"People will bear any kind of taxation if it is just," said the lanky Californian, "but any system that places an unjust burden on one taxpayer and an undeserved light burden on another will break down."

"If we like this democracy, and I am stuck on it myself, we must handle the affairs of taxation with decency and competence."

Hartman said Americans "haven't seen anything yet" when it comes to taxation. In the years of stress ahead, he said, the honest and just handling of fiscal affairs of the community, the state and the nation can save democracy. If they are handled in any other manner, the future is dark.

ONE figure, quite typical, in the vast picture:

He is a middle-sized producer of one of the basic raw materials, Middle-aged. Ruddy. With a good smile and a ready sense of humor. He wants a loan from the RFC to put his plant on its feet and get it in shape to turn out its product speedily. (And with enough profit to recoup some of the losses of the past tough years.)

He has been here three months. He doesn't know how far he has got. He doesn't know when he will finish. He doesn't know how the finish will affect his fortunes. But only here can he get the answer.

So he makes appointments, waits interminably and pays his hotel bills.

ANOTHER figure:

A young man, who has a new idea about boats and barges to be built of something other than steel — which is scarce and getting scarcer. He has good backing. His backers know where to lay hands on technical skills not yet utilized in the defense effort. The materials he proposes to utilize are still relatively abundant.

(They come into competition, of course, with steel, and in the utilization of them in the defense effort things might be learned that would make them PERMANENT competitors of steel. Which adds to his problem. And perhaps to the delays he has encountered.)

He has been here two months, has worn out (he claims) two pairs of pants just sitting and waiting, and doesn't know how long he'll have to wait before getting a yes or no answer.

IF you like to sit and wait, come on to Washington. You'll find it heaven, for you'll be spending most of your time doing the thing you like best to do.

If somebody here ever organizes an international union of sitters and waiters, the resulting accumulation of dues will bear a close resemblance to the national debt.

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three-months-old campaign. Half were killed, the Nazi high command said.

On the historic ratio of three wounded to every one killed in past wars, this would mean that German forces totaled the staggering figure of 9,000,000 men including some 5,400,000 wounded.

German losses were put at only 402,865 killed, wounded and missing in the first two months of the war.

In a special bulletin, Hitler's field headquarters said German army groups under Field Marshal Gen. Gerd von Rundstedt and Field Marshal Gen. Fedor von Bock, slashing around Kiev in a vast flanking movement, had met beyond the Dnestr river to trap the Russians.

Finnish military dispatches said huge fires were raging in Leningrad, blazing so fiercely they could be seen with the naked eye in broad daylight from Finnish territory.

Other Nazi reports said Stuka dive bombers had silenced the guns of Kronstadt fortress, powerful island naval base 20 miles from Leningrad, thus paving the way for German warships to steam up the Gulf of Finland and shell the old czarist capital at close range.

A red army bulletin acknowledged that the Germans had reached one of Kiev's gates, but indicated that the struggle had not yet reached a decisive phase. Bitter fighting raged around the city of 850,000 inhabitants throughout the night, a late Soviet communiqué said.

By that order the president not only transferred the hitherto separate, army-controlled export control administration to the vice president's board, but reduced it to a subordinate division which will be headed by a civilian, Milo Perkins, former head of the Commodity Credit corporation.

At the same time Brig. Gen. Russell L. Maxwell, who has acted as administrator of export control since the office was organized July 2, 1940, was relieved of that assignment and ordered back to duty in the war department.

More than 100 other army officers — mostly from the reserves — are now on duty with the export control administration but there has been no decision yet as to their future disposition.

In the behind-the-scenes conflict, informed sources said, members of one faction described the others as "new dealers" and were, in turn, called "army bureaucrats."

Up until his death, Dr. Sam was alert and his eyesight keen. He spoke frequently of the coming of the white man to this country, an event clearly etched on his mind. His span of life stretched over a period which saw the west developed from a wilderness. He was a man full grown before the Civil war.

Dr. Sam is survived by a brother, Roscoe Watah, a daughter, Mrs. Biss, and a number of grandchildren and great-grandchildren. He was beloved by all who knew him, and held a position of great respect among members of his tribe.

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shortages by over optimistic predictions of supplies."

"The labor union restrictions, which have nothing to do with wages, or hours or conditions of labor, are today costing the American consumer over one billion dollars a year," Arnold declared. "The cost is increasing."

"Illegitimate Objectives"

"I am not talking about wages. I am talking about holdups and bottlenecks in housing and in food, and in fuel and transportation. They are created by powerful labor unions which claim the legal right to institute strikes and boycotts for the following illegitimate objectives: to enforce price fixing agreements and free channels of distribution; to eliminate small competitors and owner-operators; to restrict the use of labor saving devices; to keep more efficient materials off the market which might interfere with static jobs; to prevent self-employment; to make arbitrary classifications of jobs which retard the efficient use of labor; to tie up huge industries in the struggle to determine which of two unions will dominate the field."

Arnold said these corporations and organizations were not unpatriotic but had "trained themselves to resist the development of new enterprise."

"They are obsessed with the idea that overproduction will interfere with their future domination," he said. "While they are willing to expand their own war production, they do not want others to expand, and they reserve the right to dictate to civilian consumers what they can buy and the prices which they can pay."

"In dealing with the anti-productive ideas of these groups we are only repeating the experiences of other democracies which prior to this war had gone a long way down the path of static cartelization of industry. England, because of this set of ideas, wasted all the precious months before the fall of France."

The AFL last spring won a National Labor Relations board election at the mill and were in turn certified as the bargaining agent.

For the past several years we have owned some 20 thousand acres of land in the Meadow and Swan Lake Country and have had several thousand more under private and Taylor Grazing lease. We are now pasturing several thousand head of cattle and horses on this range.
