

ASHLAND PAPER PREDICTS WORK ON ARMY CAMP

The Ashland Tidings this week carried a story by Managing Editor G. M. Green predicting that contracts will be advertised within 30 days for construction of the army cantonment for Jackson county.

Writing from San Francisco, Green said he visited various officials in the city who would make no outright statements but gave him the definite belief that things are about to "pop" on the Medford cantonment.

One official, Green said, explained that plans for the cantonment are practically completed and emphasized that foundation work and basic construction should be finished before the winter rains.

"When asked if construction plans indicated any possibility that the cantonment would be permanent," Green wrote, "the official very plainly answered 'No.'"

Green was told the cantonment would be merely "splinter construction," or ordinary temporary barracks.

Youth Held in Theft of Auto

President Roosevelt, who has the authority to appoint an emergency fact finding board. No strike may be put into effect until at least 30 days after this board has made its report.

The five big operating brotherhoods stand adamant for a 30 per cent increase in the basic rates of pay. Fourteen non-operating unions want increases which will boost the wages of their members from 30 to 34 cents an hour. The non-operating unions, embracing approximately 900,000 workers, have set Sept. 11 as the date for a strike. The operating brotherhoods planned to set their date within three or four days.

After reciting the history of attempts to settle the dispute, the mediation board's statement said in part:

"It developed yesterday that mediation, in the judgment of the board, was no longer helpful. As a consequence, under the law, the board requested the parties to enter into agreements to arbitrate their differences. The board was unable to bring the parties into agreement to arbitrate."

New Site Chosen For Astoria Span; Klamath Job Let

PORTLAND, Sept. 5 (AP)—The long-planned bridge over the Columbia river from Astoria to Point Ellice on the Washington side, is now slated to cross 10 miles east of Tongue Point, the state highway commission was told yesterday.

The change in location of the proposed toll structure would reduce the cost from \$8,000,000 to about \$3,100,000, L. B. Sandblast, attorney for the Oregon-Washington bridge board of trustees, said.

The commission's advisory committee on travel and information recommended that \$100,000 be budgeted again for advertising with the provision that the sum be reduced if a gasoline shortage should restrict tourist travel.

Plans for celebration of the Old Oregon Trail centennial in 1943 were discussed with Philip H. Parrish, centennial committee chairman, Portland; J. R. Raley, Pendleton, and K. L. Hicks, The Dalles.

A number of bids were rejected. Among the awards was: Klamath county—Beatty-Paradise creek rock production project on Klamath Falls-Lakeview highway. A. S. Wallace, Roseburg, \$23,372.

Lovejoy Called To Army Duty

PORTLAND, Sept. 5 (AP)—Clifford O. Lovejoy of Medford, operator of stores in Bend, Medford, Klamath Falls, Roseburg, Grants Pass and Redding, Calif., has been called into the army. Col. J. J. Fulmer, executive of the second military area, said today.

Lovejoy holds a first lieutenant's commission and will be stationed at Fort Lewis in the quartermaster corps.

Police Dog Jumps Canyon Guardrail

BEND, Sept. 5 (AP)—The \$500 police dog of Mrs. L. B. Wallbridge of San Francisco was found of jumping fences. Yesterday state police revealed that he mistook the guardrail at the Peter Skene Ogden park for a fence and jumped it, falling to his death in the 300-foot-deep Crooked River canyon. Mrs. Wallbridge asked officers to determine whether the animal might have survived the fall. They found the dog crushed on the rocks in the gorge bottom.

FALLERS MEET ON KESTERSON DISPUTE

A meeting Friday afternoon of 18 sets of Klamath Timber company fallers was scheduled to determine the outcome of a work stoppage at the Kesterson Lumber company's woods operation which has prevented the camp from resuming operation after a wet weather shutdown.

The Kesterson camp, which halted work a week ago because of heavy rains, was to open again this weekend. Fallers, however, were reported to have refused to return pending a settlement of their claim that company log scales on 68,000 feet of timber were short.

According to an authoritative spokesman, three check scalers Wednesday and Thursday went over the timber in question and found the company figures were only 800 feet shy — an approximate 1.2 per cent.

It was said the fallers had believed a greater discrepancy had existed.

The meeting was being held in the International Woodworkers of America (CIO) hall at 919 Klamath avenue.

Meanwhile, it was announced Friday that a national labor relations board bargaining agency for employees of the Crater Lake Box company has been ordered by the board for the Kesterson camp as an outcome of a representation hearing held here a month ago.

The poll must be held within 30 days of September 3, according to the board order. Both the CIO and AFL will appear on the ballot.

Man Dies in City Jail Early Friday

Jess Allen, 58, died in the city jail at 8:10 a. m. Friday. Allen, a one-armed transient, was arrested on a drunkenness charge at Fifth and Main streets Thursday afternoon. Officers said they believed Allen had been drinking heavily for nearly a month.

