Washington Reporter

The high focal point of interest in national legislation always rests in the committee and today was no exception when a subcommittee of the senate interstate commerce committee proceeded in its investigation.

The chairman, Senator Worth Clark of Idaho, it will be recalled, a month ago caused pandemonium in the Good Neighbor ranks by suggesting that the United States take over the republics of South America and make puppet states of them all. Half of the morning session was taken up with a speech by Mr. Clark defending the legality of his committee and after many quotations from Senes 152 as he expressed it and promises that this hearing would be conducted in the good old American way of over a hundred years. Firstly Mr. Willkie, not to be allowed to cross examine the witnesses, secondly, every witness would be sworn in. At this Senator Nye demurred but finally allowed himself to be sworn in. So they were off with the senator from North Dakota on the stand. One committee member did speak up with "what legislation is contemplated in this hearing? Isn't that always presupposed at a committee hearing?" The chairman answered "not necessarily." The senator from Arizona parried with "are we here just for the publicity?"

The caucus room was packed, the visitors' section full, the press tables crowded and such an array of moving picture production talent, rarely seen outside of a convention.

Senator Nye enumerated the pictures he considered most objectionable: Escape, Convoy, Sergeant York, The Great Dictator, The Hamilton Woman, and I Married a Nazi. He added that the news reels need a thorough investigating. A recent March of Time was so brutal that even the producers were frightened. They wrote letters to many producers saying "it is so vital and brutal it will need friends."

The senator had the entire day, a packed house and few interruptions and with voluminous notes he made the most of it. He implied that the reason for the producers' great interest in aiding England is that if Britain falls the movie industry will be hard hit. He claimed too that pressure is being brought to bear from Washington to produce more and more propaganda pictures. He cited the fact that Archibald McLeish of the Library of Congress went on the air recently as part of the propaganda agency from Washington. He named certain men who should be watched for their propaganda activities.

Toward the close of the long discussion the persistent senator from Arizona asked if he had seen all of the pictures he had designated as dangerous. He admitted he had not. Had the senator seen any of them? Yes. Just what ones? I think I saw I Married a Nazi.

When questioned what he saw objectionable in that picture he replied that he carried away the impression of hatred against a people. The persistent senator asked what part of the play produced that effect. Then Senator Nye convulsed the house and practically defeated the elaborate case he had spent the day building up by saying "Really, senator, I just never can even remember the name of a play the next morning, perhaps if you could help me to recall the plot I could answer your question."

Tomorrow the producers are to go on the stand.
