DETROIT, Aug. 19 (UP)—Joe DiMaggio, centerfielder of the league-leading New York Yankees, said tonight he didn't think the sprained ankle he suffered in the second game of today's double-header with the Detroit Tigers would keep him out of the lineup "more than two days."

He answered the telephone in his downtown hotel room and said X-rays taken of the injury "didn't show a thing." The hard-hitting outfielder sprained his left ankle in the fourth inning of the nightcap in running out a double. The teams split the double bill, the Yankees winning the second one.

Charlie Gehringer hit a homer, double and single in this game. Marius Russo shackled the Detroit attack in the nightcap and won his 12th victory with an 8-3 decision.

Jimmy Bloodworth's homer with one on in the 12th inning enabled the Washington Senators to hand the Cleveland Indians their eighth straight defeat and 14th in their last 15 games, 8-6.
