## Portland Milk Prices Boosted

**PORTLAND, Aug. 30 (P)**—The state milk control board boosted Portland area milk, cream and butterfat prices today, effective September 1, giving consumers "the whole jolt" at once.

Four per cent milk prices were increased 2 cents, from 12 to 14 cents per quart; 5 per cent milk 3 cents from 13 to 16 cents, and coffee and whipping cream 2 cents, the former to 50 cents per quart. Butterfat prices went up from 65 to 80 cents per pound.

The board, which discussed gradual increases yesterday, apparently decided against them.

The document said that the peoples of nations abroad which have suffered abuse believed in America and "pray daily that America will save itself by helping greatly to defeat Hitlerism."

taxes" it would impose new levies on the man who buys an automobile or a saxophone, an electric light bulb or a washing machine.

It would lower existing income tax exemptions from \$2000 to \$1500 for married persons and from \$800 to \$750 for single individuals, thus bringing more than 6,000,000 additional persons under the federal income tax structure.

"This bill is unfortunate but necessary," declared Senator Johnson (D-Col.). "We did manage to spread the burden of taxation. The bill has been a headache to us and it will be a heartache to the taxpayers. 'Nobody likes a tax bill and there is nothing nice that can be said about it. But it is necessary.'"

Senator George (D-Ga.), chairman of the finance committee, expressed the opinion that "the treasury estimate of \$3,672,400,000 is too low; the legislation will yield about \$4,000,000,000 a year."

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Britain must increase her own war production.

Britons cannot be content, he added, "until our men command in every army weapons which in design and execution are fully the match for the best the enemy can do."

Eden also advised Europe to choose the British-American peace as formulated at the Roosevelt-Churchill Atlantic conference over Adolf Hitler's "new order" as stressed at his secret meeting with Benito Mussolini on the Russian war front.

The eight-point declaration of President Roosevelt and Prime Minister Churchill, he said, "establishes principles which will be equally valid for all nations" and "excludes all idea of hegemony or zone leadership in the east or west."

## Germans Claim Nearly 80 Red Ships Sunk

**MOSCOW, Aug. 30 (P)**—The red army reported today it had brought the German offensive toward Moscow to a standstill and had swept back some German forces in battles which cost the nazis 10,000 dead and wounded.

Frontline dispatches said that battlefields west of the soviet capital had become a deep series of trenches, anti-tank barriers, mine-fields and barbed wire over which torrential rain was pouring.

Fighting continued along the entire front but soviet reports indicated that the center was attempting to press in on both flanks.

**MOSCOW, Aug. 30 (P)**—Tass, official soviet news agency, today circulated a dispatch, dated yesterday, from Tallinn, reporting that the Estonian capital still was in soviet hands.

(The Germans, claiming capture of the Gulf of Finland port yesterday, said German forces stormed and took it in the early morning.)

Tallinn, according to the news agency dispatch, was then leading an "intense fighting life" with a people's army backing the red army and "determined to die rather than surrender the city to the blood-thirsty fascists."
