He added that "certain importance can be attached" to statements in the German press that the campaign on the Russian front might run into winter months.

The high command said Italian troops east of the Dnieper river "exterminated strong enemy forces and took several thousand prisoners."

In a northern sector of the eastern front an infantry division, presumably German, stormed 210 pillboxes in a successful attack Sunday and Monday on a stubbornly-defended position, the high command added.

The German air force meanwhile concentrated on railway transport both in the Kharkov area and east of Leningrad, and also installations of the Murmansk-Leningrad railway.

MOSCOW, Sept. 30 (AP)—The red army reported today recapture of a city on the approaches to Leningrad and the taking of many other communities in a concentrated series of counterattacks.

As the violent struggle continued all along the front that spans a continent, Red Star, soviet army news organ, said the northwestern city of "B" was recaptured after 12 hours of battle which culminated in the bitterest sort of hand-to-hand and house-to-house combat.

The Germans thus were driven back "a significant distance" from Leningrad, where they have made no gain in a fortnight, Red Star stated.

One German regiment was declared annihilated in this battle, with the Russians losing less than 100 men in dead and wounded.

Willkie Backs F. R.'s Stand on Neutrality Act

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President Roosevelt in any effort to repeal or modify the neutrality act.

At the same time, reports reached Capitol hill that Secretary Hull would urge the chief executive to recommend virtual scrapping of the present law.

Returning from a weekend sojourn at his Hyde park estate, Mr. Roosevelt was expected to confer with Hull some time today and to talk with legislative leaders tomorrow before starting work on the special neutrality act message which congress looks for later this week. The chief executive arrived in the capital before 9 a. m. (EST).

White House officials indicated that these two conferences probably would determine whether the president would seek a limited modification of the law or its outright repeal.

There have been reports that the president would confine himself to a request for authority to arm American merchant ships. On the other hand, some informants have said he would tell congress he also should have the power to send American commercial vessels into belligerent ports and combat areas now forbidden by the neutrality law. If both requests were granted, only a skeleton of the law would remain.

REDUCTION OF REFRIGERATOR OUTPUT ASKED

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vacuum cleaners and other items.

The refrigerator order was based on recommendations of Leon Henderson, director of civilian supply, whose program called for production of only 2,007,000 refrigerators in the 12 months beginning Aug. 1, 1941, as compared with 3,670,000 units in the 12 months ended June 30, 1941.

This curtailment was expected to release 175,000 tons of steel in the twelve months for production of warships, cargo vessels, tanks and other defense items, as well as considerable quantities of aluminum, brass, chromium, copper, nickel, tin, zinc, mica and rubber.

Monthly quotas for the refrigerator industry will total 175,519 units for each of the five months August to December, 1941, inclusive, as compared with average monthly output of 309,234 units in the 12 months ended last June 30.

Because of seasonal production variations, the curtailment output will be only 2 per cent under production for the last five months of 1940, although considerably under the level of recent months. However, production in the first seven months of 1942 is to be leveled off to a large extent, instead of following the normal summer upswing.

WEATHER IDEAL FOR HARVEST IN BASIN

Weather of the past two weeks and a half has been ideal for the harvest of Klamath farm crops, County Agent C. A. Henderson said Tuesday.

"Those early rains caused some concern, but no one could complain about the fine weather we have been having recently," said the agent. "It has made it possible to get the harvest of other crops in good shape so attention can soon be concentrated on potatoes. Spud digging should hit high gear about October 8."
