FAVORITES BAT STRONGLY BUT TRADING DULL

NEW YORK, Aug. 25 (AP)—Favorite stocks batted out a number of hits in today's market but many leaders failed to reach home.
Irregularly higher tendencies prevailed at the start. Dealings were too sluggish, however, to make such gains as appeared particularly impressive. While fractional plus signs were plentiful at the close, there also was an assortment of minor declines and numerous issues were unchanged.
Many pivots never showed on the ticker tape. Douglas Aircraft did not open until the final half hour. It was up 1/4.
The day's turnover of about \$50,000 shares was aided by one block of 19,700 Commonwealth & Southern at Saturday's final quotation of 1/2 of a point.
Richfield oil, a fast mover last week, edged into new high ground for 1941. Ahead at times were Santa Fe, N. Y. Central, Texas Corp., International Paper, Pepsi-Cola, U. S. Steel, Youngtown Sheet, General Motors, United Aircraft, Anaconda and American Telephone.
Among occasional laggards were Consolidated Aircraft, American Smelting, Westinghouse, Eastman Kodak, Sears Roebuck and Allied Chemical.

VETO CUTS WHEAT PRICES IN CHICAGO

CHICAGO, Aug. 25 (AP)—Wheat prices weakened momentarily today after announcement of presidential veto of legislation to freeze government stocks but, when selling failed to expand, dealers who had sold "short" began covering their positions and the market rallied quickly.
Extreme losses of about a cent were converted into net gains of more than a cent but the market reacted again and closed with little change compared with Saturday. Traders said failure of much liquidation to appear on the veto announcement was attributed largely to the fact that a veto had been expected and to unwillingness of owners to sell while new crop loan rates are above the current spot market prices. No large scale country selling is expected as long as this situation prevails. Furthermore, traders said, the government is not expected to dispose of its wheat stocks at any time that such action would have a serious market effect. The president's statement that no one can foresee how soon this wheat may be needed attracted attention.
Wheat closed unchanged to 1/2 higher compared with Saturday, September 1.12, December 1.15 1/2; Corn 1-1/2 lower, September 76 1/2, December 80 1/2-80 1/2; oats 1-1/2 down.

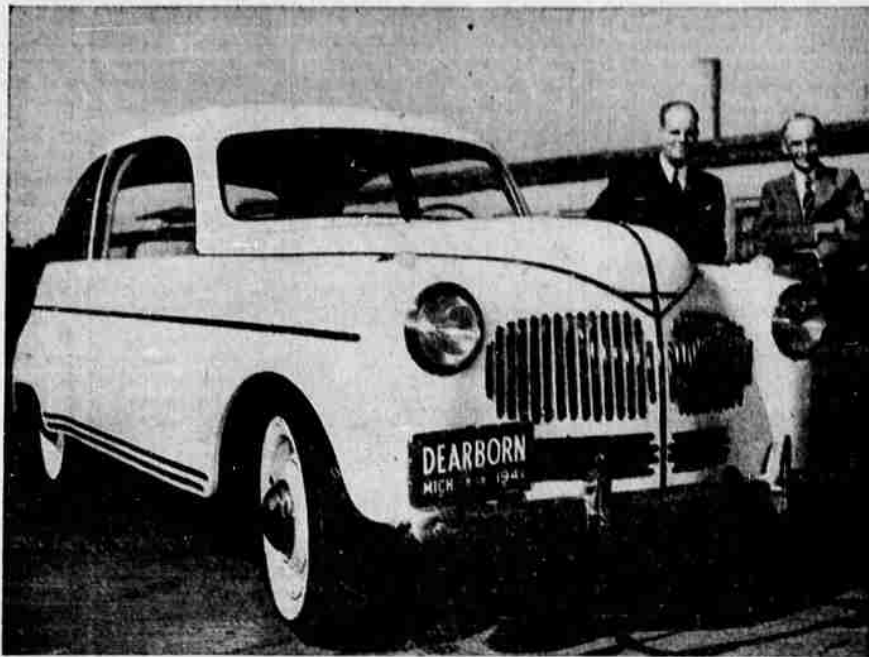
BOSTON WOOL

FORD COMPLETES FIRST PLASTIC AUTO BODY



Henry Ford's intensive effort to bring industry and agriculture into partnership took a long step forward with the completion at Dearborn, Mich., on August 13 of the world's first plastic automobile body. Mr. Ford is shown here with the car and Robert A. Boyer, Ford Motor Company research chemist in charge of plastic development. Several months earlier the pioneer automobile manufacturer promised that someday he would "grow an automobile from the soil." The plastic panels used in this body design have an impact strength 10 times greater than steel. They were made from such ordinary farm crops as wheat, flax, rami, hemp and spruce pulp. The company emphasized that the plastic body is still in an experimental stage and that substitution for the conventional steel body on a production scale may take months.

Grand Slam Robert Whips Picard To Inspire Victory Over Ryders

DETROIT, Aug. 25 (AP)—Bobby Jones, golf's 39-year-old elder statesman from Georgia, was back in the thick of his former glory today after his 2-and-1 victory over Henry Picard turned the tide against Capt. Walter Hagen's Ryder cup team in a two-day charity match at the Detroit Golf Club.

The stocky Georgian, once master of them all, emerged from virtual retirement after 10 years and yesterday provided the ounce of inspiration that hoisted his team of challengers to an 8 1/2-6 1/2 victory—the first ever scored over Hagen's Ryder coppers.

Jones was four down at the end of the first nine holes, but that was the depth of his humility. He fought back to even terms at the 18th and moved ahead 2 up in the next nine. Once again on the homeward stretch he lost a hole, but made it up to close out the match on the 35th.

Other victors for the challengers were Craig Wood, national open champion, who drubbed Vic Ghezzi, national PGA titleholder, 3 and 2; Ben Hogan, who defeated Byron Nelson, 2 up; Jimmy Demaret, winner over Paul Runyan, 5 and 4; Clayton Heafner, who defeated Horton Smith, 7 and 6; and Denny Shute who downed Harold (Jug) McSpaden, 4 and 3.

Campus Fusser Captures Mile At Longacres

SEATTLE, Wash., Aug. 25 (AP)—Washington's most impressive racing laurel came home to a Washington-bred horse for the first time yesterday as Mrs. B. N. Hutchinson's Campus Fusser captured the \$10,000 Longacres mile.

With the sensational apprentice, Ferrill Zuffelt, up for the last time before attaining full jockey status, Campus Fusser roared home with a record-equaling time of 1:35 3/5. This duplicated the track record set by the Ringer Blue Boot (Exotude) in 1935. The three-year-old Washington horse was ahead from post to post and finished more than a length ahead of Wee Toney, with whom he was paired as an entry in the betting. Count Valiant, entered in the hope of a soft track, finished third, and Olimpo, an Argentine-bred horse, fourth.

Black Noses Win in West Canada Open

VANCOUVER, B. C., Aug. 25 (AP)—Kenny Black, Canadian amateur champion from Vancouver, aided by a hole in one in morning play came in in 67-71 Saturday to nose out Stan Leonard, Calgary professional, for the \$1000 western Canada open golf championship. Black's 72-hole total was 281.

The new champion's five-under-par 67 in morning play was almost nullified when he faded badly in the final holes of the second round. With a possible 67 facing him, he blew up on the 17th to go one over par and then got in two bunkers on the 18th to card a six for the final hole.
