

NATION'S ALL-AMERICANS READY FOR BIG DATE

(Frits) Crisler, Michigan; Homer Norton, Texas A. and M.; Lynn Waldorf, Northwestern, and Orin (Babe) Hollingbery, Washington State. The ticket sale has been the greatest in the eight-year history of the game and more than 93,000 are expected to see the 1941 battle on Chicago's lake front.

Pass Attack Planned By All-Stars Tonight

College Gridders Figure Aerial Try Only Way To Resist Chicago Bears

CHICAGO, Aug. 28 (UP)—Football's college All-Stars, seeking the path of easiest resistance against the Chicago Bears' famed forward wall, prepared to use a forward pass attack in Soldier's field tonight.

A crowd of 93,000 persons is expected to watch the annual contest between hand-picked collegians and the world's professional champions.

Head Coach Carl Snavely, Cornell's exponent of deft of fence, stressed the passing attack as he sent his charges through a final drill today. He admitted it would be folly to hammer too long at a line embracing a ton and a half of football's toughest defenses.

Good Men
Not that the All-Stars lack balance. With runners like Michigan's Tom Harmon, Minnesota's George Franck, Stanford's Norm Standlee and UCLA's Jackie Robinson, their ground game under normal conditions would just don't provide normal conditions. Despite Coach George Halas' laudatory appraisal of his champions, they are the same boys who rolled up a 73-0 win over Washington in the profes-

sional playoff last year, and they still pack that terrible "T" formation.

The pros' fears that Sid Luckman, the Bears' signal-caller had damaged an ankle too seriously to play were dispelled when Luckman proclaimed himself ready to go.

Passing Team
If passing will penetrate the professional fortress, the collegians may get the job done, for they boast Missouri's Paul Christman, Charley O'Rourke of Boston college and Southern Methodist's Ray Mallouf. In Dave Rankin, the All-Star captain from Indiana, they have one of the nation's best receivers.

The experts who know professional football say if the Bears cut loose they'll make a sham out of a spectacle. But Halas has no such fancy. He has the odds-makers price of 31 to 1 for his club are out of line. Some of the Bears' standouts for next season will be in the All-Star lineup, including Standlee and possibly Harmon. In the series which began in 1934, the professional teams hold a margin, three victories to two for the All-Stars, with two games tied.

Ex-Champs Routed in Match Play

Unknowns Bounce Out Favorites Chapman, Goodman, Alexander

FIELD CLUB, Omaha, Neb., Aug. 28 (UP)—A dozen unheralded golfers Wednesday routed the medalist, 3 former champions and a host of favorites as the field in the national amateur tournament was cut from 64 to 16 in two "sudden death" rounds of match play.

It was one of the wildest first days of match play in the 45-year history of the meet.

The unknowns played like champions and the favorites fell in waves. Defending Champion Dick Chapman of Mamaroneck, N. Y., bounced out in the first round. So did Johnny Goodman, the home town hero, who has won both the national amateur and open championships, and who was the sentimental favorite to capture the simon pure title again.

Haverstick Does It
Medalist Stewart (Skip) Alexander of Burlington, N. C., ousted former champion Johnny Fischer of Cincinnati in the first round, then fell himself in the second, Harry Haverstick Jr., a tough competitor from Lancaster, Pa., eliminating him.

Only four names synonymous with championship golf were among the 16 survivors. They were Marvin (Bud) Ward of Spokane, Wash.; Harry Todd, of Dallas, Texas; Ray Billows, the putting genius from Poughkeepsie, N. Y., and Pat Abbott of Palisades, Calif.

Lou Jennings, 24-year-old bookkeeper in a Portland Ore.,

bank, made his national amateur debut by drubbing Chapman, 3 and 4.
In the second round, Jennings defeated veteran Rodney Bliss Jr., of Omaha, 4 and 3.
Bob Riegel, of Houston, Texas, started the upsets by eliminating

Goodman 1 up on the 20th hole when Goodman bunkered his 19 shot and hit a clump of trees with his recovery. Riegel promptly went into another extra hole match, outlasting Lyn Lardner Jr., Oconomowoc, Wis., 1 up in 19 holes.
