County Office Expansion

If there must be expansion of space for county offices, use of the veterans' memorial building as proposed in the county budget program for 1942 offers the most economical and practical project for this time.

To construct an addition on the courthouse building proper would require a considerable outlay which could only be financed by borrowing. Construction costs are high now and a heavy public building program is not needed to supply work for idle labor. It is simply not the time to attempt a courthouse addition.

But estimates for the memorial hall remodeling are such that the work can be financed currently in the 1942 budget, without borrowing or interest-paying. The hall stands at the corner of the courthouse property, easily accessible to all other county structures. It now stands idle a great deal of the time, and its use would increase the efficiency of the entire courthouse group. By moving the health unit to this building from a privately-owned structure, a considerable saving can be effected.

Finally, if the space situation in the courthouse is loosened up by use of the veterans' building, there can be a re-grouping of offices in the larger building according to a more logical and efficient plan than that now in use.

The proposed arrangements, as we understand them, will provide facilities for continued American Legion use of the veterans' hall, along with the public offices.

It looks like a well worked out plan, and it certainly is the only practical one for expansion of county office space at this time.

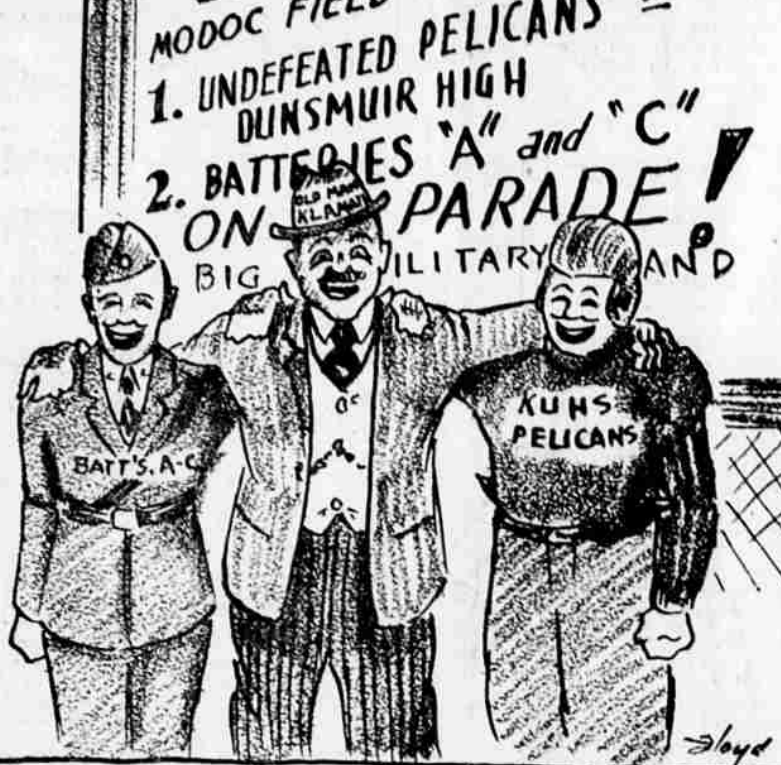

Auto Talk

A Contribution to Safety Week Observance in Klamath Falls

SPEEDING does not pay—and the motorist cited for this offense should realize that actions like his have contributed to the majority of automobile accident fatalities in Oregon. If you kick at a ten dollars fine, keep in mind the motorist in Denver, Colo., who was recently fined \$900 (correct) for speeding 70 miles an hour through the main thoroughfare of that city.

An Australian inventor recently took out a patent on an automobile that bends in the middle when going around a corner. The car is hinged so that when the steering wheel is turned the whole forepart of the chassis turns, instead of the front wheels. It is 8 feet long, 4 feet wide, has a 7 horsepower two-stroke engine, can travel 50 miles per hour and gets 60 miles to the gallon.

If we could get every bit of potential power out of a gallon of gasoline, we wouldn't have to worry about a shortage. Research scientists tell us that the energy in a gallon of gasoline if it could be used would drive a 2½-ton automobile, 20 miles at the rate of 30 miles per hour.

