given "general orders to American destroyers not only to report positions of German ships and U-boats but, beyond that, to attack them."

3. That, finally, "Mr. Roosevelt in this way also is trying with all means at his disposal to provoke incidents in order to incite the American people into war against Germany."

The announcement broke a two-day silence by officials on the Greer incident, the Germans apparently having awaited a report from the German submarine commander. Authoritative sources had put off questioning with the statement that they could not discuss the case.

mun for flying operations, took the aerial powerhouse aloft. Manned for battle, the crew would swell to seven to nine men.

The dress parade of the B-17E disclosed guns in the nose, in power-operated turrets on the top and in the belly, with additional weapons in each side and in the tail. It was a formidable array.

While company officials' lips were sealed on the plane's specifications, it was reported to carry heavy armament.

A company statement said it contained "new features incorporated as a result of experience gained in the present war."

The B-17E and the Consolidated Aircraft company's B-24 have been adopted as the two principal types for production in the big bomber program.

Hitler Conquests Reviewed in Film At Theatre Here

A review of Hitlerian steps in the German diplomatic and military conquest of Europe is contained in "Peace—by Adolf Hitler," the latest issue of the March of Time which opens at the Pelican theatre Sunday.

The short, combining excellent photography with the usual ominous, stentorian voice of Announcer Van Voorhis, takes the audience along the highway toward Nazi "lebensraum" from the occupation of the Rhineland to the invasion of Russia.

Ending with a quotation by the Fuehrer asserting that folly lies in an attempt at invasion of North and South America, the picture warns America against accepting the Hitler formula for peace.

U. S. SENATORS MAKE LIGHT OF ATTACK CLAIMS

an effort to incite the people into war," Capper said.

Mr. Roosevelt put the blame squarely on the submarine in a press conference yesterday, saying the destroyer had been attacked without warning on its way to Iceland with mail. He added that the navy was seeking the undersea boat with a firm intention to eliminate it if found.

"I would take the president's word over that of Hitler's any day of the week," was the reaction of Representative Manasco (D-Ala.).

There was no comment from departments in Washington but Senator Connally broadened his statement to add:

"The fact that the nazis admit a German submarine was involved amounts to an admission that it was acting under orders of the nazi government in firing on our destroyer. 'This spirit of assassination, disregard for the rights of other nations and arrogant contempt for the United States dragged us into the last war.'"

"We do not want to become involved in the present war, but if our ships or citizens are attacked we are going to defend them."

Connally said that the Greer's action in dropping depth bombs "may slow up the Germans in their attacks on our ships." He said he believed it possible that the submarine actually had been sunk and that the German communique was merely "a ruse to make it appear that the U-boat had not been sunk."

Senator George (D-Ga.) ranking member of the foreign relations committee, told reporters that he wanted additional information about the incident before forming an opinion. He added he was particularly interested in knowing "where the action occurred, because that might have some bearing on the situation."

woods shutdown due to wet weather—a combination of circumstances which shrouded the fact of whether or not the trouble could be termed a strike.

Several days ago, when the woods had dried sufficiently to permit resumption of operations, the fallers were reported to have refused to return, claiming the company had not made a fair caliber scale measurement of some 68,000 feet of timber. (Fallers are paid on a contract basis for the amount of timber fallen.)

A check scale made Wednesday and Thursday by three men from the office of State Labor Commissioner C. H. Gram, the company stated, did not disclose such to be the case. It was understood the average check found the company figures to be only 800 feet shy—an approximate 1.2 per cent.

Except in minor ways, the hand of civilization has touched these rolling hills very lightly. The paved highway that runs past the door of the old fort is the principal change.

But what a change it is! In an hour, on this smooth pavement in a high-powered modern car, one travels as far as the ox team emigrants traveled in a week.

And in a day, in one of the great air liners that wing over this spot, one travels farther than they could have traveled in a year.

THE world has MOVED in this century since Jim Bridger and Kit Carson and their comrades gathered here.

One is a bit frightened at times by the speed with which it has moved and is moving still.

railway station "F" and village "N."

Thick autumn fog hung over the north western sector where heavy artillery of both sides are dueling in the bitter struggle over Russia's second largest city.

A red star dispatch said 30 German planes, flying despite the fog, attempted to bomb military objectives outside Leningrad but that 15 were downed and the others fled. Two of those fleeing were said to have been destroyed trying to reach their base.

ship, told a startling story of talking to the submarine commander after the attack.

"There were four of us in a lifeboat," he said, "and it was water-logged when the submarine came to the surface. The commander seemed to be in his early twenties. He asked if any officers were on board."

"Seemed Ashamed"
"He seemed ashamed of what he'd done and asked us what caused the explosion. He said he had not fired a torpedo."

"I asked him if he could give us any water. He said he couldn't spare any but gave us four tins of meat and two bottles of rum."

Beattie said that when the submarine moved off it accidentally struck a wobbly lifeboat and the lifeboat's stern dipped.

"The submarine commander apologized," said Beattie, adding that he was German. Beattie said the survivors clung to the lifeboat and rafts for 12 hours before being picked up by a Polish warship.

Altogether there were 11 American airmen on the ship, all said to have had commercial flying experience in the United States and in addition RAF training in Canada.
