

Bud Ward, Ray Billows Meet For Third Time at Chicago

CHICAGO, Aug. 20 (AP)—Playing brilliant golf when the pressure was the heaviest, Ray Billows, Poughkeepsie, N. Y., qualified for the semi-finals of the Great Lakes amateur golf championship by defeating Marvin (Bud) Ward, Spokane, Wash., 5 and 4.

CHICAGO, Aug. 20 (AP)—The rubber match of one of amateur golf's liveliest twosome battles went on in the Great Lakes amateur golf championship today—with the principals both looking ahead to next week's national amateur test at Omaha.

The two stars involved—Marvin (Bud) Ward of Spokane, Wash., and Ray Billows of Poughkeepsie, N. Y.—met in the Great Lakes event at Knollwood for the third time in their brilliant fairway careers. With each holding one decision, they were

hard for victory today. Regardless of the outcome, however, it was probable both would tee off in the big Nebraska show Monday with their games at razor-edge.

Two years ago, at Chicago's North Shore club, Ward won the national amateur by downing Billows in the finals, 7 and 5. Last year, at Winged Foot, Billows whipped Ward 4 and 3 in the quarterfinals. Ward next week will be one of the standout favorites, while Billows says, "this should be Bud's year to win, but don't count me out."

Both Ward and Billows were impressive yesterday in double victories. Ward had to go 19 holes to down Frank Kovack of Chicago, 1 up, then routed Johnny Lehman, Chicago veteran, 5 and 4. Billows overwhelmed F. R. Bowen of Chicago, 7 and 6, then took a 5 and 4 win from Earl Stewart of Dallas, Tex., national intercollegiate champion.

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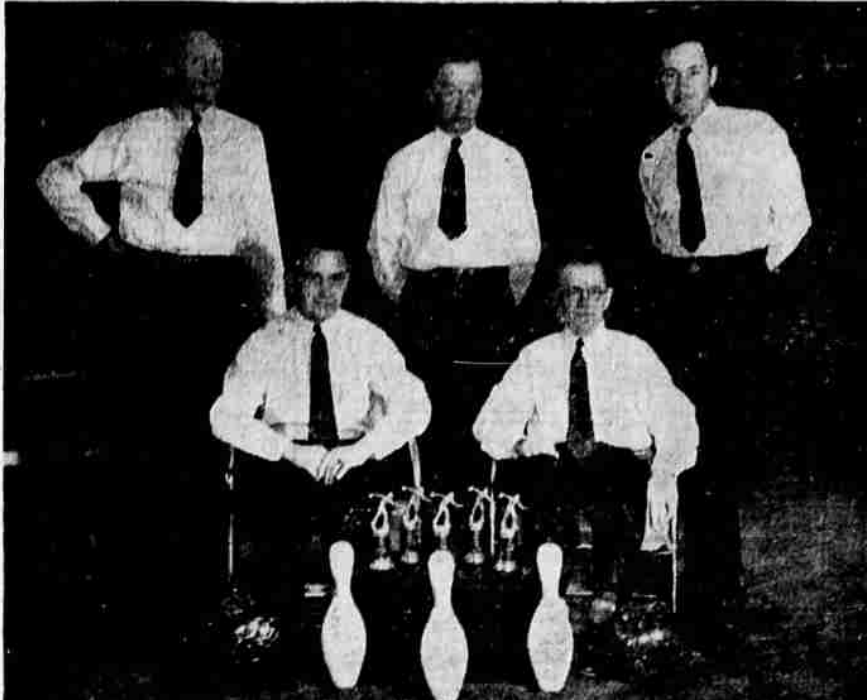

Halfway Point Reached in Grand American Trapshoot

VANDALIA, O., Aug. 20 (AP)—The 42nd grand American trapshoot hit the halfway mark today, with a big field scheduled to clear up a bit of unfinished business left over from Tuesday, and then decide the individual class titles and the state five-man team championship.

Darkness halted yesterday's free-for-all shooting scrapes before completion of a four-way shootoff in the men's race between state title holders, and a three-way fight for the women's North American clay target title.

In the three-way chase for the

women's North American 10-yard pennant were Mrs. Charles Allen Thomas of Dayton, O., skeet star and mother of four; Mrs. Marek Grant of Fort Dodge, Iowa, and Mrs. George Cameron, Texas open champion from Houston.

The trio tied at 97 of 100 to wrest the laurels from Mrs. Lela Hall of Strasburg, Mo., for the second time in seven years. They were to battle it out today, darkness falling last night before the shootoff could start.

Today's race called for 200 targets at 16 yards, with five class championships to be decided, along with the team title.

Gardiner, who won the Wisconsin state open, used to be a ball player and appeared to be headed for the majors until he was skulled and decided golf was safer. . . . Lowest score on record was made by a fellow in North Dakota who was playing golf for the first time. . . . He sliced his drive from the first tee and holed it out on the ninth green.
