

## Eunice Curtis to Lecture in Klamath

Recognized Authority on Flower Arrangement to Spend Week Here With Garden Group

Plans are complete for the appearance here of Eunice Curtis, recognized authority on flower arrangement, who comes to Klamath Falls from Seattle, Washington, under the auspices of the garden study group of the Women's Library club.

Mrs. Curtis will give private lessons on Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday, September second, fourth, and sixth, at ten o'clock in the morning in the small club rooms of the city library. Lectures are scheduled for Wednesday and Friday, September third and fifth, at two o'clock.

Those who wish to attend the lessons are advised a fee will be asked, and those who attend the lectures may be admitted on presentation of garden group membership cards.

Of special interest, with the approach of fall and holidays, is the series of Christmas lectures which will include "Holiday Tables," "Charm Strings and Garland," and "The Traditional Wreath in Variety." Utilizing natural cones and a variety of greens, Mrs. Curtis will show in detail how to achieve original and festive decorations for the holiday season. With the Klamath basin in a natural wealth of greens for making such wreaths, it is hoped that many women will attend these lectures. "The Design of Plant Material" will also be included in Mrs. Curtis' program.
