

CHICO TO GET ARMY FLYING SCHOOL SOON

WASHINGTON, Oct. 2 (UP)—The army will build new air corps facilities at Santa Ana and Chico, Calif., and Roswell, N. M., to replace Moffett Field, Calif., which will be transferred to the navy next April 1 for a lighter-than-air base, Secretary of War Henry L. Stimson said Wednesday.

Moffett Field has been headquarters of the west coast air corps training center. The new plan is to establish a headquarters and replacement training center at Santa Ana and a basic flying school for cadet pilots at Chico.

In addition to these, a new flying school will be built on a 2640-acre tract about four miles south of Roswell, N. M. The school will have facilities for instructing 3000 officers, flying cadets and enlisted men in the operation of twin-engine planes.

The Chico school will have facilities for 2200 officers, cadets and enlisted men. There will be accommodations for 3600 men at Santa Ana.

War department officials said that \$8,500,000 is available and will be spent at Roswell. They said that funds have not been made available for the Santa Ana and Chico schools, and that the ultimate costs have not been determined.

3 STUDY GROUPS SET AT LAKEVIEW

Frank J. Van Dyke, Ashland city attorney who was a passenger in the same plane, said the remark came in the course of conversation.

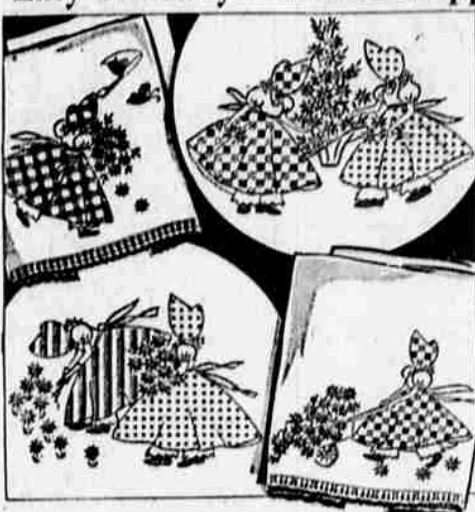
