

Mrs. Arnest Pays Visit to Eulalona

State Regent of Daughters of American Revolution Guest of Local Chapter on Monday

Defending the American way is the theme for the year's activities of Daughters of the American Revolution throughout the whole of the United States, and other countries where chapters exist, according to Mrs. Howard P. Arnest, state regent, who addressed the members of Eulalona chapter, at the dinner Monday evening, at the Pelican Grille banquet room.

Mrs. Arnest told the Daughters that they must study the constitution, the bill of rights, in order to know what they want to defend. The work carried on by the national committees was briefly covered by the speaker, and the necessity for work among the junior American citizens was stressed.

An unique and most enjoyable program of music was given during the dinner. Mimeographed copies of fourteen songs of the Revolutionary period, and four of the War of 1812, were placed at each cover for members to follow, while Victor records of these compositions were played. These copies and records were used through the courtesy of Wendell B. Smith, of the English department of the Klamath Union high school, who has collected them for use in his teaching. Mrs. Don Zumwalt, chapter chairman of the advancement of American music, was responsible for this part of the program.

Opening exercises included prayer by Mrs. G. Logan Black, chaplain; salute to the flag, led by Mrs. Harry Goeller; recitation of American's creed led by Mrs. Wilbur A. Jones. Mrs. William Dawson Foster, chapter regent, presided at the dinner.

Mrs. Robert Odell, in behalf of the chapter, presented an Oregon plate to Mrs. Arnest. Mrs. Bernard W. Zollman, a recent bride, received a gift from the chapter, presented by Mrs. Thomas Hampton. Color scheme for the table decorations was orange, carried out with graceful arrangements of marigolds, goldenrod, and sun flowers, and tall orange tapers.

Seated at the head table with Mrs. Arnest were Mrs. Foster, Mrs. Robert E. Wattenburg, organizing regent; Mrs. A. L. Berkeley, state recording secretary; Mrs. Z. W. Dixon, chapter vice-regent; Mrs. H. A. Nitschelm, state chairman of real Daughters. These women were lovely corsages, the gift of the chapter.

The chapter voted to invite the next state conference to Klamath Falls, February 17 and 18, 1942. This conference will mark the end of Mrs. Arnest's regime as state regent, and she expressed a desire to hold it in Klamath Falls.

The state regent had on display a musical composition, "Home Defense March," and a publication entitled "Historic Restorations of the Daughters of the American Revolution," by Lewis Barrington, published in 1941, both of which she recommended to the members. She presented fifty loyalty letter stamps to the chapter.

The National Society DAR has requested each subordinate chapter to properly observe Constitution day, September the seventeenth. Mrs. Alfred Collier, chapter chairman of this committee, will entertain the chapter on the afternoon of this day, from three to five o'clock, at her home at 1955 LeRoy street. Mrs. Foster and Mrs. Harry Ackley, chairman of Americanism, will arrange the program which will include brief talks on different phases of the constitution and the bill of rights.

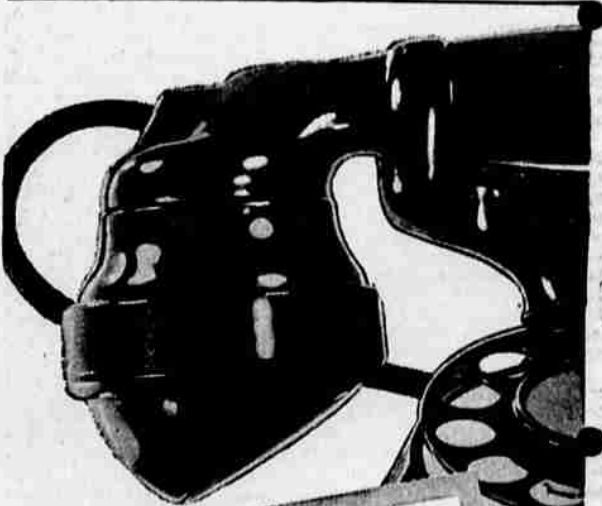
STUDENTS PRESENTED IN RECITAL
