

HIGHWAY, AIR MATTERS EYED BY DIRECTORS

Highway and air transportation received attention at the Wednesday noon meeting of the directors of the Klamath county chamber of commerce.

W. J. Dinsmore, chairman of the community advertising committee, reported on a meeting held at McCredie Springs this week attended by representatives of Eugene, Klamath Falls and various towns and resorts along the Willamette highway.

He said that the resorts and towns on the highway formed the Willamette Highway association, nominating seven directors. Purpose is to foster improvements and more traffic on the new trans-mountain route.

Road signs came in for discussion, including the new sign the Redwood Highway association has installed at the Goshen junction of the Pacific and Willamette highways. This sign points down the Pacific highway with the words, "This Way to the Golden Gate." It was pointed out that the Klamath chamber has a large sign a short distance north of the Goshen junction at this time.

It has been reported that a number of motorists, intending to go over the Willamette highway, have been confused by the Redwood sign at Goshen and have turned back after losing time and travel on the Pacific highway.

Dinsmore reported his committee intends to move its sign at the Weed junction to conform to highway changes in that district.

Chamber directors deplored the fact that the state highway commission has not yet placed an official sign at the McKenzie junction, south of Eugene, directing travelers on south to the Goshen junction with the Willamette highway. Because of this lack of signing, it was stated, many people have become confused.

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damental principles of the declaration and asserted that the soviet union would defend the right of every nation's independence, territorial integrity and the social order and form of government of its own choice.

Before the vote was taken the Netherlands foreign minister, Dr. E. N. Van Kleffens, objected to point IV of the Roosevelt-Churchill declaration, which provides equal access for all nations to world trade and raw materials, but "with due respect for their existing obligations."

Van Kleffens said the avowed aims of point IV, "cannot be attained if considerable exceptions" to it were to be made. He pleaded for abolition of trade barriers and "discriminatory treatment in international commerce."

"We shall have to do away," he said, "to some considerable extent with measures designed to protect existing economic units. This will mean sacrifices for all."

Nothing in the legislation, the compensation version said, would "impair or influence in any manner the right of the individual to bear arms."

In addition, the president is prohibited from requisitioning any machinery "which is in actual use in connection with any operating factory or business and which is necessary to the operation of such factory or business."

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convoy thereby becomes a constituent part of an enemy formation," authorized quarters in Berlin said.

The Germans asserted that Mr. Roosevelt, in declaring it was immaterial whether the ship was armed or unarmed or what flag it flew, "is trying to establish wild west justice, not international law."

In Rome, the authoritative fascist editor Virginio Gayda chimed in with the statement that axis ships would defend themselves against any armed United States merchantmen they met "on their courses."

British warplanes have now gone into action for the first time on the three-month-old eastern battlefield, the air ministry announced in London.

"A number of patrols have been flown in bad weather and there have been successful encounters with enemy fighters," the ministry said, adding that seven German planes had been destroyed in the initial engagements with the loss of only one RAF fighter.

Russia officially denied the German assertion that four red armies had been trapped east of Kiev.

These demonstrations will be presented during October and November in the county, according to Winnifred K. Gillen, home demonstration agent.

Lost Hunter Found Dead at Mono Lake

RENO, Nev., Sept. 24 (AP)—George Leslie, 47, Olddale, Calif., deer hunter sought in the Mono forest area since last Thursday, was found dead ten miles southeast of Mono lake Monday.

J. K. Brandeberry, assistant supervisor of the Mono national forest here, said Ranger Don Lewis had reported by radio from Leavening, Calif., that Leslie's body was found by four California hunters in a thicket, partly covered by last Saturday's three inch snow fall.

It was not determined how long he had been dead but the body was taken to Bishop, Calif., where an autopsy was to be performed.

CCC workers, rangers and others had searched for Leslie since he was reported missing six days ago.
