Lumber Workers Seek Wage Boost At Baker Session

BAKER, Sept. 8 (AP)—AFL Lumber and Sawmill workers of eastern Oregon and western Idaho will open wage negotiations with employers here September 20.

A scheduled meeting on the wage issue this week end was postponed after officials of only three companies appeared. Others misunderstood the date of the meeting, unionists said.

The three firms represented, two from Baker and one from La Grande, agreed to a week's paid vacation for employees, but did not discuss other issues.

A report on the Pine industry will be issued by C. A. Morse of the University of Idaho before September 20, and is expected to guide proceedings.

Union officials have not disclosed the amount of the wage increase asked.

Oregon Gunners Win Rifle Matches

CAMP PERRY, O., Sept. 8 (AP)—Lewis E. Brentlinger, Eugene, Ore., won first place in the metallic sights-sharps-shooter class at the national shooting matches yesterday.

Firing 20 shots prone at both 50 and 100 yards, Brentlinger scored 400 points, including 22 bulls-eyes.

Walter E. Knopf, Portland, Ore., won the marksman class shooting a similar course. He scored 400 with 19 bulls-eyes.

MARSHFIELD, Sept. 8 (AP)—Coos county is attempting to raise \$1000 as a recreation fund for Battery F of the 249th coast artillery band of the Oregon national guard.

ALBANY, Sept. 8 (AP)—Woodworking plants which located in Linn county the past year boosted the county's total assessed valuation up \$713,170 to \$23,425,620.

Portland Workers Swell Ranks of Harvest Labor

PORTLAND, Sept. 8 (AP)—Portland swelled the ranks of Willamette valley harvest workers to the largest of the season yesterday, the state employment office reported.

Hundreds of city residents, mobilized by the employment service and the Mantle club, worked in the string bean, prune and hop fields under a warm sun that further ripened crops, which already faced destruction because of a lack of farm labor.

The influx, however, did not help all sections. Growers of the Independence region reported that only 400 additional pickers showed up. Three thousand had been requested.

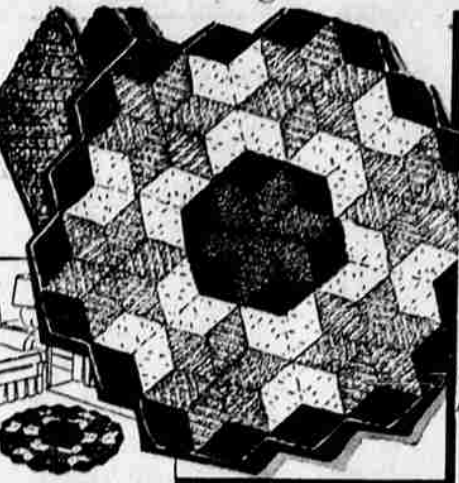
Prune growers of the Forest Grove region told school officials there was no longer a need to close schools in order to release children for harvest work.

Sprague River Teaching Staff Ready for Opening of School

SPRAGUE RIVER — The Sprague River school will start Tuesday, September 9, with a faculty of five elementary teachers and four high school teachers. Roland Parks will again serve as principal of the school and will teach high school subjects.

George Hobbs will act as athletic coach and seventh and eighth grade teacher. This is Mr. Hobbs' third year in Sprague River.

Florence Stone will again act as home economics and commercial teacher.

Evelyn Hudson, a summer graduate of the Southern Oregon College of Education, will have a fifth and sixth grade home room and will act as girls' advisor and physical education teacher. This is Miss Hudson's first experience.

Mrs. Marion Heidrich will serve as fourth grade teacher. Mrs. Heidrich has had teaching experience in the Merrill, Bonanza and Sprague River schools.

Mrs. Cowbrough will teach the third grade as a home room and will act as school music teacher.

Cheese Box Message Gets British Answer

PORTLAND, Sept. 8 (AP)—Grumblers don't exist in the English areas that have experienced a real blitz, a grocer wrote to Tom Girdner, Portland, in answer to a message written on an export box of Tillamook cheese.

"It's only in the areas where the war proper hasn't intruded that you find persons walling," A. Palmer, Rikmansworth, Hertfordshire, wrote.

Girdner, a car loader, wrote his name and a request for a reply to "any current happenings" in loading a triplet of cheese last April.

Palmer said the rationing system was a nuisance but well thought out. He added that England was better off for food than at the same period in the last war.

As advice to America, he suggested that it might be well to "put a muzzle on some of your public men — senators I think you call them. If ever they experience war themselves, which I sincerely hope they won't, it may teach them that a still tongue keepeth a wise head."

ALASKAN WAR PROGRAM HIT BY SENATOR

WASHINGTON, Sept. 8 (AP)—Senator Brewster (R-Me.), just returned from a Pacific defenses inspection flight, criticized Friday the military program in Alaska, including what he said was an army proposal, since abandoned, to shelter Alaskan troops in tents.

Brewster said he called the attention of war department officials to a requirement of law that "adequate housing" be provided for troops above the Mason-Dixon line, and suggested that "tents in an Alaskan winter would not answer that description."

He has since been assured, he added, that adequate barracks would be constructed.

Brewster, a member of a special senate committee investigating the defense program, made a 14,000 mile tour of Pacific coast and Alaskan defense developments in army and navy planes.

He praised the efforts of Major General Simon Bolivar Buckner, commander of Alaskan defense forces, to coordinate the military program in the territory, but said in an interview that officers in Alaska should be given more independent authority to overcome delays.

Brewster said that it took two months for Washington officials to clear recommendations of officers on duty in Alaska.

Brewster said troops from the Oregon, Washington, Minnesota, and Alabama national guard were on duty in Alaska in addition to marines and regular army units. He declined to disclose the number of men now at Alaskan stations but said there is "a very substantial number."

Brewster said he would report to Senator Truman (D-Mo.), chairman of the investigating committee, and also to Senator Walsh (D-Mass.), chairman of the naval affairs committee.

He criticized the methods of handling shipments of supplies from Seattle to Alaskan army and navy posts. The first shipments reaching one post, he said, was 360 refrigerators, "and the ground is frozen 100 feet deep. The refrigerators arrived even before they had the barracks constructed, he said."

"Then some guns arrived," he added, "with no sights."

The problem of furnishing soldiers with recreational facilities was "especially important in Alaska," the senator said. While soldiers stationed in warmer climates have outdoor sports, those in Alaska, he contended, needed gymnasiums, theatres and bowling alleys.

"Here is something the United States organizations apparently have not heard about yet, but ought to consider immediately," he said.

Brewster said his report to the two senate committees also would praise Buckner for his attempts to "disperse barracks" and to "camouflage army posts."

Brewster said, however, he

learned that some of Buckner's recommendations along these lines had been disapproved because the war department contended the expense of laying additional water and sewer pipes would be too great.

"I find out that Buckner wrote the war department asking for a formula as to how many lives equalled one foot of sewer pipe," the senator said.

Unions Support Columbia Plan

PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 8 (AP)—The Bone bill to create a three-man Columbia river power authority was supported by unions working at Grand Coulee and Bonneville dams Saturday.

The Columbia river power trades council, an affiliation of the unions, voted unanimous endorsement, and said the three-man board would make possible local control. The council passed up Interior Secretary Harold L. Ickes' proposal for a single administration.

M. L. Hedges, Washington, D. C., legislative representative of the council, said the AFL executive council recently endorsed the three-man proposal.
