibits must be grown by the exhibitor. These will be classified when entered. Three blooms of each variety is required for competition, excepting dahlias, one of which will be judged.

In arrangement classes any plant material, accessories, or backgrounds, may be used. Following are rules for table arrangements, under eighteen inches in height:

"Birthday Cake" type arrangements. Mound arrangements. Japanese type line arrangements. Mixed bouquets. a—Old fashioned. b—Modern. Arrangements made with one species and its own foliage. Warm color arrangements in suitable containers. Cool color arrangements in suitable containers. Arrangements in low, flat containers. Silly arrangements. Arrangements illustrating song, story, poem, or slogan. Arrangements with horizontal rhythm. Decorative stage arrangements, over eighteen inches in height. Arrangements in baskets. Arrangements in metal containers. Arrangements in pottery containers.
