

MAJOR ACTION AGAINST REDS TOLD GERMANS

Minister Molotov had come to Berlin late in 1940, seeking a commitment from Germany on Rumania and Finland. Hitler said he had "declined all Russian suggestions that the USSR extend her influence westward, including the Dardanelles."

The address lasted 65 minutes. The speaker asserted that everything had proceeded according to plan since June 22, when the German armies struck into Russia.

He said that he had painfully kept his silence for months while he knew that Russia, as he said, was preparing to attack.

That, Hitler said, was part of his traditional strategy of surprise. He added that the decision to remain silent was "the hardest decision of my life" but that hundreds of thousands of lives were at stake.

"We were not mistaken about anything except that we did not know how awfully big the preparations were against us and how closely Europe escaped bolshevism," he said.

Explaining his long silence since the Russian campaign started, Hitler said that he could not have spoken until "the enemy had been hit so hard he never again will rise up."

and the pickup's wheels struck a soft shoulder off the road.

Hogan told Ward he had served in the army in Hawaii, but that he was discharged for physical disability and had later spent a year in an army hospital as the result of a nervous breakdown. He said he was hitchhiking to San Francisco to try to get a job in the merchant marine.

VOTING LIGHT HERE IN SPUD REFERENDUM

Voting by Klamath county potato growers and handlers on a proposed potato marketing agreement was reported light by poll-closing time at the county agent's office Thursday night. C. A. Henderson, county agent, reminded all growers intending to cast ballots by mail that Monday at 5 p. m. is the deadline for such voting.

Result of the vote will not be known until official announcement from Washington is made, Henderson said, adding that because the information on the ballots is confidential no local counting is to be held.

The proposed agreement was outlined last night by C. R. Tulley, representative of the fruit and vegetable division of the surplus marketing administration. The local district would be made up of Modoc and Siskiyou counties of California and Klamath, Deschutes, and Crook counties. The aims of the agreement are to prohibit shipment of cull potatoes—automatically in effect if and when the agreement is approved—and regulation of shipments of potato grades above culls—U. S. No. 1's and U. S. No. 2's—by minimum size standards or further restriction of shipments within a particular grade.

If the agreement is accepted, its administration will be in the hands of a control committee for the area composed of six growers and three handlers. The members of the committee were elected during the past week at meetings at Henley, Tulelake, and Redmond.

Tulley, who is here to assist growers in understanding the proposed agreement, said a similar agreement to the local setup is in operation in Idaho and Colorado and another vote has been completed in the Ellensburg, Wash., area, but that the outcome of the latter has not been determined. The whole plan of marketing agreements, he said, is to eliminate shipments of less desirable grades and sizes of potatoes during years in which prices are not satisfactory.

F. R. SOUNDS RUSSIANS ON FREE CHURCH

sion today was the latest of a series of reactions which followed Mr. Roosevelt's statement to a press conference last Tuesday that the Russian constitution guaranteed freedom of religion much as did that of the United States.

To a question whether his instructions to Harriman to take up the matter of religious freedom represented "a start on the four freedoms," of which he has often spoken, the chief executive retorted somewhat sharply that the reporter would not have asked that if he had read what the chief executive had been saying for eight years.

The Rev. Edmund A. Walsh, S. J., vice president of Georgetown university, said "The events of the past 24 hours convince me that the hour has come for a definite and constructive move on the part of the president of the United States."

After Mr. Roosevelt, at his Tuesday press conference, had described the Russian constitution's religious guarantees as essentially the same as ours, Father Walsh had quickly declared that provision of the Russian constitution was "nothing but a hollow shell."

His later and more hopeful comment was based upon a White House statement issued late yesterday, declaring that the president's press conference remarks had been subjected to conflicting interpretations and some misquotations.

SEATTLE, Oct. 3 (AP)—The Most Rev. Gerald Shaughnessy, Roman Catholic bishop of Seattle, today term "inexpressibly shocking" a statement by President Roosevelt that the Russian constitution guaranteed freedom of religion much as in the United States.

