Gene Tunney to Visit Portland On Navy Tour

Japs Claim Gains In New Offensive

SHANGHAI, Oct. 3 (AP)—The Japanese army declared tonight that its new drive in Honan province had put its advance units within six miles of the vital railway junction of Chengchow, smashed the Chinese 98th army and killed 2000 and captured 5000 Chinese soldiers.

General Wu Shih-Min, commander of the 98th army, was among the dead, Japanese dispatches said.

These successes, Japanese spokesmen asserted, opened the way for early occupation of Chengchow, which would be the preliminary to a fresh advance along the western part of the Lungtai railway.
