## NUTRITION TALKED BY DEFENSE UNIT

The organization meeting of the Lake county nutrition committee for defense was held in Lakeview Thursday, August 28. Mary Belle Beswick, home management supervisor for the farm security administration in Klamath and Lake counties was named chairman, and Miss Mildred Blackburn, Lake county welfare administrator, was named secretary.

Attending were representatives of the FSA, county health organization, state health organization, county schools, welfare committee, Women's club, extension department, 4-H clubs and the county judge.

This nutrition committee is part of the national defense program, headed by Paul V. McNutt. The objects of the county committees are to coordinate the efforts of all organizations within a county on nutritional problems so the health and welfare of the people will be improved through better nutritional practices. The county nutrition committees hope to promote wider distribution and utilization of inexpensive foods of high nutritional value, and the use of larger amounts of protective foods, and to encourage food habits which will improve the diets of all income levels.

The Lake county committee agree that more emphasis shall be placed on the school lunch program in that area. Miss Beswick called the next meeting for 10 a. m., September 17.
