3-MAN BOARD FOR COLUMBIA POWER RAPPED

WASHINGTON, Aug. 25 (AP)—Senator McNary (R-Ore.) said he was in "friendly disagreement" with Senator Bone (D-Wash.) over Bone's proposal to create a Columbia power authority administered by a three-man board instead of a single administrator under authority of the interior department.

McNary said both Bone's bill and the interior department bill introduced by Rep. Hill (D-Wash.) largely followed the terms of the Bonneville act introduced in the senate by McNary in 1934. The senator said the "whole problem" would be carefully considered during the present session of congress. The bills would create an authority to administer the power features of Bonneville and Grand Coulee hydroelectric developments on the Columbia river in Washington and Oregon.

McNary said he and Bone had collaborated for months over the proposed legislation but that he favored the present setup which would continue to keep the Columbia power authority under jurisdiction of the interior department.

He said it was a grave question of how high the power rates would have to be set to make a contribution to the irrigation and reclamation of lands around Grand Coulee in Washington as provided in the Bone bill. He said it also must be determined whether such contributions would come from the receipts for power at Bonneville, from the receipts at Grand Coulee or from receipts at both projects and any other such developments on the Columbia river.

McNary said he and Bone agreed on general provisions of the two bills.

President Lifts Press Restrictions On Iceland Area

WASHINGTON, Aug. 25 (AP)—President Roosevelt lifted restrictions today which had prevented American newspapermen, photographers and radio representatives from going to Iceland.

Stephen Early, presidential secretary, announced that the American and British commanders had reached an agreement under which news, picture and radio men may carry out assignments in the north Atlantic island and that the chief executive approved it today.

When American forces first went to Iceland to start taking over its defenses, the chief executive refused permission for reporters, photographers and commentators to go there on ground that time was needed for adjustment and organization.

TOKYO, Aug. 25 (AP)—The National City bank of New York announced today it would close branches at Kobe and Yokohama at the end of September because freezing orders had reduced business.

COAST STEEL ISSUE BARED AT HEARING

SEATTLE, Aug. 25 (AP)—The Truman senatorial committee investigating defense contracts heard charges at a hearing today that the nation's leading steel companies conspired to prevent establishing steel mills in the Pacific northwest although all ores necessary for northwest production at lower cost than eastern steel are available in this area.

George Watkin Evans, Seattle mining engineer who 40 years ago made an extensive survey of the Pacific coast from Alaska to lower California, told the committee he believed a \$12,000,000 to \$14,000,000 blast furnace in this region to produce steel for the entire western section of United States would be a justifiable expenditure by the government.

Evans said eastern steel men used the west coast for a dumping ground for about 200,000,000 tons of steel "and if I were in the steel business in the east I doubt if I would propose a plant here which would compete with my plant in the east. That just wouldn't be smart business."

U. S. Sen. Harry S. Truman (D-Mo.), committee chairman, then interposed:

"Have they conspired to prevent western people from enjoying the benefits of this gigantic industry the same as the Aluminum Company of America?"

"Absolutely. There is no question about it," Evans replied. "They've used exactly the same tactics."

Committee Member Sen. Mon Wallgren (D-Wash.) said more than half the steel used on the Pacific coast arrives from the Panama canal and Evans responded affirmatively to Wallgren's question whether the west coast "would be completely out of luck for any steel if the canal were blocked."

Evans said there were 63 billion tons of coal in the state of Washington alone — three times as much as in the anthracite mines of Pennsylvania.

QUENTIN CONVICTS GET RADIO IN CELL

SAN QUENTIN, Calif., Aug. 25 (AP)—A radio head-set in every cell—that's Warden Clinton Duffy's latest addition to the scheme of life within San Quentin prison in his efforts to rehabilitate convicts by giving them an interest in the outside world.

For four hours last night the 4,000 prisoners listened to news of the world, comedy dramas and musical programs selected by a committee of 30 inmates and approved by the warden.

The radio system, an \$8,000 job, was paid for entirely out of the prisoners' own library fund. For their opening program last night the convicts chose NBC's "Hour of Charm"—featuring an all-girl orchestra.

The 4,000 head-sets are connected to a master radio which operates nightly from 5 p. m. to 9 p. m., plus a 15 minute news broadcast at 7:30 each morning. Warden Duffy has a microphone in his home, so he can conduct his own radio show for 10 minutes each week.

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'PEEP' PLATOON SCOUTS AHEAD, AIDS CAVALRY

WITH ARMY IN LOUISIANA, Aug. 25 (AP)—The cavalry still swears by its first love, the horse, but finds the animal's effectiveness even more pronounced with mechanized complements, such as the new bantam "peep" platoons.

These light fighting units give the cavalry a deadly punch in modern warfare by doing the cavalry's main job of locating the enemy and vanishing before sentries see them.

Bantam platoons have eight of the army's new midget "peeps," capable of dashing cross-country as well as over roads, so light each crew of four with sub-machine guns can lift one from a manhole, and yet durable enough to mount a 37 mm. gun.

With an armored scout car, the bantam platoon's lieutenant and 38 men go tearing over terrain like the cavalry's horsemen—like chickens around a hen, but with fighting power equal to trading blows with a tank.

"Our bantam tanks can go over ground that tanks can't negotiate," explained Col. Wilfred M. Blunt, commander of the 12th cavalry brigade from Fort Bliss, Texas, participating in the third army maneuvers.

"This makes them ideal for coordinated work with the mounted troops which can go anywhere."

"Other mechanized equipment placed at the disposal of the cavalry during recent times has tremendously increased its effectiveness and individual fighting power."

"But in the 'peeps' we have a machine which works hand in hand with the cavalry and makes it ready for any contingency along a modern fighting front."

CONVOY ARRIVES

LISBON, Portugal, Aug. 25 (AP)—Thirteen British merchantmen had arrived in Lisbon today out of a convoy attacked by a fleet of German submarines, and it was reported that seven other freighters and the British destroyer Eskimo, 1,850 tons, had been sunk.

The convoy was attacked off the Spanish coast. The survivors said there originally were only 20 ships in it, compared with German high command claims that 21 were sunk.
