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CZECH CONFAB SCHEDULED ON AUGUST 23, 24

MALIN — Delegates to Oregon state conventions of the Czech-American National alliance and the Western Bohemian Fraternal association will gather here for a two-day conference Saturday and Sunday, August 23 and 24. More than 100 are expected to attend. Guests are also expected from out of state points, a delegation of 10 to arrive from Seattle and others from Orland, Chico and Hamilton City in California.

The sessions open Saturday night with a program and dance in the Broadway hall, beginning at 8 o'clock with a concert by the 18-piece Malin band. Other numbers include a calisthenic drill, presentation of the Beseda, Bohemian national dance by a group from Seio and Portland. Music for the dance which begins at 10 o'clock and lasts until 1 a. m. will be furnished by an orchestra composed of musicians from Klamath Falls and Malin. Admission to the program and dance is 55 cents a person, all funds to be sent to Chicago National Bohemian headquarters to be used for war relief.

Delegates will meet Sunday in two separate meetings to hear reports of chapter discussions of the need for continued relief activities. One session will be conducted by a Mr. Stransky, Portland, chairman of the Oregon State Czech-American alliance, the second to be presided over by a Mr. Dolezal, Mills City, chairman of the Western Bohemian Fraternal association.

In attendance also will be Mrs. Devecko, Portland, secretary of the state Czech-American association.

Mrs. C. E. Dennis, Klamath Falls, production chairman of the Klamath county Red Cross, will speak briefly during the program hour Saturday night.

All meetings will be held in the Broadway hall. Dinner for members only will be served between meetings Sunday by ladies of the local unit of the Czech-American association. All other meetings and the program are open to the public.

CCC Camp Breaks Up Near Merrill

MERRILL — Camp Klamath civilian conservation corps station operated here for the past four years as a reclamation unit, was officially disbanded August 15, and 98 men who remained in camp were divided between Camp Bly, Camp Hackamore and Camp Lava Beds.

First Lieutenant O. W. Leonard, commanding officer, was transferred to the Bly camp

where he will succeed Delmar F. Williams as camp commander. Mr. Williams will remain as his assistant.

Mark M. Gentle, educational director, was transferred to Hat Creek camp in Lassen national forest and John Meager, project superintendent, has returned to civilian life in Portland.

Twelve of the enrollees who rated placing on the civil service list were retained by the bureau of reclamation in various capacities.

All movable government property and equipment used at the camp with the exception of the stoves, plumbing and electrical fixtures were returned to headquarters at Medford. Buildings will be kept in repair and a night watchman will guard against depredations. Stoves are being left with a view to using the camp for future government projects, according to Lieutenant Leonard.

Dr. Frank E. Trotman, Merrill, who has acted as camp physician has been transferred to Camp Lava Beds.
