## SENATE CHANGES IN TAX BILL FAVORED

Conference Reported In Compromise On Total

WASHINGTON, Sept. 13 (AP) — Reliable congressional informants said today a joint conference committee had accepted virtually all senate changes in the record-breaking revenue bill, including amendments estimated to add \$52,800,000 to the tax burden on corporations.

The conference committee, appointed to adjust differences between the senate and house versions of the revenue measure, was reported by one source to have written a compromise bill estimated by congressional experts at \$3,550,000,000, which is \$33,900,000 less than the estimated senate total and \$33,600,000 more than the expected revenue under the house measure.

The conference group, which decided to keep detailed results of its meeting secret until Monday, was reported previously to have accepted a senate amendment reducing personal income tax exemptions from \$2,000 to \$1,500 for married persons and from \$800 to \$750 for single individuals.

# Nazis Boost Claims

## BRITISH SAY EIGHT SHIPS LOST AT SEA

Germans Report New Sinkings Bring Toll to 31

LONDON, Sept. 13 (AP) — Battered by two U-boat attacks and an air assault in a raging storm, and just missing a fight with a German surface raider, the bulk of a British convoy in the Atlantic nevertheless reached port with the loss of but eight ships, the admiralty said today.

Three ships of the convoy were sunk by torpedoes and four by bombs. One ship damaged by a bomb later foundered in the gale, it was said.

The admiralty, highly praising the conduct of the men of the convoy, gave credit in large measure for bringing the hazardous situation to Lieut. Commander G. A. Thring, DSO, in command of the senior escort ship.

It was not clear from the first reports whether the admiralty announcement was meant to be a denial of the German claim that 31 vessels, including three warships, had been sunk from a 40-ship British convoy in the Atlantic.

BERLIN, Sept. 13 (AP) — U-boats, still slashing at a British-bound convoy in the North Atlantic after President Roosevelt's shoot-on-sight orders to the U. S. navy, have sunk four more merchantmen and three escort vessels, the German high command declared today.

The new bulletin raised the toll claimed from the convoy to 28 merchantmen totalling 164,000 tons—31 ships altogether (Continued on Page Two)

80 Nazis Leave Persia for India, Siberia Camps

TEHERAN, Iran, Sept. 13 (AP) — Eighty Nazis bound for internment in India and Siberia left here by train today while British and Russian diplomats listened in irritation to their steg hells echoing through Teheran's palatial marble depot.

Seventy-two of the group went by special train to Ahwaz, en route to India, while eight were aboard one coach of a Kazvin train with Siberia as their destination.

Allied displeasure was manifested over a series of excuses and asserted misunderstandings whereby the German legation failed twice to deliver the prisoners and finally produced only 80 of the 275 men demanded of it.

With about 400 men and 400 women and children still sheltered under the swastika flag at the German legation's suburban compound, German Minister Erwin Ettel visited the station and personally saluted most of those being sent away.

## Seafarers Call Walkout Over War Bonuses

NEW YORK, Sept. 13 (AP) — The Seafarers' International Union of North America (AFL) called a walkout at 11 a. m. (EST) today over a war-bonus dispute, ordering its members of "all ships bound for axis or allied ports."

"This strike will affect all ships bound for axis or allied ports," said John Hawk, union secretary-treasurer. "We are naturally not against carrying material to England, but since the nazis are sinking boats regardless of location we want to protect our men. The operators show no signs of negotiating."

In New York harbor, three ships with cargoes of supplies for American defense bases in Bermuda and the West Indies cancelled their sailings as the crew walked out.

The union is seeking war bonuses from the Alcoa line for voyages to Bermuda and the Caribbean, and increased bonuses from other lines for trips to the Red sea, Persian gulf and other war-endangered waters. Spokesmen for the lines declined to comment.

## JAPAN PREPARED TO FIGHT, CLAIM

Force Will Follow if Diplomacy Fails, Says Speaker

TOKYO, Sept. 13 (AP) — An extreme national political leader, Selgo Nakano, asserted at a great mass meeting from which thousands were turned away today that Japan was prepared to fight to the last man in the event she cannot reach a settlement of her differences with the United States through diplomatic channels.

Nakano, head of a revolutionary Hokokai political group, said that should Japan decide to send her navy and air force—which he said included 500 ships and 4000 planes—into the south Pacific, Britain and the United States would be powerless to protect the sea routes to Manila, Singapore and Australia.

Agreement Doubtful Nakano, whose speech was advertised as a reply to the Roosevelt-Churchill "Atlantic charter," discounted the possibility of a Japanese rapprochement with the United States and Britain because, he said, their positions are fundamentally opposed.

Tokyo newspapers reported Nakano's speech briefly, playing it down, and a Domei News agency broadcast also tended to minimize it.

## New High in Army Entertainment To Greet Vacationing Guardsmen

Entertainment given for visiting troops en route through Klamath Falls to maneuvers north and south during the past few months will be far overshadowed when the hospitality committee gets together to figure on a gala program for the entertainment of Batteries A and C, 249th Coast Artillery, Klamath's own men.

Fred Heilbrunner, chairman of the hospitality group, received word Saturday from Captain Dewey Powell, of the arrival of several hundred men here some time the night of October 2, the date they will leave Fort Stevens for home. The men will bring the 249th regimental band and will provide a great deal of entertainment on their own, it is understood.

## ARMING LIKELY FOR AMERICAN SHIPS, REPORT

Guns Believed Talked For Merchantmen After Speech

WASHINGTON, Sept. 13 (AP) — The state department announced today that the SS Arkansan, an American vessel, was struck and damaged by shell fragments during a bombing raid over the town of Suez on the night of September 11.

No casualties have been reported, but further details are being sought by American authorities.