Russia's two other beleaguered big cities—Kiev, the Ukrainian capital on whose approaches the Germans are attempting to attack, and Odessa, the Black sea port which the Rumanians have locked in siege—also were reported strengthening their resistance.

His subject was the ancient tradition of how Crater Lake came into existence. He gave the primitive legend handed down through the ages and then gave the scientific explanation. In the story he told he also gave the origin of the word Klamath, which came from the word Tlamoth, one of the Indians' great gods.

NLRB Election For Crater Lake Box Ordered

A national labor relations board election to establish a collective bargaining agency for employees of the Crater Lake Box company has been ordered. It was announced Friday by AFL headquarters.

The election must be held within 30 days after September 2, the board notice said.

A representation hearing on the Crater Lake issue was held in Klamath Falls over a month ago with both the CIO and AFL on hand.

Another board notice disclosed the Long-Bell Lumber company of Weed hearing had been postponed from September 10 to September 18. It will be held in the council chambers of the city hall.

DESTROYER'S CREW CLAIMS BOMBS CLOSE

she was clearly marked, and carried an identification number, plus an American flag.

Asked what would be done if the attacking vessel were found, Mr. Roosevelt said he supposed American forces would "eliminate" it or try to. He authorized direct quotation of the word eliminate and said it was a good one.

Visibility Good

The chief executive said the Greer was attacked under conditions of good daylight and visibility. The navy department had announced yesterday morning and that the destroyer promptly dropped depth charges.

Mr. Roosevelt did not say whether all the attacks occurred within a relatively short time yesterday morning or were spaced at intervals.

He left little doubt that he approved the action of the commander in taking immediate steps against the submarine by dropping powerful depth charges.

Mr. Roosevelt said it was very fortunate the destroyer was not hit, remarking that it was beyond his power to say why the aim of the submarine was so poor. He would not disclose whether the undersea craft's periscope was above water, declaring he could not talk about that.

"As a landlubber to a sea expert," a reporter inquired, "is it possible for a submarine to make a mistake in broad daylight at torpedo distance?"

Mr. Roosevelt said he would put the explanation this way: If a submarine had a periscope above the surface there was no excuse for a wrong identification. Most torpedoes, he said, are fired by means of a visual sight.

However, almost all naval vessels, including German and Italian, he added, have listening devices and it is possible to fire at a sound. This method is not nearly as accurate.

Mr. Roosevelt dismissed as hypothetical a question on how he could classify the Greer incident as regards "a shooting war."

"To an inquiry whether it was possible for a ship to be on the American side of the Atlantic and at the same time in a belligerent zone proclaimed by Germany, the chief executive said this country never had been notified of the establishment of such a zone. A blockade is never recognized, he added, if it is ineffective.

To a further question, whether the Greer had behaved in accord with instructions and policy in dropping depth charges immediately, the president suggested there was no information to the contrary. He asked his questioner what he would do if attacked.

The **UPPER KLAMATH LAKE** is good. Both bait fisherman and the troller have been catching some good fish. Harriman lodge and the Rocky Point resort report fishing good, both on trolling plugs and wobblers or on bait.

DIAMOND LAKE is an unknown quantity. Late fly and bait fishing are best.

Parts of the upper **ROGUE RIVER**, around Union Creek, promise good fly fishing.

PAULINA LAKE fishing is good. Choose your own weapons. Fishing south of Klamath Falls in the small creeks has been good both on flies and bait.

CRATER LAKE is still good for limits of small fish, if you like the hike in and out. "TAKE A BOY FISHING."

tion in the office of production management, to be headed by Floyd B. Odum, New York financier.

A White House statement said the new agency was formed to further "a determined move on the part of the administration to help the smaller business units of the country obtain a fair share of the defense orders, and to prevent, so far as possible, dislocation of industry and unemployment of workers in plants where production has been curtailed by priorities and material shortages."

Tall, white-haired Baruch had no immediate comment on this development. But he was no more than out of the White House door after lunching with the president yesterday when he told reporters in plain words what he thought should be done to speed vital production.

Baruch saw the new seven-member supply priorities and allocations board, headed by Vice President Wallace, as only a "faltering step forward." He expressed the hope it would work, but he asserted: "The one thing this picture needs is one-man authority."

Administration leaders won a time-saving concession on the \$3,633,900,000 tax bill today when Senator Downey (D-Calif.) agreed to withhold a \$30-a-month pension amendment if the leadership would promise to consider it later as a separate bill.

Democratic Leader Barkley, who had urged Downey to withhold the controversial proposal, told reporters he felt sure that the finance committee leaders would accept Downey's offer and would take up the pension proposal later on.