Almost simultaneously, Matthew Woll, a vice president of the American Federation of Labor, and head of the labor committee to aid the British workers, told interviewers here that "There is no more freedom of religion in Russia today than there was in the very beginning of the soviet regime."

Kidnaping Viewed In Search for La Grande Child

LA GRANDE, Ore., Oct. 3 (AP)—Police investigated the possibility today that Raymond Dowd, three-year-old Pleasant Grove child, missing since Wednesday, had been kidnaped.

Late last night Sheriff Jesse Breshears said, without amplification: "The child did not stray away. He was taken."

His declaration followed a day of intensive search through the wooded foothill country near the home of the child's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Lorenzo Dowd. An estimated 1000 persons participated. Two airplanes skimmed low over the area in a fruitless effort to gain some trace of the boy.

In the meantime, the boy's grandparents added \$100 to the \$50 reward offered by the parents for information leading to his return.

tive in the center and said combined German-Rumanian forces lost heavily in the south when a Russian counter-attack balked an attempt to thrust a wedge through red army lines at an undisclosed point.

BERLIN, Oct. 3 (AP)—The capture of Krasnoje Selo, 15 miles southwest of Leningrad, was reported by DNB tonight as the Germans pounded at both ends of the long eastern front behind relentless air attacks.

The palatial buildings of Krasnoje Selo, once the summer watering place of Russia's czars and now a treasure house of Russian art, were occupied mostly intact, the news agency said.

Nineteen other persons were in Allegany and Memorial hospitals, suffering from injuries ranging from severe burns to broken bones, bruises and shock. Two were treated for minor injuries and released.

A meat market, a haberdashery and a drug store were wrecked by the blast in the central business section late yesterday afternoon. Fire that followed was quickly brought under control. Damage was estimated at more than \$100,000.

CUMBERLAND, Md., Oct. 3 (AP)—City officials sought today the cause of a shattering explosion that wrecked three two-story buildings in the heart of this western Maryland industrial city, damaged several others and injured 23 persons, two of them critically.

Little hope was held for the recovery of Theodore Hershberger of Cresaptown and Dr. John Christ, Hershberger was entombed in flaming ruins for nearly an hour and Dr. Christ was blown from his second-story office, where three patients also were injured.

21 MORE EXECUTED IN OCCUPIED ZONE

(Brno) on charges of preparation for high treason, sabotage and possession of arms.

Thirteen of the army officers were shot yesterday on the accusation of organizing terroristic bands which planned to assassinate Czechs who collaborated with the Germans.

The official Gazette in Berlin announced confiscation of the property of Jan Masaryk, Czechoslovak ambassador to London and son of the former republic's first president.

(The Prague radio as heard in London reported tonight that 14 further executions had been carried out of Brno. In addition, 131 more defendants were handed over to the gestapo, the radio said.)

BERLIN, Oct. 3 (AP)—The mayor of Prague, Otakar Klapska, has been condemned to death by the people's court on charges of plotting rebellion, apparently in a conspiracy with the condemned premier of the Bohemia-Moravia protectorate, General Alois Elias, Dienst Aus Deutschland reported today.

This agency, with close official connections, quoted Prague sources saying that Elias had drawn Klapska into a plot.

Elias, also under sentence of death, has taken the only possible appeal from its verdict—to Adolf Hitler himself.

Klapska, in turn, was accused of recruiting other municipal officials for action against the German administration in the protectorate.

The German-dominated government of Slovakia, bordering Bohemia-Moravia, was reported to have decreed death for any person convicted of sabotage. (Advices in Budapest said a communist was executed in former Yugoslavia today for outlawed activity.)

As German secret police continued their sweeping investigation into alleged rebellious activities in Bohemia-Moravia, Prague newspapers said 18 were executed in the protectorate yesterday—15 of whom were shot and three, Jews, hanged. They said 13 officers of the former Czechoslovak army were among those sentenced to die.
