YACHT'S LOG MAY RESTORE MEMORY

LOS ANGELES, Sept. 8 (AP)—Log of the yacht Wing On, upon which three persons starved to death, arrived from the south seas last week.

It will be used in an effort to restore the memory and walking ability of Mrs. Fern Thompson, sole survivor of the two couples who sailed from Los Angeles harbor in quest of pearls a year ago.

Mrs. Thompson's husband and another young married couple died at sea of starvation and exposure. The wrecked yacht was discovered on a reef off the Macuata coast of the Fiji islands last November 24. Mrs. Thompson still aboard with the bodies of two of the victims.

"The log and all of its contents will remain secret until Mrs. Thompson recovers sufficiently to express her own desires concerning it," said Attorney Robert Webb, who obtained the black leather volume from British authorities in Suva, Fiji islands. "I can say nothing as to the contents except that reading this pitiful story of their gallant fight against the sea and gnawing hunger left me heart sick and ill."

"Our previously announced belief as to the order in which the victims died has been confirmed by the entries. Chester Thompson died November 7. He was buried at sea November 8. The next to die was undoubtedly Dalton Conly, and then his wife, Eve. There are indications that the two young husbands kept their dangerous plight from the two girls as long as possible and yielded to them their food portions."

Dr. Samuel G. Benadom, who is treating Mrs. Thompson, said her mind is a blank as to what happened between the time she left San Pedro and her rescue. She also has difficulty in walking. Dr. Benadom said that bits from the log would be memorized and introduced casually into conversations with Mrs. Thompson. With recovery of her memory, Dr. Benadom said, she may also learn to walk normally. She is living here with her parents and two small children.

Dr. T. Clunie, government medical officer at Suva, said last March: "A perusal of the log left me with some idea of the horror of her position, apart from starvation. Afloat on a rolling expanse of ocean for nearly two weeks after the death of Conly, whose decomposed body remained on the yacht, she had lived indeed in the reck of death."

The yacht had been becalmed for 84 days when Thompson died.

Navy Commissions Port Angeles Base, First in District

SEATTLE, Sept. 8 (AP)—The navy's brand new section base at Port Angeles, Wash., went into commission Thursday as the northwest's newest defense link, thirteenth naval district authorities announced today.

The new commanding officer, Lt. Allan Grant, U. S. naval reserve, took over in the course of the regular navy commissioning ceremony held in the presence of all officers and men attached to the base.

The base, not yet fully completed, will ultimately provide shore facilities for patrol and other navy craft operating in northern Puget sound waters.

The Port Angeles base is the first of its type to be commissioned in the thirteenth naval district.

A similar base at Astoria will be commissioned next week, and others are now under construction at Marshfield, Ore., and Neah Bay, Wash.
