Many startling statements were made by Captain Schenck; one of the most amazing being the treatment accorded Japanese prisoners by the Chinese who have been adopting a policy of taking these captured Japanese soldiers to the temples and there administering to each of them an oath not to take up arms or continue to wage war against Buddhists. These oath-bound Buddhists are then released and allowed to filter back into civilian life in Japan and carry the gospel of tolerance and peace with co-religionists.

Captain Schenck told of the high regard in which America is held by the mass of Japanese civilians in contradiction with the desire of the military caste to enter into controversy with our nation. It is his opinion that the emperor will never be prevailed upon to approve war with America because of the pro-American sympathies of the great majority of the civilians.

A sad note was struck when Captain Schenck told of a visit to the great ammunition storage vaults of Germany and seeing the unlimited quantities of heavy shells with the stamp of "Vickers-England" upon them.

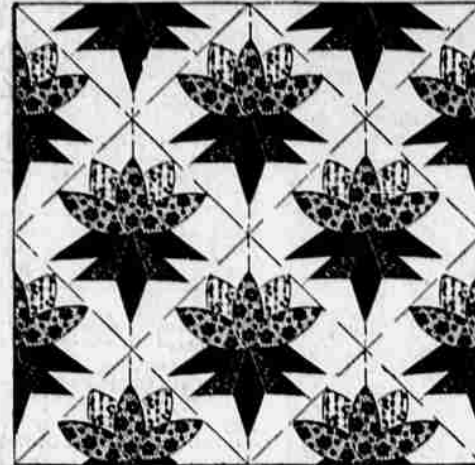

Bombs Too Real; Crowd Sprayed With Burning Phosphorus

BOSTON, Aug. 23 (AP) — Unexpected realism attended an incendiary bomb fighting demonstration on Boston common Thursday night when approximately 20 pounds of phosphorus, exploded by a detonator, sprayed into a crowd of 10,000 persons, slightly burning almost a score.

Five persons were treated at city hospital and the others received first aid from fire department units. Clothing of some was ignited.

For a moment, near panic prevailed as the crowd fell back from the scene amid dense clouds of white smoke released by the explosion. The smoke and sound of the blast startled nearby motorists and caused a half-hour traffic tie-up.

Spectators were standing 80 yards from the explosive, which was set off by a plunger 80 yards away.
