

CENSURE MOVE IS TABLED AT VFW CONCLAVE

PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 28 (AP)—The Veterans of Foreign Wars has come through the first flare-up of its 42nd national encampment by tabling a resolution to censure "any and all organizations" attempting to undermine U. S. foreign policy.

The action followed a plea to President Roosevelt to outlaw jurisdictional strikes in defense industries as un-American and to forfeit exemption of defense employees from selective service if they strike.

The veterans also unanimously called upon the president to dispense with services of Secretary of Labor Francis Perkins because she "has demonstrated her lack of ability to handle the position she holds." They petitioned congress to declare the communist party a non-political organization and bar it from the ballot.

Louis E. Starr, Oregon department commander, set off the foreign policy controversy yesterday by offering the censure resolution with a favorable report on it by the VFW Americanization committee which he heads.

The resolution cited the accusation of National Commander Joseph C. Menendez that "certain organizations" were failing to cooperate with the government on national policy.

Menendez recently suspended Earl Southard, Illinois department commander and secretary of the Citizens Keep America Out of War committee, on charges of disloyalty to his oath of allegiance to the government. Southard seeks to have the convention void the action.

Captain Mays officially dismissed the already dismissed company when he learned the reason. He had halted the unit on a big ant bed.

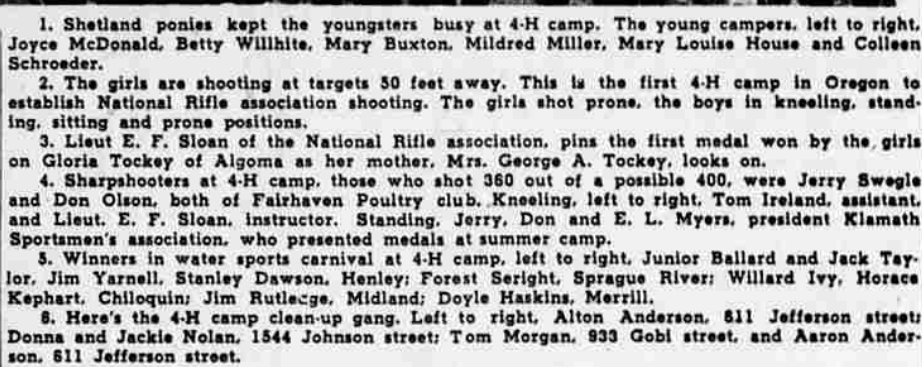
JOYRIDE

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Backwash of War Told in Geneva's Red Cross Files

(Editors note: The center of mercy in a world of war is now, as often before, the International Headquarters of the Red Cross at Geneva, Switzerland. Out of the files and reports of its burdened body of workers, Betty Sargent has put together for readers of the special news service a graphic picture of the backwash of war in Europe today.)

GENEVA (Correspondence of the Special News Service)—If you would know of the misery and suffering and heartache in a modern warring world, you must go to a building which was dedicated to a peace that failed.

For the present home of the International Red Cross Prisoners' bureau once housed the League of Nations assemblies.

There, impersonally recorded on colored filing cards, you will find 8,000,000 stories of the fate of prisoners of war, of sick and wounded, of civilians interned in belligerent countries, of refugees.

You will learn from the cards how some of these people have died, and their families have been informed; how others have exchanged news with their relatives; how food packages were sent to this or that prisoner.

Others of those colored cards say only: "family asks information; last heard from on Maginot front."

The cards are the work of a bureau which already has surpassed the total of its work during the 1914-18 war.

At the end of May this year—19 months after war began—10,000,000 letters and inquiries had been received or sent by the war prisoners' bureau, as compared with a total of barely 3,000,000 letters and inquiries received or sent at the end of four years of war in 1918.

France's military collapse, followed by the Italian-Greek war, Germany's Balkan campaign, and now the war in Russia has put a colossal task on the shoulders of the International Red Cross.
