

MONEY-BOXES PUT OUT FOR 'HOMECOMING'

Wooden coin boxes to collect donations for the national guard "Homecoming" next week have been put in place by the troop hospitality committee.

For each citizen who has business with his government that is important enough to warrant the time and expense involved in a trip to the nation's capital, there are thousands whose business is of such a nature that it must be transacted by mail, or by telephone and telegraph.

For all such, senators and congressmen are business agents. By mail or by telephone or by telegraph they familiarize themselves with the business of the constituent and then do their best to get it taken care of to his satisfaction.

In this connection, keep in mind the very important distinction that the constituent is the CUSTOMER and friend of the senator or congressman whereas the government employee or department head or what have you is apt to be someone who means little in the legislator's life.

It is for this highly important reason that your senator or congressman is apt to be a very EFFICIENT representative for you. He is ON YOUR SIDE.

IF you will keep in mind these significant facts in regard to your representatives in the congress of the United States, you will be in a more intelligent position to vote when the next senatorial or congressional election comes around.

at 11:50 a. m. and departed 27 minutes later without disclosing the subject of their conversations with the president.

The former king, hurrying through the state department corridors, told newsmen that he had discussed the international situation in a general manner with Secretary Hull.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 25 (AP)—Thousands of early-risers in this ordinarily blasé national capital roared a welcome today to the Duke of Windsor and his American-born duchess for whom he renounced the British throne.

Greeted officially by Sir Ronald Campbell, British charge d'affaires, and George T. Summerlin, the state department's protocol chief, the royal couple also was a tumultuous crowd which pressed against police lines at the approaches to Union station.

After the official handshakes on the station platform, the couple had a meeting in the privacy of a special waiting room with the duchess' aunt, Mrs. Buchanan Merryman of Washington.

Then with waves and smiles for the crowd, the visitors were whisked off to the British embassy for the start of a busy day.

Alighting from the early morning train, the duchess, the former Wallis Warfield of Baltimore, was chic in a black tailored suit with velvet revers and a light-blue dotted blouse. She wore black shoes and gloves and a black hat with trimming matching her blouse. Turquoise earrings, a turquoise ornament on her suit and large gold buttons completed her ensemble.

The duke, living up to his sartorial reputation, wore a light grey striped double-breasted suit, a grey-blue shirt with dark checked collar and light brown buck skin shoes. His tie was of wide light-and-dark blue stripes, a blue checked kerchief peeped from his breast pocket and there was a "Bundles for Britain" button in his lapel.

Brite Brothers Renew Efforts To Win Freedom

SACRAMENTO, Calif., Sept. 25 (AP)—John and Coke Brite, convicted of killing three men in the Siskiyou mountains five years ago, renewed legal efforts to get out of prison today.

They applied again to Gov. C. L. Olson for a commutation of their life term to time served and their attorney, Horace F. Frye of Sacramento, wrote the governor that "people interested in seeing these boys released have offered them places of employment."

M. Stanley Mosk, Olson's executive secretary, informed Frye, however, that the advisory pardon board has several hundred pending cases ahead of theirs.

Governor Olson in 1939 commuted the brothers' death sentence to life imprisonment but last year rejected their pleas for immediate release from Folsom prison.

John, 41, and Coke, 36, were convicted in Siskiyou county of first degree murder for the shooting of Fred Seaborn and Deputy Sheriff Martin Lange and Joseph Clarke who had gone to their mountain camp to serve a warrant on a charge of assault with a deadly weapon.

ments of informed Germans and military quarters.

The British radio, however, recorded the Moscow radio's claim that the Germans had not yet actually penetrated suburban Leningrad. Moscow said that the German report apparently referred to the small town of Peterhof on the Gulf of Finland, nearly 20 miles west of the city. CBS heard BBC's relay of the Moscow report.

The German high command, dealing with another sector of the big battle front, said that desperate Russian attempts to break out of encirclement east of Kiev, in the Ukraine, had been "repulsed with bloody losses for the opponent."

In the mop-up, the daily communique said, the body of Col. Gen. Kirtonos, whom the high command identified as supreme commander of a soviet southwestern front, was found, fallen in battle. The communique said his staff, as well as the staffs of the 5th and 21st soviet armies had been "annihilated."

Dienst Aus Deutschland, a commentary known to have high sources of information at the Wilhelmstrasse, however, refused to predict flatly that the battle east of Kiev sounded the death knell of the main soviet resistance or even the end of Marshal Semeon Budennyi, Russian commander of the southwest.

MOSCOW, Sept. 25 (AP)—The red army declared today the tide of the fierce battle of Leningrad has begun to swing in its favor and reported counter-attacks against German besiegers in greater number and strength on several sectors.

German reinforcements are constantly arriving to fill the gaps left by enormous losses, declared the army newspaper, Red Star, "but red army fighters and armed Leningradites are dealing blows in various directions."

"Here and there the German army already is unable to resist our pressure."

A Red Star war bulletin also reported a soviet counter-attack in the Gomel region, on the central front, where Russian forces are taking the offensive apparently to try to lessen German pressure on the Baltic and Black sea flanks.

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ministration's foreign policy would fight vigorously.

However, Rep. Wadsworth (R-NY) believed that the house was ready to repeal or modify the law, and he voiced the hope that it would be "wiped off the statute books."

"In all our history," he told newsmen, "we fought for the right to sail the seven seas at will. In the neutrality act we surrendered that right. That always seemed to be morally wrong."

Another legislator heard in the discussion was Senator Schwartz (D-Wyo.), who is regarded by colleagues as a middle-of-the-roader on foreign affairs.

fairs. He announced he was "very much in favor of our merchant ships"—something which the neutrality act now specifically forbids.

600,000 Draftees To Be Called Up Before June 30

NEW YORK, Sept. 25 (AP)—Brig. Gen. Lewis B. Hershey, national selective service director, said in an interview today that tentative war department plans call for the induction of 600,000 more men into the army by next June 30.

In Washington, army officials said that no marked increase in the strength of the land forces was contemplated. The 600,000 mentioned by Hershey, army officials said, would approximately take care of several new triangular and armed divisions now planned. However, the bulk would be merely replacements for men to be discharged under the recently adopted policy of releasing men as rapidly as their training can be completed.

The strength of the land forces today was put at 1,599,500.