The Arkansan is owned by the American-Hawaiian Steamship company of San Francisco and New York and was operating between the United States and the Red sea.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 13 (AP) — The arming of American merchant ships was described in authoritative quarters today as a step likely to be proposed by the administration, supplementing President Roosevelt's orders to the navy to shoot first at axis warcraft in American defense waters.

Discussion of such a move intensified with news of the torpedoing of an American-owned freighter carrying lumber to Iceland—an attack which occurred Thursday morning but which was not announced until yesterday.

Matter of Time The arming of merchantmen was reported to have been discussed briefly at a White House conference when President Roosevelt gave congressional leaders a preview of his Thursday night radio address. ## Wreckage of 1939 'Baby Clipper' Hints Pilot's Fate

ST. JOHNS, Newfoundland, Sept. 13 (AP) — The weather-beaten wreckage of a tiny plane found in the wilderness of Newfoundland told today of the disaster which befell Thomas H. Smith who set off for trans-Atlantic adventure in his "baby clipper" two years ago.

"Walking out to avoid freezing," said a note left in the plane by the Clarkesburg, W. Va., flier, who took off from Old Orchard Beach, Me., May 28, 1939, and was never seen nor heard from since.

No trace has been found of the flier.

## Clues to Missing Bomber Examined

TACOMA, Sept. 13 (AP) — Two McChord field army officers left today for Sellick, in central King county, to investigate loggers' reports they had seen a reflection from some undetermined object in the Cedar river woods which might be the wreckage of the two-motored B-18 bomber, missing with a crew of six since Tuesday dawn.

Weather was still too bad for an exhaustive aerial search of a high Cascade ridge, where some officers believe the plane may have fallen, in southeastern King county. Only training planes were allowed to resume the search today, and heavier craft, such as bombers, were grounded.

## Mercury Drops To 34 Degrees

Mercury in Klamath basin thermometers hit a new seasonal low in the early morning hours Saturday and the US weatherman reported a minimum of 34 degrees, just two degrees above freezing.

This is the coldest morning since May 27 when the thermometer fell to 33 degrees, it was learned.

## COUNTY ASSESSED VALUE INCREASES

Heaviest Timber Cut In History Fails To Nick Total

The biggest timber cut in the county's history has failed in the past year to reduce the total of assessed values of county property, it was announced Saturday by County Assessor Charles Mack.

Mack reported the assessed valuation in Klamath county, exclusive of utilities, to be \$22,648,775, as against \$22,221,535 in the previous year. Utility valuations are yet to be set by the state tax commission, but it is expected they also will show a gain.

## Holman Sees F. R. Sending U. S. Into War

PORTLAND, Sept. 13 (AP) — It is President Roosevelt's intention to throw the United States into the war soon, Senator Holman told an America First committee rally last night.

He said he was more worried over "the growing strength of subversive, intolerant and disorderly forces within our own country which seem to receive support and encouragement from the executive department of our government than I am alarmed about possible invasions of our country by foreign foes."

He deplored action of the Portland board in denying use of auditoriums to Senator Burton K. Wheeler of Montana.

KALISPEL, Mont., Sept. 13 (UP) — Senator Burton K. Wheeler, (D-Mont.), one of the nation's leading isolationists, last night charged President Roosevelt with wanting war and that his speech Thursday was "intended to incite the American people to war."

## GERMAN TANK DRIVE THROWN BACK, REPORT

10,000 Men Lost by Panzers on Center Front, Claim

MOSCOW, Sept. 13 (AP) — The red army was reported tonight to have hurled back a great German offensive on Bryansk, 220 miles southwest of Moscow, and advanced 10 to 12 miles in driving counter-attacks under General Jacob Kreutzer, hero of the soviet union.

The action was said to have saved Moscow from a threat of a new German push. The Nazi 47th and 24th tank corps, commanded by Col. Gen. Heinz Guderian, German panzer expert, were reported routed in the fighting during which 26 towns and villages were captured and the Germans lost about 10,000 men.

The German drive was reported made by 12 German infantry divisions (about 180,000 men) and two tank corps.

Dispatches said the Germans lost more than 260 tanks, 600 vehicles and hundreds of field guns.

The Germans broke through toward Bryansk, midway on the Kiev-Moscow railway, late in August, according to these reports, but were defeated by a Russian counter-offensive which began 13 days ago.

In the sector about 150 miles northwest of Bryansk, persistent red army counter-attacks were said to have recaptured Sevelovo, a village in the vicinity of Smolensk. Two German regiments were reported broken through in these counter-attacks.

Near Russian-recaptured Yelnya, within 50 miles of Smolensk, these reports said, the Germans failed in another "psychological" attack.

Two hundred shooting, wild-riding Nazi motorcyclists, they said, sped across a field toward red army positions, but the Russian infantry held their fire until the attackers were within close range, then scattered them (Continued on Page Two)

## 170 Army Officers May Be Retired

WASHINGTON, Sept. 13 (AP) — A secret board of five generals today recommended the removal of 170 regular army officers from active duty.

The war department announced that under a recent law the officers on the list who have held their commissions for less than seven years will be honorably discharged, while the men with longer service will be retired, their pay to be determined by rank and their years in the army.

Such action is part of the army's plan to remove men considered unfit for further active duty.

Notes of 1917-18 Getting Answers TWO RIVERS, Wis., Sept. 13 (AP) — A lot of Two Rivers women, many long married and some grandmothers, are receiving mash notes from Uncle Sam's young soldiers—for a 24-year-old reason.

When the Aluminum Goods Manufacturing company made army canteens during the World War, many of the girls employed as wrappers slipped notes with their names and addresses into the metal bottles.

Thousands of the canteens, unused in '17 and '18, are being distributed to the new army and the notes are paying off.
