SPECIALTIES STRONG, KEEP MARKET ALIVE

NEW YORK, Aug. 29 (AP)—Strength of an assortment of specialties kept the stock market alive today and helped offset lagging tendencies displayed by many leaders.

As the exchange will recess Monday for Labor day, many commission house customers made an early get-away for vacation resorts.

Transfers were under the 350,000 share mark.

Japanese dollar bonds jumped briskly after their recent slump. War news was undisturbing. Business prospects brought in bids for a number of shares.

The list was notably hesitant at the opening and mild irregularity continued to the close. There were a few gains of 1 to 3 points and losses of as much as 3 or so in scattered instances.

In the stock section Consolidated Aircraft edged into new high ground for the year on word the company planned a 100 per cent stock dividend. Others at new tops for 1941 included American Woolen preferred, American Commercial Alcohol and Schenley. Douglas Aircraft made headway, along with Standard Oil (NJ) and National Distillers.

WHEAT SLIPS DOWN FROM PEAK LEVEL

CHICAGO, Aug. 29 (AP)—Wheat prices slid down from four-year peak levels today with losses that amounted to as much as 18 cents at one stage but later recovered part of the decline.

Other grains followed, rye and oats showing extreme losses of a cent or more while corn eased only fractionally, being supported by good industrial and shipping demand and reports that the government may raise its offering prices.

The market was unsettled by temporary suspension of trading in land and cottonseed oil futures following an order of the price administrator forbidding purely speculative dealings in fats and oils. Soybeans, which recently have derived much support from advancing land and cottonseed oil prices, tumbled more than 3 cents. There was no indication when trading in land and oil would be resumed but exchange officials were scheduled to go to Washington to confer with government authorities.

Wheat closed 1-1/2c lower than yesterday, September 1.13 1/2, December 1.17 1/4-1/2; corn 1c off to 1c up, September 77 1/4-1/2, December 81 1/4-1/2; oats 1-1/2c lower.

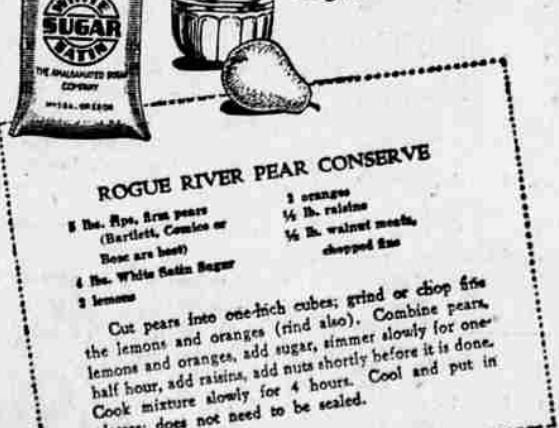

Wives Can Help National Defense With Good Meals

If the man of your house "works with his muscles" all day long, you can make his work easier and do your part for national defense by giving him the food he needs to do his job. Let the "Nutrition Yardstick," the list of foods one should eat every day for good health, be your guide, but remember that the hard work he does requires a diet high in complete protein — which means meat, fowl or fish, so go easy on the cream puffs.

Hard muscular labor can be compared to small fires started all over a forest. If fire fighters immediately extinguish the fires and plant young trees a future forest is saved. The same is true of the body. Every time a man lifts a shovel of dirt he burns up part of the muscle, destroying the tissue that keeps it going. An adequate supply of the complete proteins found in meat distinguishes the blaze and rebuilds the tissues.

Here is a typical day's menu for a laboring man:

BREAKFAST — Grapefruit juice, scrambled chipped beef and eggs, whole-wheat cereal, toast, jelly, coffee, milk.

LUNCH — Braised chuck steak, smothered cabbage, New England potatoes, baking powder biscuits, chocolate pudding, milk.

DINNER — Oyster chowder, hamburger casserole, pickled beets, creamed potatoes, banana-orange salad, berry tart, coffee, milk.

HAMBURGER CASSEROLE
(Four Servings)

One 8-ounce package macaroni, 1/2 cup minced onion, 1 cup minced green pepper, 2 tablespoons shortening, 1 1/2 pounds of ground lamb, 1 teaspoon pepper.

4 tablespoons grated cheese, 1 cup hot medium white sauce, 1 cup canned tomatoes.

Cook macaroni in boiling salted water until tender; drain. Sauté onion and green pepper in shortening until tender. Add

meat to onion and pepper and cook, stirring frequently, for 15 minutes. Add salt and pepper. Add half of the grated cheese to white sauce, then gradually add tomatoes, stirring constantly. Arrange alternate layers of macaroni, lamb, and tomato sauce in a well-buttered casserole. Sprinkle with remaining cheese. Bake uncovered, in a moderate oven (375 deg. F.) for 30 minutes.
