

SENATOR ASKS TAX EXEMPTION ELIMINATION

WASHINGTON, Aug. 22 (AP)—A recommendation that congress wipe out completely all tax exemptions on personal incomes was laid before senate finance committee Thursday by Walter A. M. Cooper, chairman of the taxation committee of the American Institute of Accountants.

Present exemptions are \$2000 for married persons and \$800 for single individuals. The treasury has recommended a reduction to \$1500 and \$750, respectively. In a prepared statement, Cooper, a resident of White Plains, N. Y., also urged that normal income taxes be withheld at the source on all payments of salaries, dividends, interest and other fixed or determinable income. Social security taxes now are collected in a similar manner.

The recommendations, Cooper said, were based on five considerations: 1. The federal government originally set up the income tax "to add a little 'gravy' to the federal revenue." Now, however, the levy is the government's chief revenue producer.

2. "Our defense is being developed to protect the right of everyone to live and to earn any income whatsoever and there is no reason why every person in the United States should not contribute a share of that burden, proportionate to the amount of income, if any."

3. "The imposition of tax on all incomes without exemption would tend to prevent inflation of prices and probably would be more helpful in accomplishing the desired result in that respect than anything heretofore suggested."

4. "The collection at the source would make the problem of collection simpler than it is today."

5. "Elimination of exemption would produce a very substantial amount of revenue."

COURT WILL HEAR OIL TARIFF CASE

SALEM, Aug. 22 (AP)—The state supreme court, which opens its fall term September 2, announced today it would hear arguments September 9 in the oil rate case or three Oregon railroads against Public Utilities Commissioner Ormond R. Bean.

The railroads, the Union Pacific, the Spokane, Portland and Seattle, and the Union Railroad of Oregon, contend that Bean had no authority to suspend his order reducing oil rates between Portland and eastern Oregon, without first holding a hearing on the suspension.

Circuit Judge L. G. Lewelling of Marion county held in favor of the railroads, Bean appealing. Bean, asserting that the original order would have reduced the rates by 44 per cent, said he suspended this order to prevent "entirely unjustified rate charges resulting from a rate war" among railroads, trucking companies and steamboat and barge operators.

NEW VACANCIES DISCLOSED IN ARMY SERVICE

Col. B. H. Hensley, district recruiting officer, US army, for the state of Oregon, announced that authority has been received to enlist an unlimited number of young men for service in the United States army. These new vacancies exist in all branches of the service including the army air corps.

"I think that it is time to clear up one of the questions most frequently asked of recruiting officers," said Col. Hensley, "is it true that the army has an organized educational system is asked by practically every applicant for enlistment. The answer to that is definitely yes. The army has always had a well organized system of education but it was not until the question of national defense became paramount in the daily thoughts of our people that army schools have been brought to their attention."

"I should like to discuss some of the training provided young American youths in the army air corps," continued Col. Hensley. "Our air corps needs airplane mechanics, machinists, welders, instrument specialists, radio operators and repair men, photographers and numerous other mechanically skilled men as well as experts in the culinary arts such as cooks and bakers. Clerks, typists and other men must be trained to handle the administrative details of the air corps. The army teaches upwards of 250 trades but these mentioned herein are some of the most urgently needed."

"Courses in these army technical schools vary from six weeks to many months. The airplane mechanics course is conducted at the air corps technical schools at Scott field, Ill., Chanute field, Ill., and at Grand Central air terminal, Glendale, Calif. These

courses are of 12 weeks or 770 hours duration. They train men in all phases of airplane and airplane engine repair and maintenance.

"This should convince the qualified young man who desires an assured future," stated the colonel, "that the army has a place for him and that without a doubt the best possible training will be provided. Applications are now being accepted for all branches of the service at the local army recruiting station located in room 210, postoffice building. Immediate enlistment may be expected by those qualified. All expenses pertaining to enlistments are paid by the government."
