

12 MORE SHOT BY NAZIS FOR PARIS ATTACK

executed as hostages on charges. The 12 were the most executed at any one time.

VICHY, Unoccupied France, Sept. 20 (AP)—The Vichy French, in a race with German authorities to mow down opposition, announced tonight the condemnation of three communists to die after 12 hostages had met their death at the hands of German firing squads in Paris.

The Paris branch of the state tribunal, created to forestall the spread of German reprisals against terroristic outbreaks sentenced Adolphe Guy, communist leader of the Seine (Paris) department, Jacques Woog and Fosco Foscardi, an absentee, to death.

LONDON, Sept. 20 (AP)—Aneta, the Dutch news agency, said today that sabotage and anti-Nazi demonstrations are on the increase throughout Holland, and that resistance has reached a point where the Nazi-controlled newspaper Nieuwsblad Van Het Noorden has had to appeal against the spreading of the slogan, "the more chaos the better."

Among incidents mentioned by the news service were these:

A 9 p. m. curfew has been imposed on the town of Hoensbroeck in reprisal for thefts from the German armed forces.

Inhabitants of the town of Enschede have been fined 50,000 guilders for sabotage.

A group of 50 W. A. men—storm troopers of the Dutch Nazi party—were stoned by local air raid wardens from a roof as they paraded through the village of Wouwe, and the mayor and clergyman looked on while police refused to interfere.

1. Naval command of the Black sea.
2. Granting to Bulgaria a "protectorate" over the Crimea, soviet territory which juts into the Black sea and which has been reported cut off from the mainland by German armies.
3. A trading and transport monopoly in the Black sea.
4. In event Turkey opposes Germany's plans, Germany and Bulgaria would establish a joint protectorate over the Caucasus with Bulgaria given part of the administration of the Baku oil fields.

LAKE CHARLES, La., Sept. 20 (AP)—Major General H. A. Dargue, praising the safety tactics of pilots of 800 planes in the Louisiana war maneuvers in which five airmen have been killed said today the airforce's new type bombers have withstood their first tremendous field tests.

Included among the new ships tested under simulated war conditions was the B-26 bomber which Robert A. Lovett, under-secretary of the war department for air, has described as the fastest in the world. Army airmen said it could fly faster than 350 miles per hour.

Dargue, commanding 400 planes assigned to work with the third army against an equal number with the second army in the maneuvers, said:

"These maneuvers have been a test of new equipment of the most powerful type and highest speed we have had in our air force. It has been handled superbly by the pilots, but it is highly significant that it has withstood the gruelling test that has shown its worth."

Ax Head Slips, Gashes Man's Head

per cent on income over that amount. In addition, excess profits levies are increased 10 percentage points in each bracket, making the new schedule range from 35 per cent on such profits up to \$20,000 to 60 per cent on excess profits over \$500,000.

Estate and gift taxes are increased in varying amounts estimated to raise an estimated total of \$157,700,000.

The measure includes a \$5 annual use tax on automobiles, which would be applicable after next February 1, and a 5 per cent tax on transportation tickets costing more than 35 cents. The latter levy would go into effect October 10.

Effective October 1

The following so-called "nuisance" taxes will be effective October 1:

Six per cent on local telephone bills, 10 per cent on long-distance calls costing more than 24 cents and 10 per cent on telegraph, radio and cable messages.

Increases from 3 1/2 to 7 per cent on automobiles, from 2 1/2 to 5 cents a pound on tires and from 4 1/2 to 9 cents a pound on inner tubes.

Increases from \$3 to \$4 in the whiskey gallonage tax and increases on other distilled spirits and wine.

Ten per cent on photographic apparatus, optical equipment, luggage, sporting goods, toilet preparations, rubber articles, commercial washing machines, electric gas and oil appliances, jewelry, furs, electric signs, business machines, musical instruments, phonographs and phonograph records, refrigerators, theatre and other admissions costing 10 cents and more and club dues over \$10 annually.

Five per cent on electric light bulbs.

Five per cent on night club bills.

Increase from 11 to 13 cents per pack on playing cards.

Increase from 11 to 20 per cent on rental of safe-deposit boxes.

Ten dollars a year on operation of non-gambling coin-operated amusement machines and \$50 annually on coin-operated gambling machines.

Ten dollars a year on bowling alleys, billiard tables and pool tables.

Two cents per 1000 on matches.

HE was squelched repeatedly the other day when he tried to talk, so he resorted to clowning.

Simulating the bad boy in the country school, he wrote a note on a scrap of paper and passed it up ostentatiously to the chairman. Then, summoning an expression of mock humility, he sat down without offering a word.

The spectators saw the point and roared.

THE line of cleavage apparent at this hearing is drawn sharply throughout all official Washington. The big question is whether you're for the President's foreign policy or against it. It dominates all other issues.

What the President's foreign policy is LEADING TO is as much a matter for individual interpretation here as elsewhere throughout the country.

One school of thought holds that FDR is playing a smooth, shrewd, smart game of bluff designed to scare the dictators out of their boots and so weaken them in their war with Britain WITHOUT getting this country into shooting war. They think he may manage it.

The other school (there seems to be no intermediate ground here) holds that he will go to war as soon as he can get the consent of public opinion and that each speech he delivers, each move he makes, is a carefully calculated step toward that goal.

REDS DECLARE TEN DIVISIONS OF NAZIS LOST

paper, said the Germans lost 10 divisions—up to 150,000 men, in assaulting Kiev.

Adolf Hitler's field headquarters reported that Russian officers had fled and that the Kiev garrison capitulated, implying but not clearly stating that the entire city had fallen.

Unofficial Nazi accounts, however, said all Kiev was taken by the combined and terrible force of flame-throwers, tanks, dive-bombers and infantry.

The Kiev citadel was stormed at 11 a. m., Friday, these dispatches stated.

Then followed the house-to-house cleanup of all resistance, accomplished so quickly that the Russians had little chance to destroy the city, they said.

The soviet mid-day communiqué made no acknowledgements except to place the heaviest fighting directly at Kiev.

The Moscow radio said a "savage, life and death struggle" was raging in Kiev's northern suburbs, but possession of the remainder of the city was not made clear.

Baruch Asks Far-Reaching Price Control

WASHINGTON, Sept. 20 (UP)

Bernard M. Baruch, who headed the war industries board during the first world conflict, Friday criticized the administration's price-fixing bill as "piece meal" and proposed far reaching government controls over wages, rents and farm prices.

The silver-haired financier told the house banking committee a special price ceiling could be set at the level which obtained "in the early part of 1941." He said emphatically Price Stabilizer Leon Henderson was the man to administer the program, and added "If anyone offered it to me, I would go out on the end of the dock and jump off with two anchors around my neck."

Russians at Sitka En Route Home

SEATTLE, Sept. 20 (AP)—

Naval district headquarters announced two Russian planes, on their way home to Moscow after a visit in the United States, completed the first leg of their hop from Seattle late yesterday at Sitka, Alaska. The ships, carrying part of the personnel they brought with them from Moscow, are expected to resume their flight today, making the journey in short jumps.
