WITH THE ARMY IN SOUTHWEST WASHINGTON, Aug. 23 Fort Flagler, last bastion of the Puget sound area, fell to the enemy in the Pacific northwest war games last night on the eve of an expected counter-attack by defending soldiers all along the western Washington front.

Forbes Casey and Worden, other points in the triangular sound defenses, had already been captured by the invading force, mythical except for token units of troops representing 10 times their actual number.

CIO steel-workers had picketed the plant of the Republic Steel corporation at Gadsden, Ala., Friday. A union man said a demand had been made for wages approaching those of the Birmingham district, a union shop and the check-off system of dues collection.

The plant management asserted the scale was approximately the same as that at Birmingham, ranging from 55 cents an hour for common labor up to \$3 for the skilled help.

Kearny Plant Idle

There was no estimate of how many of the 4500 employees joined the strike, nor was there an announcement of the settlement terms. At any rate a conference ended the picketing and sent the men back to work.

Kearny and Detroit remained sore spots.

L. H. Korndorff, president of the Federal Shipbuilding and Drydock company, United States Steel subsidiary, which holds \$493,000,000 worth of contracts for fighting and merchant craft, returned from Washington to New York for a possible conference with his associates.

The striking CIO shipbuilders demand a maintenance-of-union contract, under which the firm would be required to discharge union members who failed to pay their union dues. The management has continued for 18 days to say "No" to this. As a result of the failure of workers and owner to agree, there are no hot rivets going into two cruisers, six destroyers and many merchant vessels, and 18,000 workers are idling.

Mayor Edward J. Jeffers of Detroit pondered what to do about the motionless buses and trolley cars, which up until four days ago were hastening men to the big auto plants. The transportation system is the center of a jurisdictional dispute between AFL and CIO unions.

tack. This may have been Odessa, Black sea port, which has been under siege for many days.

A British broadcast, quoting reports from Bucharest, said Rumanian and German troops were within nine miles of Odessa.

On the central front, dispatches to the army newspaper Red Star said incessant counter-attacks had resulted in recapture of nine German-held villages in the past 48 hours and that the Nazi 161st infantry division had been smashed.

Women in Front Line

Red Star said the Germans, driven from fortified positions, were rushing reserves into the battle but that the Russian advance was progressing.

For the first time, Moscow acknowledged that soviet women were taking part in actual front-line fighting in some places.

A bulletin from the German fuhrer's headquarters gave no details of the 63-day-old struggle, declaring briefly:

"Operations on the east front continue according to plan."

In the past, such reticence by the Nazi high command has frequently concurred with stiffening soviet resistance.

forced to risk diplomatic rupture with Germany by expelling all German nationals at once.

(Sources in London indicated Great Britain would stand firm on her demands and was ready to send troops into Iran rather than permit an alleged 3000 German soldiers to remain there. They said Lieut-Gen. Claude J. E. Auchinleck, middle east commander-in-chief, who visited London recently, probably gave Prime Minister Churchill a detailed report of British strength in that area.)

Iranians declared the British-Russian demands were unwelcome, dressing to cover plans to invade the country and establish contacts by which British troops could join Russians on the eastern front.

An official police statement said there were only 840 male Germans in the country and that in the past 45 days 50 of these had left.

Iran has an airforce of less than 300 aircraft.

Mexico Ousts Nazi Consuls In Reprisal

MEXICO CITY, Aug. 23 (UP) — The Mexican government tonight ordered all German honorary consulates in Mexico closed by September 1 in reprisal for a German order closing all Mexican consulates in German-occupied territories.

The German order did not affect Mexican consulates in Germany itself, but the Mexican foreign office voluntarily ordered the closure of the consulate-general at Hamburg and all other Mexican consulates in the reich, all of which were honorary.

Break Close

Likewise, all German consulates in Mexico are honorary. The German legation will not be affected by the Mexican order. There has been no mention of German action against the Mexican legation in Berlin, but the Mexican minister has been called home "to report."

The mutual shutdown of consulates was regarded as putting Mexican-German relations on a precarious footing, close to a complete break.
