Joe Soft At Bout Signing
Champion Claimed at 210, Looks Over 240
NEW YORK, Sept. 6 (AP)—Joe Louis looked "soft" Friday at the official signing for his nineteenth title defense on September 29 against Lou Nova at the polo grounds. His face was fat and he looked as if he weighed about 240 pounds, although his handlers claimed he registered only 210.
The champion's appearance actually took the play away from announcements by Louis' handlers that he will sue a certain broadcasting company for \$1,000,000 because of alleged defamatory statements regarding the champ's character.
Louis arrived from Stevensville, Mich., and took a quick physical examination. Dr. William H. Walker, commission physician, said, "Both Louis and Nova are in fine physical condition, but Louis looks a bit heavy."
Nova, who also claimed to weigh exactly 210 pounds, looked like an extremely solid man drawn taut.

Dodson Ups Golf Lead In Shanter Open

CHICAGO, Sept. 6 (UP)—Leonard Dodson of Kansas City, Mo., trick shot wizard from the Ozarks, rolled in Friday with a four under par 68 and increased his lead to three shots halfway through the \$11,000 Tam O'Shanter open golf tournament. His 36-hole total was 133.
Sensation of the first round with his record 65, Dodson reel-off another string of sub-par shots that almost matched it.
As Dodson walked off the eighteenth green, the man who trailed him by only two strokes yesterday — Byron Nelson of Toledo, O. — started out the first hole. Somewhere along the way Nelson lost a stroke. To his first round 67, he pieced together 34-35 for a total of 136.
Ben Hogan of Hershey, Pa., winner of more than \$13,000 during his spectacular campaign this season, fell back into stride after slipping to a 73 yesterday and fired a 34-32—66, pushing him into third place with 139.

Williams Ups Bat Clip to .411; Reiser Sprints to Senior Lead

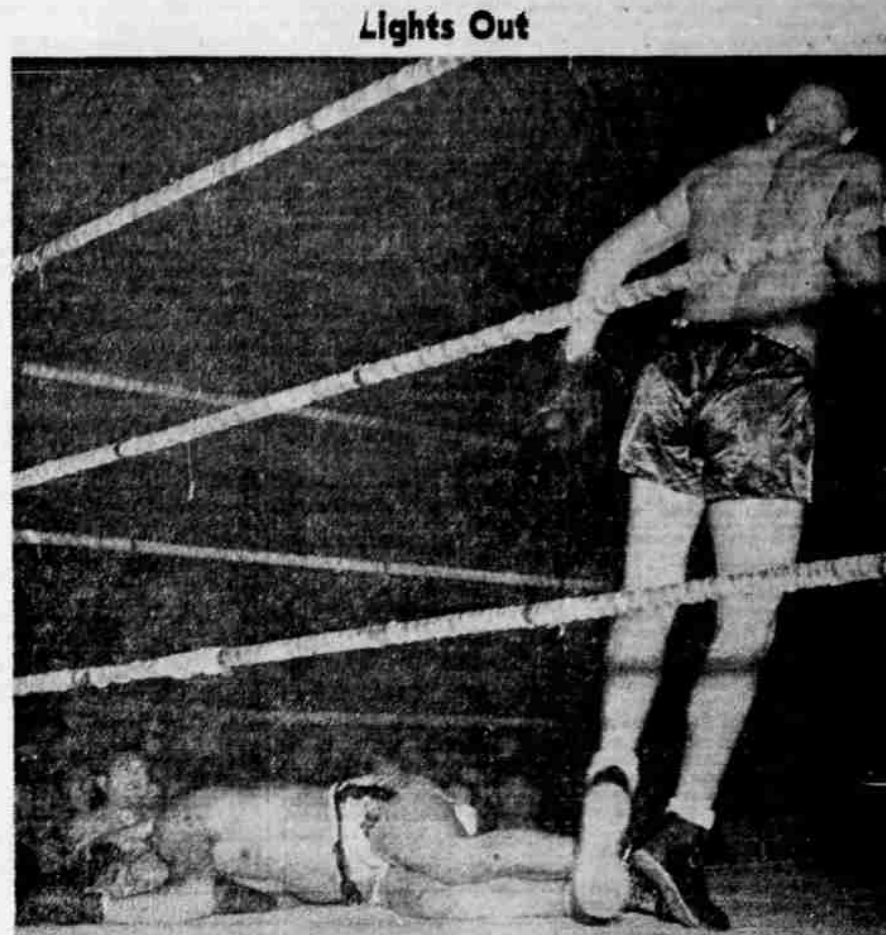
NEW YORK, Sept. 6 (AP)—The competition for hitting honors in the major league is something like the pennant races.

The Red Sox fireman gained four points this week, the same amount he lost last week, to lift his average to .411.
Cecil Travis of Washington, the No. 2 batter, slipped four points to .360. Joe DiMaggio of the New York Yankees, still out of action, remains stationary at .356.

Fish Catches For August Reach Record Height at Crater Lake

CRATER LAKE NATIONAL PARK, Sept. 6.—In spite of considerable inclement weather, fishing in Crater lake during the month of August this year surpassed that for the same month in any year, both with respect to the total take of fish and to the individual take. A total of 2722 fish, 2609 silverside salmon and 113 rainbow trout, made up the cumulative creel—in August, which represents a 90 per cent increase over the take in the same month last year, while the individual take of 1.07 fish per angler per hour surpasses the previous record of 0.85 chalked up in the 1940 season.
The record-breaking take in August coupled with that for July establishes a new all time high for a season's fishing in Crater lake. The total catch for the season was 7301 fish which exceeds the take of 1940, the best previous year, by 3113. The total number of fishing parties, 719, is the largest in the rather long history of Crater lake fishing, exceeding the previous record of 635 in 1937.
Most of the fish taken during August as well as throughout the season were silverside salmon averaging from 10 to 12 inches in length and about one-half pound in weight. All of the silverside salmon taken this season were the result of natural reproduction in Crater lake.

NEW YORK, Sept. 6 (AP)—The most dramatic of the semi-final matches today in the national tennis championships at Forest Hills is practically certain to be the one between that grand veteran from California, Helen Hull Jacobs, and her long-time rival and Wightman cup teammate, Mrs. Sarah Palfrey Cooke of New York.

If she trips Mrs. Cooke today—as she should—then it probably will be Helen against Pauline Betz of Los Angeles in tomorrow's finals. Miss Betz, the tall golden-blond who was seeded No. 1, should prevail over Margaret Osborne of San Francisco in the other semi-final.

Of the men's semi-finals, the easier to call appeared to be the one between Bobby Riggs, 1939 champion, and Ted Schroeder of Glendale, Calif. Riggs looked like a million in trouncing Frankie Parker by 6-4, 6-3, 4-6, 6-2 yesterday, and he figured to be a few too many for Schroeder.

In the opposite bracket, it was defending Champion Don McNeill against Frank Kovacs, the tall boy who scored three straight victories over McNeill this summer prior to the championships. McNeill appears finally to have recaptured his 1940 form.
