## Union Organizing Not Job Of Government, Says Aide

SEATTLE, Oct. 1 (AP)—A high department of labor official, himself a former labor union leader, expressed the belief today that "labor ought not to ask the government to force employers to give them a closed shop."

"Labor's job is to do its own organizing," said Daniel W. Tracy, second assistant secretary of labor, after his arrival here for union sessions preceding next week's American Federation of Labor convention.

He said in an interview that the government has taken and is taking a hand for the closed shop, particularly on federal projects where labor is insisting that only members of its unions be hired.

"There may be 60 members of the union on the job to 40 men who are not members," commented Tracy, who was international president of the Brotherhood of Electrical Workers for seven years prior to entering the labor department.

"That means, in effect, that the government has to help organize the 40. The law prohibits an employer from exercising any compulsion on the employee. It should apply equally when the government is doing the employing."

"Labor leaders should appreciate that what the government cannot give the government can take away. If the government now is to aid in obtaining a closed shop, another administration might have a policy exactly the opposite."

"It is conceivable that some future administration might aid in establishing the open shop principle, or even that of the non-union shop."

The veteran of 30 years of union activities expressed the belief that "a union seeking to improve the economic and social conditions of its members doesn't find it hard to gain new members."

Advocating the obtaining of closed shop agreements by a convincing approach to employers, he asserted:

"You don't see strikes where there are closed shop agreements. They are beneficial to employers as well as to workmen."

Tracy declared that employers had been responsible for a large share of the defense strikes through reluctance to bargain with the unions.

"Some of them seemed to feel that labor would get the blame and there would be a wave of public indignation against labor organizations," he said. "Well, workmen are part

## Russia Calls Up 1922 Military Class for Training

MOSCOW, Oct. 1 (AP)—The Russian 1922 military class—19-year-old youths—was called up today for its regular period of military service.

This is the annual date for the summons to military classes and the call was issued by posters signed by district military commanders.

The universal compulsory military training program by which soviet Russia has announced that she plans to raise the largest people's army in history from her immense reservoir of manpower also began operating today.

All men from 16 to 50 years old will undergo 100 hours of military training within the next five months under the plan decreed by Premier Stalin. Skiing will be included in the winter program.

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## MULTNOMAH TAX EQUALITY ORDERED

SALEM, Oct. 1 (AP)—Reaffirming its order of last April, the state tax commission today ordered the Multnomah county board of equalization to change from a variable ratio to a uniform ratio system, the effect of which would be to increase taxes on homes while reducing those on buildings and structural improvements.

The commission ordered the board to set aside its recent order that the variable ratio method should be continued.

The commission, citing constitutional provisions that "all taxation shall be uniform on the same class of subjects," said:

"Clearly these constitutional provisions do not of themselves give authority whatever to an administrative officer or body to classify or group taxable properties and apply different rules or ratios of evaluation, of his or its own choosing, to the several properties so classified or grouped."

The commission said Multnomah county had been using the variable ratio system for years, but that the commission had not interfered until recently because the subject had not been brought directly to the commission's attention.
