ing itself. He said there might have been subsequent wire tapping.

Aubrey Grossman, one of Bridges' counsel commented, "there is no doubt that we will file exceptions." This is the method of appeal in such cases. An actual deportation order would be issued by the attorney general. Thirty days is allowed to file exceptions.

Bridges himself was reported on the way from New York to San Francisco.

Bridges, president of the CIO international longshoremen's and warehousemen's union, has been the storm center of labor discussions of the Pacific coast ever since he led waterfront workers in a coastwide strike in 1934. It was in this strike that he skyrocketed from an obscure waterfront worker to a labor leader whose deportation was urged by various organizations throughout the country.

For the past seven years he has been a bitter rival of Lundberg, who vies with him for dominance of Pacific coast maritime circles.

In his first hearing, which set a nine-week record in 1939, Bridges was cleared of similar charges by James Landis, dean of the Harvard law school who sat as examiner. The record of this trial was broken by two weeks in the second hearing, at which Sears sat.

Hall by these cultured, painstakingly educated men who were also men of courage and decision will stand for all time as a monument to what can be done by men of that breed when they join together SINCERELY for the accomplishment of a great purpose.

FOR more than two weeks this writer has been watching the government of the United States, including both the administration and the congress, in action. The sight, in some of its aspects, is inspiring. In some of its other aspects it is HORRIBLY DEPRESSING.

This word in conclusion: Those aspects of our government which in these days are inspiring arise out of the efforts of SINCERE men, in the administration and in congress, who have been carefully trained for the task that now is theirs to do and who bring to it both liberal instincts and sound, mature judgment.

The horribly depressing aspects of our government arise almost exclusively out of the activities of little, shallow, piddling men whose intellectual vision is so distorted as to be able to discern nothing beyond the immediate exigencies of vote-getting politics.

THERE are such men in Washington. You don't need to be there long to be able to pick them out.

## Adequate Fleet Vital, Says Knox

PORTSMOUTH, Va., Sept. 29 (AP)—Secretary of the Navy Knox asserted today that if the people of the United States don't "realize the necessity" of maintaining a dominant seapower "we are dumber than I think we are."

Only an adequate fleet can provide security for the American people, the cabinet member said at a press conference at the Norfolk navy yard here, after a whirlwind inspection tour of the yard immediately after his arrival in Hampton Roads from Bermuda by ship.

The secretary declared it is not "up to us whether we get in the war—it is up to the other fellow."

EUGENE, Sept. 29 (AP)—Registration at the University of Oregon showed a decline of 5 1/2 per cent Saturday, Dr. Karl M. Pallett, registrar, said. He said the 2954 students were 174 fewer than last year.

CORVALLIS, Sept. 29 (AP)—Oregon State college registration reached 3857 Saturday, a drop of 5.7 per cent from the 1940 enrollment.

Registrar E. B. Lemon said the decrease was mostly in men registrants. He said the number of new students increased three per cent and probably would boost final enrollment above 4500.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 22 (AP)—Marriner S. Eccles, expressing fear that the Government might be forced to "resort to the very system that we would like to see defeated" in order to prevent inflation, suggested today that a centralized labor organization be created to work out with the government a nationwide schedule of "prevailing wages" for the duration of the emergency.

The chairman of the federal reserve board made the proposal in response to a request by Chairman Steagall (D-Ala.) for a specific plan for controlling wages.

Eccles had told the committee earlier that congress could not be realistic about controlling inflation if it permitted wages and salaries to rise indiscriminately. He testified in favor of the administration's price control bill.

Asserting that one of the difficulties in dealing with the labor problem was the great decentralization of its own organization, Eccles said:

"I'm wondering if, in the interest of labor, a greater centralization of labor organizations could be accomplished so that the government could work out with that agency a schedule of prevailing wages which would be a base until there was justification for a change."

## Chrome Plant at Bandon Discussed

BANDON, Sept. 29 (AP)—A chrome reduction plant could be supplied from beach sands near the Seven Devils road north of Bandon, state geologist reported Saturday.

Test holes in the region disclosed that the sands were from seven to 15 per cent chrome. Further tests were planned, but the geologists said they were convinced a process developed at Oregon State college for separating the chrome from the sand made production feasible.

## ROME CLAIMS HEAVY BLOWS TO SHIPPING

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east commander, worked out the program in a two-day session in Baghdad, it was disclosed.

The Italian high command acknowledged a toll of 11 persons killed and 55 wounded as RAF bombers pounded four Italian mainland cities, four in Sicily and the island city of Rhodes. In addition, two persons were killed in blackouts.

London dispatches said the RAF left great fires raging in Genoa and at other points in northern Italy.

The RAF avoided Rome—despite earlier expectations that the fascist capital might be bombed in reprisal for an axis attack on Cairo, Holy city of the Moslem world—but showed high-explosive bombs and incendiaries on Genoa, Spezia, Turin and Savona Marina on the Italian mainland. Some of the casualties were at a fifth mainland city, Milan, but the injuries and fatalities were from anti-aircraft shells and traffic accidents.

Also attacked were the Sicilian towns of Palermo, Trapani, Marsala and Castel Vetrano, and the Italian island of Rhodes in the eastern Mediterranean.

One RAF plane was reported shot down by anti-aircraft fire at Turin, with the crew of five killed.

Reports from Bern said large numbers of planes passed over Switzerland during the night, indicating that the raiders flew over the Alps from Britain on a 1200-mile round trip journey.

In the Russian campaign, now in its 15th week, soviet dispatches reported the rout of two German-allied Rumanian infantry brigades in bitter fighting on the southern (Ukraine) front, with more than 2500 Rumanians killed, and declared that Marshal Semeon Timoshenko's red armies on the central front had recaptured 10 more villages in a drive from Yelnya to Smolensk.

Soviet troops were reported to have hurled the Germans from three lines of trenches and crossed the Dnestr river, advancing on a six-mile front.

## Japs Lose 20,000 In Battle, Claim

CHUNGKING, Sept. 29 (AP)—The Japanese have lost at least 20,000 men out of the 80,000 with which they launched their drive for Changsha, and the Hunan province capital still is in Chinese hands, an army spokesman declared this afternoon.

(The Japanese army announced at Shanghai Saturday that Changsha had been captured after hand-to-hand fighting and has reported since that the attacking forces have pushed through the city and about 22 miles further south.)

The battle for Changsha still is raging in full fury, with the Japanese being held about seven miles from its limits, the Chinese spokesman reported.
