Youth Completes Marine Training

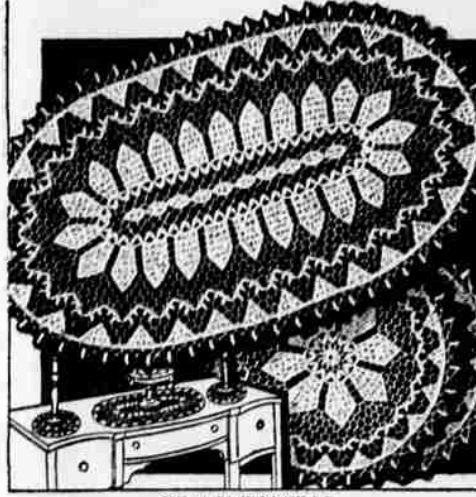
