

DEER HUNTING
KILL REPORTED
RUNNING HEAVY

At nearly the end of 1941's first week of deer hunting, indications were Friday that this season might be one of the biggest in the history of Klamath district shooting.

Big bucks were riding home on the fenders of many a car as some reports came out that this fall more large deer were being bagged than in former years.

Biggest buck thus far reported was slain earlier in the week by Marvin Hammersley of Modoc Point. The animal, currently leading the sixth annual Southern Oregon deer derby, tipped the beam at 250 pounds. Hammersley felled it near Upper Swan lake with a 25-35. Seven deer over 200 pounds have been entered in the derby.

A 246-pound buck heads the list in Louie Polin's contest.

The Klamath Falls creamery, principal wild game butchery, estimated in contrast to other reports, that the 1941 kill was slightly smaller than last year and that the bucks were running lighter.

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proposition to deal with any of these agencies.

A much better way is for him to go directly to his senators or to his congressmen, explain his proposition, ask whom he ought to see and then ask his representative in the congress to secure for him the necessary appointments.

That is a part of the service the senator or the congressman gives to his constituents. It is a part, and a very large part, of the job he is sent to Washington to do.

He will do it gladly and much more effectively than the professional fixer.

A WORD here, in conclusion, as to the officials of the government with whom the citizen will deal after he gets his appointments.

They may be social reformers. Many of them unquestionably are. As at present constituted, this is a government of men rather than a government of laws and many of these men feel that they have a mission to make America over according to a pattern that has been followed in the past.

But with few exceptions they are sincere men. They are willing to listen to the citizen's problems. In the main, they are courteous. And with almost no

exceptions they are personally honest.

WHAT is here said refers particularly to the top-side officials—those who are far enough up the ladder to take a certain measure of responsibility on their own shoulders.

There is no attempt here to minimize the red tape, in which official Washington is frightfully snarled, or to intimate that buck-passing has not been developed to a point approaching perfection—for it has been.

Or to say that sitting and waiting won't be the principal part of your job if necessity ever brings you here—for it will be.

THE only point that is sought to be made is that the ordinary citizen, quite unacquainted with the ropes, who comes here with a reasonable proposition will be able to get a courteous hearing—in the course of time. It certainly does take time.

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the county's fiscal year from the calendar year to July 1-December 31. This becomes effective next year and the county will operate on a half-year basis to get into line with the new ruling. Next spring, another budget will be made for the fiscal year 1942-43.

Pay Raises
General raises were granted county employees in the new budget. These ranged from \$3 for most employees to \$25 per month for two sheriff's deputies and the road supervisor. County budgeters said that the rise in living costs was considered in giving additional salaries to the employees.

No money was budgeted for a law enforcement officer in the subdivisions, this work to be handled as a function of the sheriff's office staff and the state police.

The budget carries a sum of \$24,000 for remodeling the Legion hall to provide additional space for county offices.

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from that direction were pressing close in upon Leningrad.

Red Star, the soviet army newspaper, reported that Russian troops at one point on Leningrad's approaches had gained five miles and recaptured four villages.

Adolf Hitler's high command reported that the destruction of four red armies trapped east of Kiev was "progressing relentlessly," with the number of soviet prisoners now standing at 482,000. Later, DNB, official German news agency, raised the figure to 574,000.

This claim followed an official soviet denial of an earlier Berlin announcement that 380,000 Russian troops had been captured in the Kiev battle.

Calling the nazi assertion "a fresh Hitlerite fake," a red army communique reported:

"The fierce struggle is continuing on the Kiev front."

British Sailors Visit Here
While Ship Gets Overhaul

Three sailors from His Majesty's navy visited Klamath late Thursday on a western tour of the United States while their ship, the H.M.S. Warspite, is docked at Bremerton, Wash., getting overhauled.

All three seamen have been in the war since it started over two years ago. They are Walter Russell, 23, Leonard King, 23, and Ernest Walters, 19, all natives of Yorkshire, England.

Russell acted as spokesman for the trio and told about some of the places their ship had patrolled before it harbored at the U. S. port in August. The men took part in the battle of Narvik and have patrolled in the Mediterranean on the northern coast of Africa and around Crete where the ship has had many tangles with the Italian navy.

Speaking with a prominent English accent, Russell stated, "This is sure a nice country. Every place we go everyone is so friendly and we're having one great time. It's nice being here, but as soon as we can get back the sooner the war will be over."

When asked who was going to win the war, Russell and King both spoke up. "Oh, there's no doubt about that," with a definite leaning toward their homeland.

After leaving Klamath Falls the trio will motor to Reno to "see where all these divorces take place." Then they will cut over to Los Angeles and come back up the coast to Bremerton.

Neither of the men knew how long their ship would be anchored in Washington before steaming into the war zone again.

GAS PRODUCTION
SPEEDUP PLANNED

WASHINGTON, Sept. 26 (P) Secretary of Interior Ickes, the petroleum coordinator, announced Thursday plans were being studied to treble the refining capacity for aviation gasoline at an expenditure of around \$150,000,000.

Ickes disclosed that the navy had gone into the market in the past few days for 600,000 barrels of aviation gasoline and failed to get bids.

The navy was understood to have sufficient high octane aviation fuel for its present needs, and was seeking storage stock.

Ickes said an emergency in respect to 100-octane gasoline had been intensified materially by needs of embattled Russia and Britain. He stated that he had several weeks ago the refining capacity should be doubled, but that the situation now required that this capacity be trebled.
