GOP COHESION ADVOCATED BY WOMAN LEADER

Matters in regard to the republican party were discussed earnestly by Mrs. George T. Gerlinger, republican national committeewoman for Oregon, and Mrs. Grace Wells of this city, vice chairman of the republican state central committee, when they met together here last weekend.

The necessity of women throughout the nation, who really care to preserve the American way of life, working to continue the two-party system through strengthening the republican party, was stressed by Mrs. Gerlinger.

"An immediate state problem," the committeewoman said, "is the necessity of pulling party forces together now for the important state and national elections of 1942. With Senator Charles L. McNary a candidate to succeed himself and, for the first time in Oregon, four congressmen to elect, there should be a determined effort made all over the nation, as well as in Oregon, to send back to Washington men of convictions and courage, who will not be mere rubber stamps as so many congressmen have proved."

"Women should organize, contribute services and money, and work as they have never before done through party channels if they are to fulfill the trust placed in them a few years ago when men generously gave them the right to participate as equals in politics."

"It should be noted that in countries conquered by the nazis that the first act of the conquerors is to outlaw all such beneficial organizations as labor unions, political and fraternal groups of every kind, religious and racial cleavages. And when the nations are in the process of being conquered, through internal strife within these groups, deliberately fostered by those who wish to rule, the most important political groups are the first target of attack. Republicans in this country, by their lack of cohesion, have allowed themselves to be sabotaged."

LAND CLAIMS UP IN U. S. HEARING

Eight land claims on a pumice plain within boundaries of the Deschutes national forest were involved in a hearing Tuesday before United States Commissioner Bert C. Thomas in the case of the United States vs. L. G. Dawson. The forest service was represented by C. L. Stewart.

The hearing ended in mid-afternoon after testimony was heard from five witnesses appearing for the government. Dawson did not testify and no witnesses appeared for him in the case, according to the commissioner.

The claims, located in sections 17 and 20, township 27, SR 8 E., were contested by the government in an effort to prove there is not sufficient mineral value in the land to warrant the claims. A transcript of the case will be forwarded to the Lakeview land office for decision.
