

Public Inspects Newspaper Plant At 'Open House'

Picture-making and the big Duplex printing press competed for major interest among the many Midland Empire people who visited The Herald and News offices on Saturday, when the papers were hosts at an "Open House."

The visitors began coming at 1 p. m. and the last group had not left until after 7 p. m. The newspaper people, who planned the event as a feature of National Newspaper week, felt it was a pronounced success and probably more open houses will be held in the future to give Klamath people an opportunity to see the inside workings of the newspaper plant.

Special arrangements were made to keep the big press running much longer than usual, but in spite of this many of the visitors did not get a chance to see this machinery in operation. From time to time Saturday, or anyone else who would like to see this operation, is welcome to come in at that time.

A majority of the visitors tarried for a long time in the room where an exhibit had been set up to show the different processes involved in the reproduction of photographs in the paper. This process was carefully explained, using the first page of last Saturday's society page as an example.

The open house guests then visited the news room, where United Press and Associated Press teletypes were bringing in news from all over the world. From there, they went "back shop" to the large printing plant, watched linotypes operate, viewed the stereotyping process and then went into the press room to see the final step in producing a newspaper.

In the advertising department, special exhibits were arranged. These included old files and copies of early-day Klamath newspapers; a display showing the various steps in producing an advertisement for the paper; a front page of type and a front page "mat," and copies of a British and American paper showing the different treatment of the story of December 10, 1936, when King Edward abdicated.

FASTER COLLECTION OF TAXES PLANNED

Driven almost frantic by last Friday night's crush at the tax collection booth at Modoc field, Klamath Union high school officials Monday revealed plans to enlarge collection facilities both at the game and during the week.

Six additional booths will be erected at the field and machinery set up at the Klamath county chamber of commerce office, 323 Main street, to handle the luxury levy matter during the week. Superintendent Arnold L. Gralapp told members of the Quarterback club at their Monday meeting.

Collection of the ten per cent tax on student tickets will be handled through the various schools before next Friday.

Gralapp said that all holders of either general admission or reserved seat tickets, whether they be complimentary or purchased, may pay their five or eight cent tax at the chamber offices any time during the week. Payment will eliminate the necessity of stopping at a Modoc field booth Friday night when Ashland meets the Klamath Pelicans here.

Gralapp said the mixup which prevented many Pelican fans from seeing the kickoff against Dunsuir also struck athletic contests at Portland over the weekend. Some spectators were delayed as much as a half hour at the Washington-Oregon State game Saturday, he disclosed.

Pelican Coach Buck Hammer, in his weekly address to the Quarterbacks, regarded last Friday's slaughter of the plucky Dunsuir eleven as unfortunate.

He said he rushed Pelican reserves into the fray after the first two touchdowns but the subs were as eager and apparently as capable to go as the first string.

Hammer said he believed that Ashland will field an excellent first team but that he believed the Grizzlies were weak on reserves. With the locals rounding into shape three deep, he foresaw a bruising encounter if the Grizzlies are not able to send in timely replacements.

A Quarterback member raised the issue of the crowd remaining to the last whistle even though the game may be decided minutes before the end and it was urged that in the future students, adults and others stay seated until the last gun.
