CONDON, Ore., Aug. 27 (AP)—James Harvey Thomas, 19-year-old sailor, was convicted last night by a circuit court jury of the hitchhiking slaying of Douglas F. Smith, Aberdeen, near Arlington, Ore., June 11.

The jury deliberated 44 hours before returning its finding of murder in the first degree. Judge Carl Hendricks said he would pronounce sentence today.

FARM PRICES UP IN BUMPER FACE

CORVALLIS, Aug. 27 (AP)—Farmers are experiencing the unusual sensation of having prices for their products rising in the face of abundant crops. L. R. Breithaupt, extension economist at Oregon State college, said today.

In the past year prices have advanced more rapidly than costs, so that the exchange value of farm products has increased from an index of 75 in July 1940 to 94 per cent of the 1910-1914 average for July, 1941. This places the general exchange value of farm products slightly above the 1926-1930 average for the first time in many years, Breithaupt pointed out.

The combined production of chief cannery vegetables—green peas, snap beans, sweet corn and tomatoes—is expected to be 17 per cent above 1940 and 57 per cent above the 1930-1939 average.

Milk Price Change May Be Announced

SALEM, Aug. 27 (AP)—The state milk control board, which heard farmers at a hearing here yesterday ask that the milk price be increased from 11 to 13 cents a quart, said today its decision might be announced by next Monday.

The dairymen, asking for a raise from 60 cents to 80 cents per pound butterfat, said the increase is needed because their production costs have increased.

PLANS TO INSURE '42 FOOD TALKED

WASHINGTON, Aug. 26 (AP)—The agriculture department Monday called regional conferences to consider plans to insure the production of sufficient food in 1942 both for the United States and "for countries resisting aggression."

Representative of the agriculture department, state farm planning committees, state farm defense boards, farm organizations and other agencies will participate in the meetings, which will be held in September.

Secretary Wickard plans to attend each of the conferences which will last two days. Arrangements have been made for representatives from all the 48 states to attend.

Among the places and dates where the conferences will be held and the states to participate: Salt Lake City, Utah, September 15 and 16—Washington, Oregon, Idaho, Montana, Wyoming, Colorado, Utah, Nevada, California, Arizona and New Mexico.

BEST WEST WOOL AUCTION SALE ON

SALT LAKE CITY, Aug. 27 (AP)—An auction sale that presents to prospective buyers in one group the best sheep western America has to offer was renewed Tuesday for the 26th time.

Conducted by the National Wool Growers Association, the sale is the largest of its type in the nation, says Secretary F. R. Marshall, and makes it unnecessary for a buyer to travel over many states in order to find the best stock.

Seventeen hundred animals were in the pens for this year's two-day auction.

Fifty growers from 12 western states and two provinces of Canada, sent sheep to the sale. Buyers were on hand from 25 states.

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BAN ON 'LUXURY' HOMES EXPECTED

SEATTLE, Aug. 27 (AP)—A representative of a national hardware and tool firm told a meeting of the Seattle Master Builders Monday night that a federal ban on "luxury" homes, with a \$6000 ceiling on residence construction, may be expected soon, the Seattle Times said today.

The speaker, along with others who told of expected forthcoming drastic curtailment of new home equipment because of metal shortages, requested that his name not be used, the Times said.

The newspaper quoted him: "I have been informed by our home office, which has been communicating with officials in Washington, D. C., and with the OPM, that in the near future we can expect that a \$6000 ceiling will be placed on the cost of home construction and that there will be no more 'luxury' homes built for the duration of the national emergency."
