

GREECE LATEST SCENE OF NAZI COUNTER MOVE

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men in jail for anti-Nazi attacks committed by others—Germany has threatened to retaliate against the whole populace of parts for assaults on Nazi soldiers, has executed Dutch and Belgians for the score for aiding British fliers, and has shot or hanged untold hundreds who refuse to submit to German rule.

In little Croatia alone, tens of thousands of Serbs are reported to have launched guerrilla warfare against the axis-sponsored regime. Some observers returning from Europe have predicted a French revolt within four months, while the Dutch news agency reported that sabotage and anti-Nazi demonstrations were on the increase throughout Holland.

Dispatches from Zagreb said 10 German airmen en route to an airport there were fired on Tuesday night and that two of them were killed.

The Swiss telegraphic agency quoted dispatches from Budapest as saying the Greeks attempted a revolt Monday. Police and military forces, it said, "re-established calm."

Authorized Czech quarters in London said the wave of executions in Bohemia-Moravia was aimed at preparing the German-controlled country for the transfer of Germany's heavy industries from bomb-scarred Hamburg, Bremen and Ruhr valley industrial cities.

"It is our belief that the Germans plan to reduce the population to a Slav laboring class by killing all leaders capable of carrying on opposition, then move heavy industries to central Europe where they would be out of reach of the RAF."

Forty-two persons were reported executed in the Banat — the Hungarian-occupied part of former Yugoslavia — where German military authorities still exercise considerable control — on charges of attempted train wreckings and killing.

Thirty were shot for an alleged plot to assassinate officials. The other 12, described as communist prisoners, were hanged in public by order of German military authorities in reprisal for a train-wrecking conspiracy.

COATING BEGINS ON SHASTA TANK

Hot-coat enamelling on the interior of the new 423,000 gallon Shasta reservoir was begun early this week, officials of the California Oregon Power company reported Thursday.

Six men, employed by the S. J. Porter company of San Francisco, are working on the job. It is expected the project will be finished Saturday.

The coating of hot bituminous enamel will make the big tank's interior entirely rust proof. Completed in mid-summer, the reservoir serves the eastern suburban area of the city.

The interior of Copco's North Center reservoir at the top of Fifth street will be coated next week.

STATE TO REPAIR SIGNAL TRENCHES

Those sunken trenches left in the streets after a start was made on the traffic signal system will be repaired within a few days by the state, according to City Engineer Edwin A. Thomas.

The little ditches were made for installation of conduit to carry cables to the signal standards at intersection corners. The conduit was laid, but the covering has sagged to leave rough places on the streets at pedestrian crossings. Attorney Henry Perkins recently turned an ankle in one of these trenches.

Cable has not yet been received and city officials have no idea how soon the traffic signals can be installed. They are lost in the priority situation.

YREKA NEWSPAPERS MERGE AS DAILY

YREKA, Calif., Oct. 2 (AP)—Consolidation of the Yreka Journal and the Siskiyou News, rivals in the newspaper field here for more than half a century, was announced today.

The two semi-weeklies will merge this weekend and begin publication of a daily newspaper Monday.

Walter B. Stafford, former publisher of the Daily Ledger in Antioch, will edit the new daily. Albert Wedin will be advertising director, and W. G. Bailey, who also was associated with the Antioch paper, will be in charge of plant production.

The new paper will be called the Siskiyou Daily News. It will be the only daily publication in the county. A weekly edition of the Yreka Journal will also be issued to serve remote parts of the county.

PHONE INCREASE SHOWN IN KLAMATH

An increase of 238 telephones in Klamath Falls, fourth largest gain in the state, was reported Thursday for the period beginning January 1, 1941 and ending August 31.

Portland led Oregon with Eugene second and Pendleton third, according to Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company figures. The university city phone installations jumped 389, and Pendleton's 344.

Charles E. Seavey, manager of the phone company's Klamath branch, attributed both the Pendleton and Eugene rise to increased defense activities, indicating it was noteworthy that Klamath Falls, with no governmental emergency projects, showed such a proportionately large gain.

The boost brings the total number of Klamath telephones to 5437 as against 5026 on January 1. On June 1, 1940, when the dial system was inaugurated, there were 4903 telephones in Klamath Falls and suburban areas.

HILLMAN DECLARES HITLER LABOR FOE

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thing that we have accomplished and everything we hope to achieve is swept into oblivion."

SEATTLE, Oct. 2 (AP)—A ceiling on prices but not on wages was advocated today by Sidney Hillman, associate general director of the office of production management.

"There's a ceiling on wages already every time an agreement between labor and management is negotiated," he commented in an interview. "Collective bargaining establishes the ceiling."

The only break through that ceiling is when high prices put more pressure against it than it can bear. Generally speaking, it is prices that affect wages.

"The way ceilings on labor, agreed upon with the management, can be permanently maintained, is to have a ceiling on prices too. That will stabilize our whole economy."

"If we don't put a ceiling on prices we will rush madly into inflation. Labor doesn't want that. It's labor that suffers most."

The former CIO leader came here for department sessions preceding next week's American Federation of labor convention. He was the principal speaker scheduled today for the AFL's construction and building trades section.

Hillman expressed the belief that strikes in defense industries were diminishing. While deploring them, he said they had retarded production less than the shortage of materials.

The OPM executive said that "already America and the British are producing more airplanes than the axis, but we've got to produce more of all equipment. This is a war of equipment, and if we have time enough we are going to come out on top."

He opposed the suggestion of increased hours of work, contending that utilization of all

"We've got men," he declared. "Four million more persons are employed now than a year ago. By April 1, three million more will be at work."

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"no problem" to the railroads to load the 800 to 900 cars he said were needed to haul 200,000 barrels of oil to the east daily.

The oil inquiry committee, headed by Senator Maloney (D-Conn.) was informed by Ickes that there was an excess of 175,000 barrels daily in consumption over shipments to the Atlantic seaboard, a condition the administrator said was likely to bring about a gasoline and fuel oil shortage this winter.

Ralph E. Moores of Portland, Ore., testified that a group of companies in that city were prepared to construct wooden barges, capable of carrying 30,000 to 35,000 barrels of oil, which could be towed from California through the Panama canal to the east coast.

He said that the company could turn out three or four of the ships within the next 100 days, and one every three days after that.
