COUNTY PROGRAM FOR QUILTS SET

MERRILL—The Klamath county comforter program is expected to get underway by September 1, it was announced by C. A. Henderson, Klamath county agricultural agent, and applicants of those eligible for comforters should be made to Mrs. Winnifred Gillen, home demonstration agent in the Federal building, Klamath Falls. Those who were eligible for cotton mattresses distributed through the surplus marketing administration are also eligible for comforters.

Cotton and covering materials are both furnished by the surplus marketing administration and the agricultural administration under the same plan as the mattress material at a very low cost to those in the low income brackets.

Further details on the schedule for making them will be announced later.

More than 50 mattresses were made in Merrill last fall.
