LAKE COUNTY IN READINESS FOR BIG SHOW

LAKEVIEW—Everything is in readiness for a real western roundup at Lakeview with bucking broncos, brahma steers, and all the fixin's that go to make up a successful show, according to Lon Denio, chairman of the committee in charge of the 22nd annual Lakeview roundup to be held this weekend on Saturday, Sunday, and Labor day.

There will be buckers from Max Barbour's string which have no regard for man or beast and the riders will have to look to their laurels when they sign up for the three day events. Barbour is also bringing the Brahmas, roping steers, and dogging steers. Quincy Baker of Beatty is furnishing the bareback horses, and Art Garrett of Lakeview will bring in the calves for the boys' riding and roping events.

The opening of events at the grounds each day has been called for 12:30 because of the extra time that is expected necessary for the parade of horsemen to the grounds and the arena presentations.

Two nights of dancing with an imported band to furnish the music are promised for Saturday and Sunday nights. A circus and various fun concessions are among the fun activities when the arena show is over for the day.

Activities will open Friday evening with the coronation of the queen and the pageant, starting at 8 o'clock. Many early visitors are expected to take advantage of this phase of the show which has been moved up a week from its usual date.

The big Labor day parade is scheduled for Monday at 9:30. Floats will be entered from commercial, fraternal and industrial organizations and this event will take up most of Monday morning until time to go to the grounds.

In addition to the many events lined up for the roundup the lake county fair exhibits can be viewed at the roundup grounds during the three days.

A full weekend is promised and a cordial invitation extended to all Lake county neighbors to pack up and leave all cares and spend a real bang-up weekend.

TULELAKE HIGH SET TO START ON LABOR DAY

TULELAKE—Classes in the Tulelake high school will begin on Labor day, Sept. 1, according to an announcement made this week by George Reiben, principal, who is vacationing in Seattle and points north.

The faculty list will include one more teacher this term than last, with 10 registered for classes. Spanish I and II, Latin I and II and girls' physical education will be taught by Miss Chiarucci; Miss Miller will teach English, II, III and IV in addition to public speaking.

Clyde Frishholz will instruct classes in U. S. history, biology, geometry, senior problems, boys' physical education and will coach boys' athletics.

Harold Schilling, who taught last year in the elementary building, will teach general science, English I, boys' physical education, C and D basketball and social living.

C. W. Elmore will teach chemistry, physics, algebra II, solid geometry, trigonometry and music. Bookkeeping, typing and shorthand will be under the direction of Miss Putnam, and Miss Clark will instruct in home making, sewing, cooking and art subjects.

Mr. Hemstreet, agricultural instructor, will teach his classes this year in a new room in the shop building; Mr. Nolte will have shop and mechanical drawing and Principal Reiben will teach classes in algebra I and general mathematics.

One new subject is being added to the curriculum this year, senior problems, primarily for those students who do not intend to go to college. The new subject will deal largely with problems a graduate faces after graduation.

Faculty members will be at the high school Saturday afternoon, August 30, to confer with students or parents.

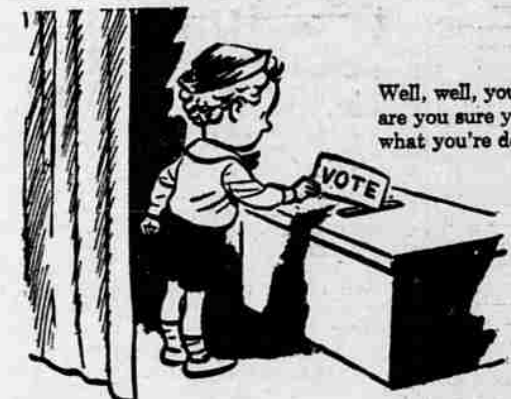

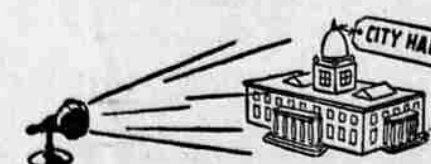