"Horn-tooters" are a big nuisance sometimes—we don't mean to intimate that a horn is unnecessary equipment, but it can be overdone. Some bright soul in Atlanta, Georgia, recently demonstrated a gadget for the car that would prevent the horn from being sounded when a vehicle is standing still or traveling less than 3 miles per hour.

The traffic authorities of St.

Paul, Minnesota, recently installed an actuated traffic sign which registers the approximate speed of approaching cars as a warning measure. The inventor should have made an attachment that would say "Tut, tut," if the speed limit were being broken.

Two Teen-Age Girls Commit Suicide in Portland Apartment

PORTLAND, Oct. 2 (AP)—Two girls in their teens, infatuated with boys who ignored them, committed suicide in the apartment of a friend Tuesday night, Detective Myron Warren said.

The bodies of Betty Waldron, 18, and La Vonne Wood, 17, were found on a small cot in the kitchen of the apartment of Eddie Lentz, 19, who told Warren he gave them permission to use the apartment. All six jets of a gas range were on.

Detective Warren said several suicide notes were discovered in the living room. Both girls admitted infatuation for boys who did not share the feeling. Warren said the girls had been dead about five hours before other occupants of the apartment house noticed fumes and summoned police. Resuscitation efforts failed.

Johnson's Comment On The News

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 2 "I say to Douglas, 'If you don't keep still, you are going to be brought to Washington some day and be compelled to reveal what you have behind those (insurance) policies.'"

"If you don't keep still," Thus Senator Nye recently threatened Lewis W. Douglas, head of the great Mutual Life Insurance company. Why? "The newest fear," said the senator, "has been started by Lewis Douglas. . . . He has declared that if Hitler should win the war, an insurance policy would not be worth the paper it is written upon."

It is possible not to agree with the opinions of either of these gentlemen. In the present hysteria both of them are hopping pretty high. Certainly the argument about insurance on both sides is likely to cause unwarranted fear and even panic many people whose only security is insurance for which they have saved and sacrificed for many years. Put that aside for a moment. It is this "if you don't keep still" business threatened by an influential senator that should give the public the greatest concern.

NO GAGS

There are more kinds of censorship and gag-rules than one to choke-off freedom of expression and debate in these terrible times. We can't afford to permit any kind of gags or censorship at all.

The senator is a member of a senate sub-committee which, without any direct authority from the senate, is seeking to censor motion pictures by conducting an "investigation" of these fishing expeditions are unpleasant to any victim—innocent or guilty. To threaten one of them without good cause and with "if you don't keep still" may not be technical blackmail, but it is certainly a distinctly un-American type of coercion.

As to the insurance companies and what "they have behind those policies," they have been recently investigated by a great joint executive - senate - house committee—T. N. E. C. They came away with a clean bill of health. Does the senator mean now to imply that their investments behind our policies are not good? If he does not mean that, what does he mean?

And, if he means that, how is he in any sweeter odor in this matter of destroying confidence in insurance than Mr. Douglas? Douglas says that if Hitler wins the war they won't be good. Senator Nye seems to imply that they may not be good anyway. It is pretty scurvy business on both sides.

THAT BIG "IF"

What does Mr. Douglas mean by "if Hitler wins the war"? If he means "if Hitler conquers and subdues America, insurance policies won't be good," he is probably right. But, in spite of all the recent hysterical nonsense there is about as much danger of that as of a billiard ball growing whiskers. But, if he means, what is more likely, some kind of a stalemate in Europe with both sides bled white and exhausted and new governments taking over the wreckage of the old, he is as bad as Senator Nye in dragging in this insurance scare to frighten innocent people toward his point of view.

cent people toward his point of view. However that may be, this country can't stand for any "you keep still—or else" stuff, from legislative committees, private committees or executive action. As in this case, frequently the arguments which are sought to be choked are so full of holes that forthright debate will do more to kill them—and do it more quickly—than any kind of evasion of the guaranty in the bill of rights of freedom of speech and expression.
