MANY STOCKS FAIL TO KEEP RISING TREND

NEW YORK, Aug. 19 (AP) — Scattered spots of strength persisted in today's stock market but many leaders were unable to repeat on Monday's slow-going recovery.

The foreign news, specifically Moscow's admission the German thrust was gaining momentum, served to chill some potential buyers. In addition the widening rift between the United States and Japan tended to shift some bullish forces to the conservative ranks.

Yesterday's comeback, which was attributed more to technical factors than anything else, was a bit too timid for the liking of the statisticians who thought the lengthy stalemate which began July 29 should have been broken with more vigor. Consequently, an assortment of customers was disposed to stand aside pending more light on the market's basic structure.

CHICAGO, Aug. 19 (AP) — Strength at Minneapolis, some mill buying and short covering imparted firmness to wheat futures today. Prices at times advanced about a cent a bushel before profit taking cut the gains about in half.

The general run of the news inspired little activity and most traders seemed content to take a position on the sidelines to await developments at Washington.

Wheat closed 1-1/2 cent higher than Monday's final quotations, September \$1.11 1/4, December \$1.15 1/4; corn unchanged to a lower, September 77c, December 80 1/4c and oats 1/2 to 1c up.
