Knudsen Defines OPM As Sales Engineers of U. S.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 27 — Big Bill Knudsen himself has thus far given the best definition of what the office of production management, which he heads, really is and what it really does. Knudsen calls OPM the government's "sales engineers."

In applying that label Knudsen characterizes perfectly the shortcomings and limitations under which his organization must work. It makes no contracts itself, leaving that to the army and navy. It can only consult, advise and recommend. As such, it has admittedly done the best it could.

When the first money was appropriated just a year ago, OPM was told the goal was to have arms and supplies for 1,300,000 men by June of 1941, but here it is only the end of August, 1941, the army has 1,500,000 men already, and the lease-lend program has been thrown on top of that. More than \$48 billion worth of defense expenditures has been authorized, \$8 billion have been actually spent, 2,500,000 men are employed in defense industries. While that's only about 6 or 7 per cent of the total non-agricultural employment, another 1,500,000 workers are undergoing defense labor training, so the force is really 4,000,000.

There is talk about reorganizing OPM by presidential order, giving it more authority. That may come any day now, but when Knudsen was asked if OPM could do a better job if he had some real authority his answer was "God only knows."

The Rub in a Month
Regardless of reorganization, the pinch of defense is going to start squeezing hard on civilian production within the next 30 days. It has been feared before, it can be predicted with a certainty now.

At least 10 industries are going the way of the aluminum utensil industry — which is to the scrap heap — for duration of the emergency. There just doesn't seem to be any other way out.

Listing the temporarily doomed industries brings you

these common everyday things you'll have to learn to do without if you need new equipment, or get by on with what you have:

Washing machines, electrical household appliances, refrigerators, commercial laundry equipment, air conditioning equipment, heaters and ranges, light fixtures and appliances, metal furniture, kitchen equipment, dry cleaners' equipment.

You have to go into only a few of those to see how continuation of their production on a normal basis cuts across the defense effort. A 30 per cent cut has already been levied against the washing machine industry. Steel sheet aprons and shields have been eliminated. Plastics have been substituted where possible, but there's a shortage of plastics. All electric appliances shine resplendently with chrome and nickel, but all the chrome and nickel that can be produced is earmarked for defense. Steel furniture is now using 1,200,000 tons of steel a year, and that is needed for defense. And so it goes, right down the list.

More Aid for Industry
The big job, of course, is to shift the plants that have been making these things and the men working in those plants over to defense industry or to substitute.

It is to help in this reallocation that the OPM has reorganized its defense contract service under Robert L. Mehornay of Kansas City and William E. Lewis of Toledo. A genuine effort is to be made to help the little fellow, the sub-contractor and the independent manufacturer who face closing their shops because they can't get materials to continue their normal

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business or because they haven't been able to get a piece of the defense job.

Some of the steps the new DCS will take to relieve the admittedly bad situation include non-opening for normal bids on army or navy contracts for 15 days from date of call, instead of five days, in order to give more time for blueprints and specifications to be studied by the 36 branch offices. Calls for bids for large quantities will be broken down to permit smaller concerns to bid for appropriate quantities.

Bidders on contracts of more than \$50,000 value will be required to state minimum percentage of the job which they will sub-contract.

Finally, no new machine tools will be given contractors as long as there are idle machine tools in plants able to handle subcontracting, within a reasonable distance.
