LONG RESIDENT'S DEATH MOURNED

FORT KLAMATH — Emma Leone Gorden, a resident of Fort Klamath for the past 43 years, passed away in Portland on Sunday, September 28, following a major operation. Mrs. Gorden had been taken to Portland for medical care following a week's illness, and failed to rally following the operation which was performed in an effort to save her life.

Mrs. Gorden, beloved citizen and friend to all, was born on Antelope creek in Jackson county, Oregon, on December 18, 1877. Her parents were Jacob L. Worlow, native of Kentucky, and Mary E. Clements, born at LaCade, Mo. On July 6, 1898, the Worlow family moved to Fort Klamath, where the marriage of Emma Worlow and James L. Gorden took place on October 17, 1900. Four children were born of the Worlow-Gorden union, three dying in infancy, a son, Fred Gorden, born December 29, 1901, being the sole surviving child.

Moving spirit of the Civic Improvement club shortly after its organization here 17 years ago, a faithful church member and an active member of the Fort Klamath Grange, Mrs. Gorden was an outstanding leader in the community. Beloved by all for her charity and innumerable acts of kindness and generosity to those in need, ill, or in trouble, she will be greatly missed by Fort Klamath people.

Mrs. Gorden's son, Fred, is the only local surviving relative with the exception of a brother-in-law and sister-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. Robert E. Gorden. Her husband, James L. Gorden, preceded her in death six years ago, when he died here following a heart attack.

MALIN NOMINATES SPUD FETE QUEEN

MALIN — Helen Smith, with 18,000 votes took the lead over three other candidates in the potato festival court competition and was introduced Saturday night at the Malin elimination dance in the Broadway ballroom as Malin's candidate for the crown of the potato kingdom.

Five young women of the basin, representing Tionesta and Tulalake, Calif., Malin, Merrill and Henley, will work during the coming week to take the crown. The decision is based on the number of tickets sold to the queen's ball to be held in the Merrill community hall Saturday night, October 4. Her Majesty and attendants will be presented to the public at midnight, and from that time on will be feted at various events prior to the festival dates.

The coronation is scheduled for Friday night, October 17, just before the annual banquet. Rose Van Meter was runner up in the Malin campaign with 10,400 votes, Pearl Stern tallied 6300 and Opal Thompson gathered in 3800.

All the winning contestants from the various communities were guests of the Merrill Service club Tuesday night at the Paul Whiteman dance at the armory in Klamath Falls following a dinner.

TRANSIENT HELD IN TULELAKE CASE

TULELAKE—Jack Lawrence, 27, transient employed for a few days by Shuck brothers in harvesting operations on Tulalake, was arraigned in justice court here Monday on a charge of second degree burglary. He was bound over to the superior court at Yreka for trial after his bond was set at \$1000 by Justice of the Peace Clyde Barks.

Lawrence is accused of entering the Tulalake hardware store some time last Saturday night, removing several guns, hunting knives and alarm clocks valued at over \$200.

About \$100 worth of the loot was found in the possession of J. B. Hergesheimer, also a transient, who told Deputy Sheriff Roy Dysert that he had purchased the lot for \$2.50. Hergesheimer is being held for receiving stolen property. His case will come up for hearing this week. It is expected.

The remainder of the articles removed from the store were found cached near Tulalake, Dysert stated.

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Malin Residents Thanked For Clothes Sent Britain

MALIN — Harry Prather, Malin druggist who contributed a few bars of toilet soap to be included in a shipment of clothing to England was surprised this week when he received a letter written by a Mrs. Harham, of Leamington Spa, England, expressing appreciation for a coat for her three-year-old son sent by residents of the Malin community.

Prather, whose name had been tucked into the pocket of the garment without his knowledge, was completely mystified until a member of a local organization explained how it happened.

It is not known whether the garment went through the channels of the Red Cross, Bundles for Britain or garments contributed by the Czech-American Alliance unit here, but it may have been through the latter organization, since the letter writer stated that the woman's husband was a volunteer in the Czech army in England.

The letter was dated August 23 and reached Malin September 25. Mrs. Victor Vasek, who has been one of the most energetic workers for overseas relief in the community, has answered the letter, hoping to get first hand information on conditions in England.

Interest in relief activities here is consistent and in the past few days a home nursing group was organized, 15 women studying nursing problems under the direction of Mrs. Clarence (Eva) Hundley, formerly a registered nurse in San Francisco.

The course is being given under direction of the Klamath county Red Cross chapter. Those attending meet every Thursday afternoon at 2 o'clock in the Czech hall.

On October 8 a free one-hour motion picture show will be presented to the students of the high school and the public under auspices of the Czech-American Alliance, unit of the Red Cross. The main film, taken in England, will depict authentically Red Cross work in England, mobile kitchens in action, distribution of clothing to children and equipment of ambulances.

The picture in addition to four other films, two of them comedies and two on Red Cross work, will be shown during the day to students of both schools and in the evening at the high school to adults who are interested.

Prior to the free show, children of the schools are to be asked to contribute toys in good condition for gifts to children of England, the shipment to be sent through the Junior Red Cross.

The cash quota, a generous one allotted to the local Czech-American Alliance chapter this year, sent to headquarters and the local chapter plans as its next project a dance to raise funds for purchase of cigarettes and small gifts to be sent to the Czech-Slovak Red Cross unit in England. Date of the dance has been set for October 28.

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
